J. E. Walker Laid to Rest Wednesday

James Edgar Walker, 88, retired Gorman pharmacist, died at 4:30 a. m. Tuesday in Stephens Memorial Hospital in Breckenridge where he had been a patient for five weeks.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday in the First United Methodist Church in Gorman with Rev. J. W. Hodges, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Roy Johnson of Fort Worth. Burial was in Gorman Cemetery under the direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Born July 22, 1884 in Mt. Pleasant, the son of a Methodist minister, he graduated from Hico High School and attended College at Glen Rose. He married the late Minnie Collie July 3, 1906 in Gorman.

He was a pharmacist until his retirement four years ago and also engaged in the insurance business. He was a life-long member of the Methodist Church, served as treasurer of the Cisco District Mission Board for more than 50 years and was a member of the official board of the church in Gorman for over 60 years.

He was a member of the Masons, Gorman Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. W. M. Emmons and Gerry Walker, both of Breckenridge; a sister, Mrs. M. H. Smith of Dallas; a granddaughter, Mrs. Pat (Diane) McLaughlan of Houston.

**Robert E. Ervin
Awarded State
Water Certificate**

The official State Health Department's certificate of competency for the oldest ecology oriented profession in Texas, has been awarded to Robert E. Ervin, Route 2, Gorman.

Mr. Ervin works for the City of Gorman. As an ecology worker, he has been taught effective ways for producing safe drinking water and treatments to make wastewater into clean streams for public use.

This training from the Texas Water Utilities Association, the largest water and wastewater training school in the United States, has produced clean streams and better operated water facilities than any other section of the country.

To receive the certificate, Ervin has completed both a formal and a specialized education, accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience, and passed the examination given by the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineers.

The growing need for clean water has made the water ecologist one of the most important workers in his community. Most of his work is not seen by the public he serves; but the effects are used daily everytime someone uses water.

Dear Editor: — On May 13, 1973 Mrs. Laura Howell South will celebrate her one hundred years of living.

For twenty years, Mrs. South taught school in Gorman. She was known to the community as Mrs. A. H. Howell.

Mr. Howell was bookkeeper for the Perry Cotton Gin for many years. He was also a 32nd degree Mason.

Mrs. South was born in Comanche County near Baggett. Her father was William Robertson, one of the first settlers in that county. He was a Judge and Texas Ranger.

There were fourteen children in the family. All worked their way through college and with the exception of one became school teachers.

