A native of Goldthwaite, in Mills County, Walton served in the U. S. Air Force, and is a graduate of both North Texas State University and Baylor University Law School. He, his wife, and two daughters live in Eastland, where they attend the First Baptist Church. He is also a member of the Eastland Lions Club, the Cross Timbers Shrine Club, and Eastland Masonic Lodge No. 467, AF&AM.

Peanut Growers Associations -- Sale and Leasing Are Reinstated

Ross Wilson, Manager, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, Gorman, Texas, announced on January 25, 1974, that Agriculture Secretary Butz and the National Peanut Growers Group have reached a compromise agreement on peanut program modifications. USDA had earlier turned down a proposal from the growers to modify the program through a grower assessment approach. Objections were voiced by USDA to passing assessment costs on to consumers of peanut products. On January 21 the Department suggested an alternative approach that would result in a modest lowering of support price from the present level and a reduction of the 1,610,000 acres. The provision for unlimited production to be restricted to crushing and export is a part of the USDA plan. This provision was also a part of the grower assessment concept. Growers indicated that the USDA plan calling for both a price and acreage decrease would not be acceptable. Further, USDA was told that at least 2 of the 1974 policy changes for peanuts announced on October 24 would have to be withdrawn prior to any resumption of program modification negotiations. Following 2 days of discussions on January 21 and 22 between growers and USDA the growers agreed to work toward a program that would include a moderate reduction of support price, but would maintain the present 1,610,000 acres held by current growers for allotment production. Any production beyond the 1,610,000 acres would be for export and crushing uses only.

Wilson said that in terms of net returns to growers the plan agreed upon holds a slight advantage over the grower assessment plan.

As part of the agreement USDA announced on January 25th that 3 of the peanut program administrative changes for 1974 have been rescinded or modified by Agriculture Secretary Butz. Rescinded on January 25th by USDA were changes announced by the Secretary on October 24, 1973 to transfer field and supervisory price support functions of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association to state and county ASCS offices and elimination of acreage allotment transfers by sale and lease. CCC's

previously announced policy of requiring a minimum resale level of 115 percent of the loan rate on both domestic and diversion sales has been modified to require only a 100 percent resale level for such sales. The Secretary's action of January 25th means that Southwestern Peanut Growers Association will continue to handle CCC peanut price support functions in southwestern states as will its 2 counterparts in Virginia and Georgia. The second result of the announcement is that leases and sales of peanut acreage allotments will be continued as in recent years. Also resolved is the third critical policy change requiring a minimum resale amount of 115 percent of loan value on CCC stocks in 1974. The association manager stressed that efforts will be continued to modify or reverse other USDA decisions announced on October 24, 1973 that are adverse to growers.

Wilson credited the efforts of key peanut area Congressmen in achieving reversal of these 3 policies. Especially significant was the firm stand taken soon after October 24 by House Agriculture Committee Chairman W. R. Poage House Speaker Carl Albert, Senator Henry Bellmon, Oklahoma; Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Herman Talmadge, along with Congressmen Omar Burlison and Abraham Kazan and Senator Lloyd Bentsen of Texas as well as other peanut area Congressmen. Of prime importance also was the ground swell of resentment from peanut growers, peanut buyers and area business firms as expressed to all area Congressmen.

The association manager was quick to add, "Although the rescinding of these 3 policies by USDA is most encouraging, a monumental task is yet to be accomplished — that of moving through the Congress a revised peanut bill that must contain the provisions to safeguard growers' interests." Wilson expressed sincere appreciation to the thousands of individuals throughout Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico who have personally contacted Congressmen to express interest in these items.

