Inspect filters often: Clogged filters make the unit work harder and use more electricity. Re-placement of disposable filters—or cleaning of permanent types — will help keep the system running efficiently.



Keep sunlight out: Direct sunlight increases the heat in your home. Reduce the air con-ditioning unit's load by using awnings, blinds, shades or draw drapes.



Trim shrubbery: The outdoor unit needs free air circulation. Help it maintain full efficiency

Insulate: Proper insulation keeps the hot air out, the cool air in. It reduces the cost of winter heating too. Ceiling insulation is particularly important.



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
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