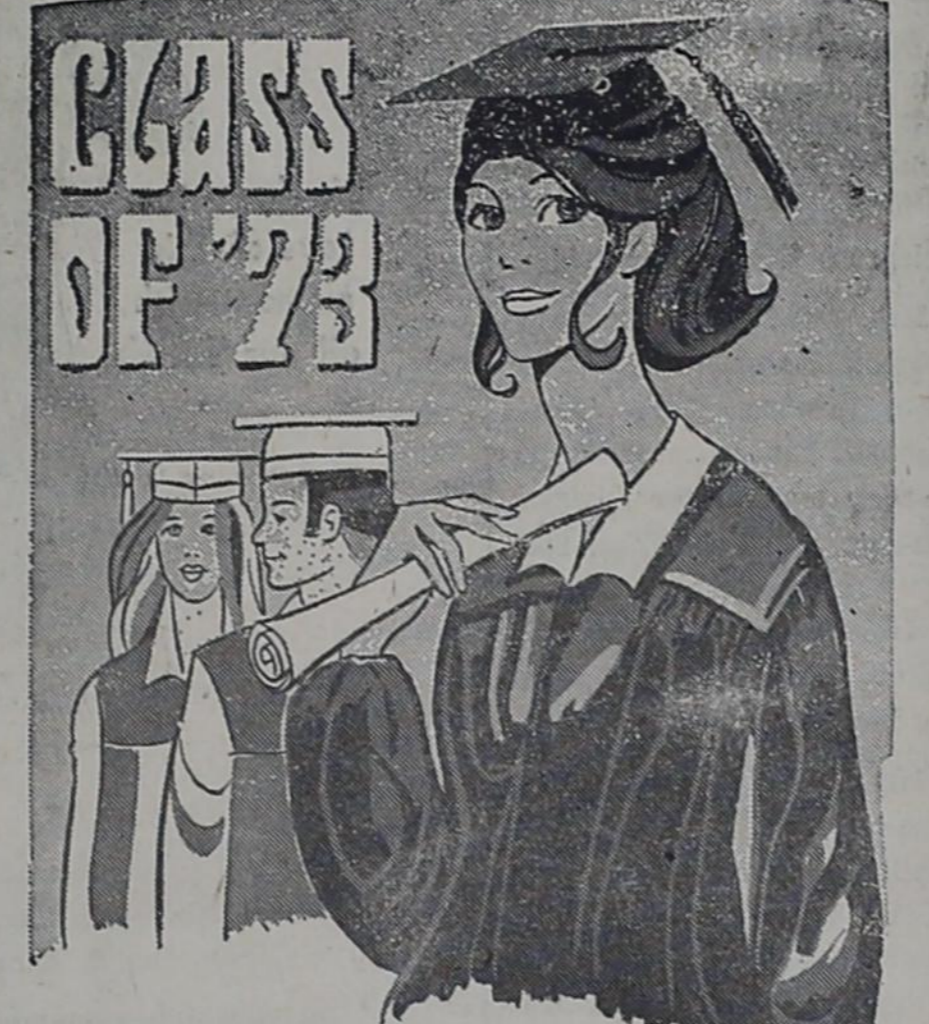

**PECAN FIELD
DAY SET MAY 25
AT RISING STAR**

Pecan insect and disease control and field demonstrations of spraying equipment will be featured at the Pecan Spring Field Day in Rising Star Friday, May 25. Dan Childress, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, said the field day would begin at 9:30 a. m. in the American Legion Hall in Rising Star. The afternoon session will be devoted to the examination of pecan trees for insect development and demonstrations of various types of sprayers.

The field day is sponsored by the Eastland County Growers Association and the Agricultural Extension Service.

County Agent De Gordon said speakers will include three area extension specialists from Stephenville. Dr. Cliff Hoelscher, Entomologist, will discuss the pecan nut case bearer situation this year and the control of all pecan insects. Dr. Thomas Lee, Plant Pathologist, will discuss pecan diseases and their control. The third speaker will be Dr. Earl Puls, Horticulturist, who will discuss the pecan crop prospects for 1973 and the effects of the late freeze damage.

A panel of specialists and pecan growers will answer questions on freeze damage to various trees and orchards in the county.

The afternoon field day will begin at 1:30 p. m. in the Rex Hudson orchard. This orchard is about 3 1/2 miles south of Rising Star just off Hwy. 183. Four or five types of power sprayers will be demonstrated at the orchard.

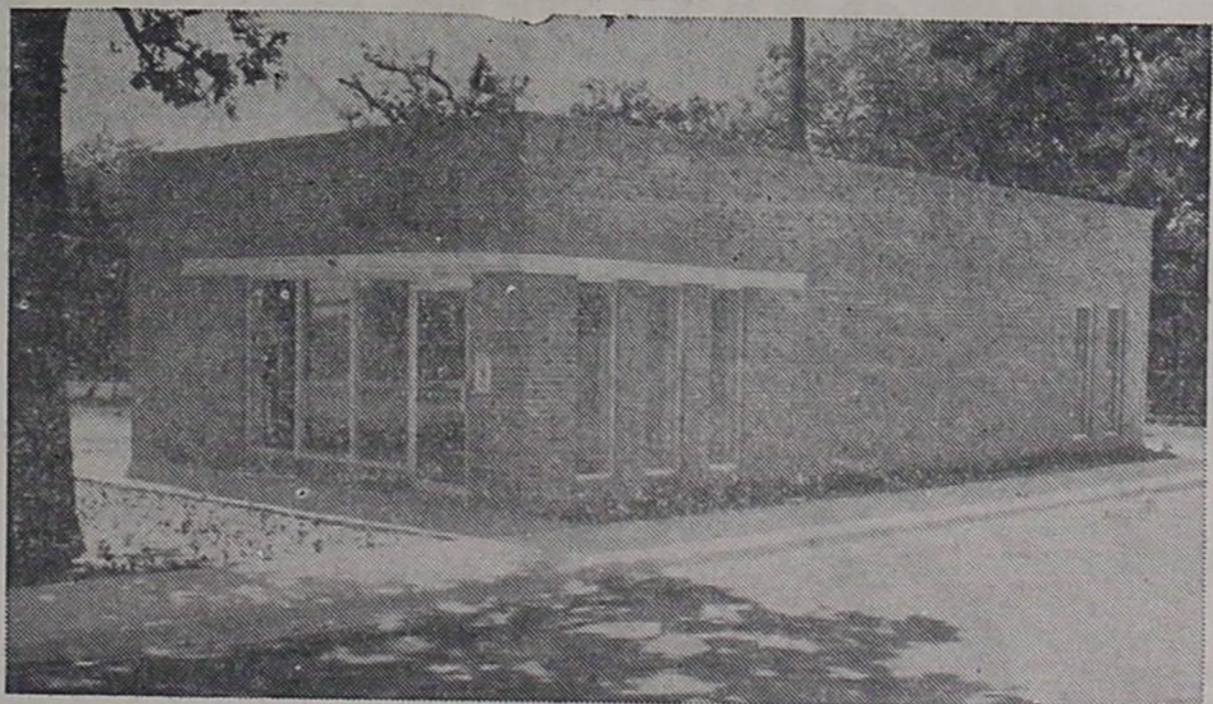

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Agriculture's light trapping program for the lesser cornstalk borer, Texas' most serious peanut insect pest, has captured the first moth for the 1973 season in the central Texas area.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced that the first moths were caught by one of the De Leon Research Laboratory's light trap on May 8. Last year's first catch was confirmed on March 13.