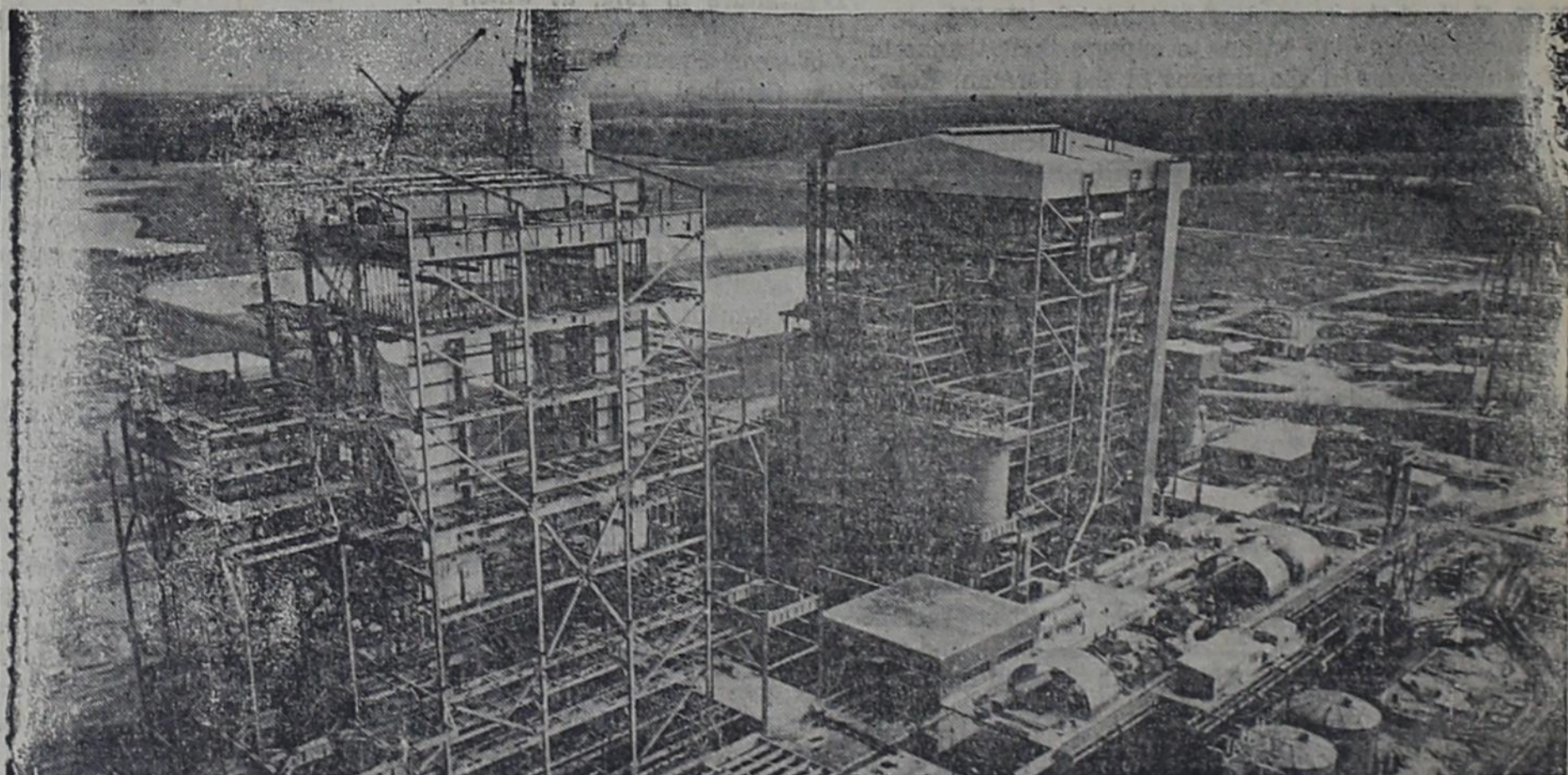



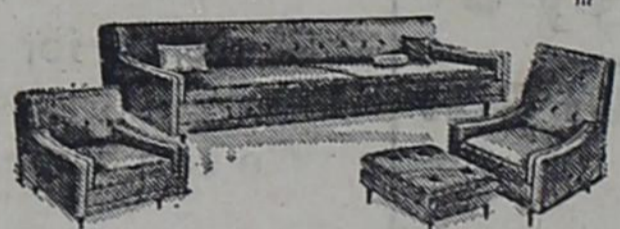