Commissioner White urged farmers to be on the lookout for moths and larvae in fields as soon as their peanuts and other crops are planted.

Moths and larvae may be sent to the De Leon Research Laboratory, 301 West Navarro De Leon, Texas 76444, for identification.

The club presented the president's pin to Mrs. Foster as outgoing president, and her gift as Outstanding Club Woman was a lovely silver cake stand.



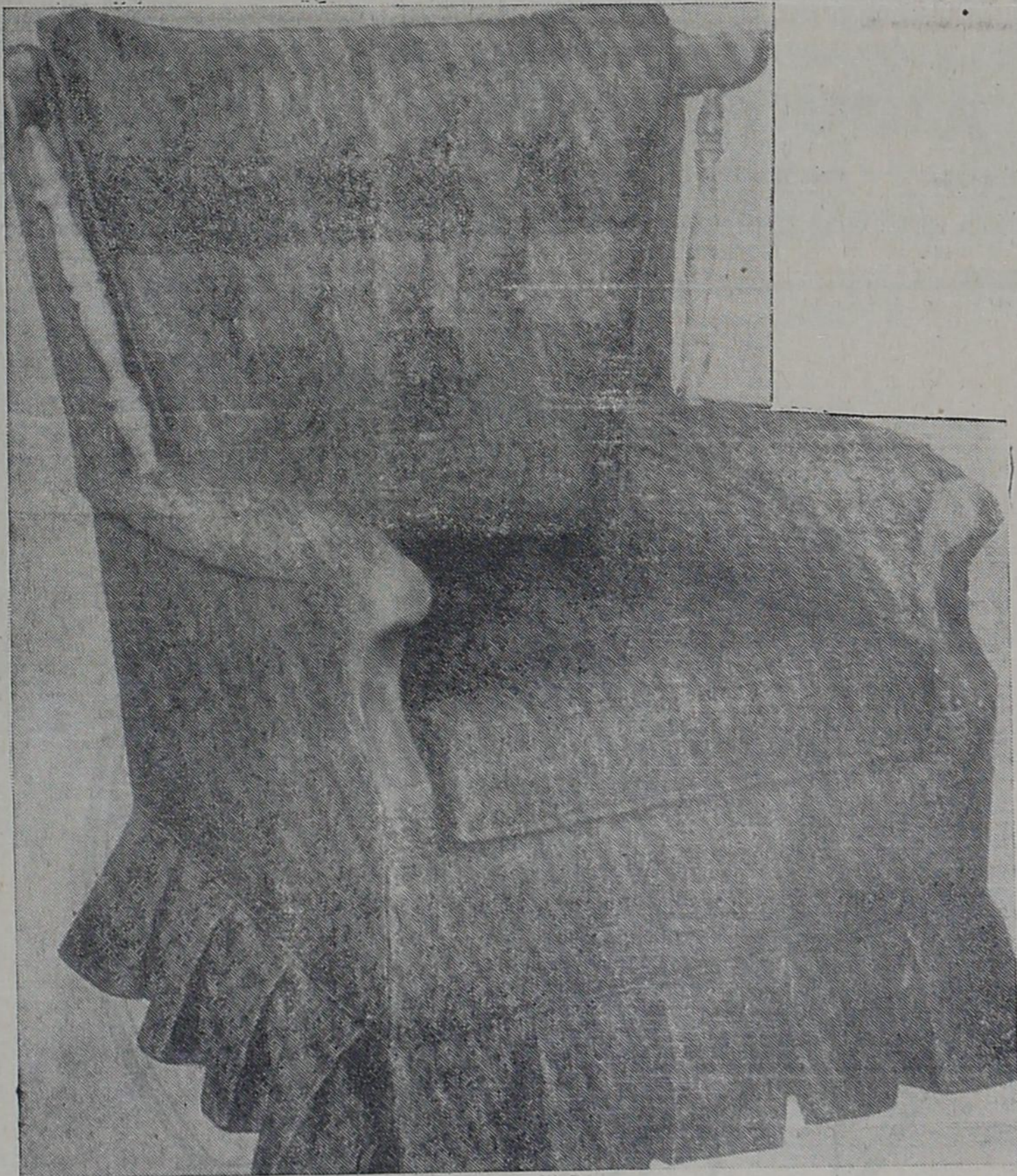
