THE GORDON SPOT

There will be a premium price on peaches this year. There is no doubt about it, those growers that escaped extensive freeze damage this year will get top dollar for their product.

Dr. Earl Puls, Extension Horticulturist, tells us that number-one early peaches are now selling for \$10.00 to \$20.00 per half-bushel. And, in many areas, despite heavy hail damage, culls are selling at what were formerly No. 1 prices.

Many peach growers who thought their peaches escaped the freeze are now seeing delayed shedding. Much of their shedding can be attributed to the earlier freeze in April.

You may find that despite an otherwise healthy appear-

ing peach, the kernel (embryo) of the seed have been killed and are brown and discolored. This type damage usually results in immediate shedding of the fruit. But, don't be fooled because some varieties will hold their fruit longer than others following a freeze. Upon investigation you may find that the seed or kernel is damaged, but the fruit still stuck on the tree a month or more after a damaging freeze.

The freeze may not have damaged the pecan crop as much as we had earlier believed. After the freeze, the terminal buds growth was forced out on the primary shoots below the freeze damage. This new growth also contains flowering parts which result in pecans.

Although the top soil is getting pretty dry we do have god deep soil moisture in most parts of the county. Because of this there is lots of hope for a good hay crop this year.

Following a few simple guidelines makes high-quality hay making easy. Fertilization and timely harvesting are the two main factors affecting hay quality. Fertilizer is a necessity on most Eastland County soils. Plants grown with adequate fertilizer contain more nutrients and leaves than those grown under low fertility conditions.

Harvesting hay at the proper stage of growth is important. As hay crops advance

from vegetative to reproductive stage, they become progressively lower in protein content and in appeal to livestock. Stems increase and there are fewer leaves and digestible parts.

Hay quality also depends on the type of plants from which it is made. Although alfalfa is higher in protein and minerals, grass hay can be improved.

Weed control helps. Weeds decrease hay quality by adding objectionable tastes and odors and reducing livestock acceptability.

Growth conditions influence hay quality. Hay grown during a drought may be stunted and less leafy. Excessive moisture can produce leaf diseases, reducing the crop's leafiness.

Curing conditions are equally important to hay quality. Excess drying in the field before the hay is raked into windrows causes a loss of many brittle leaves in the raking operation. Crushing or conditioning the grass stems at mowing time permits rapid drying and eliminates raking — an operation which often shatters many leaves and mixes dust with the hay.

Hay baled and stored before proper drying will likely develop a musty, moldy odor. Molds may be toxic to animals feeding on the forage.

We are planning to have a hay show here on September 25, 1973. This will be a good opportunity for hay producers to measure the quality of their hay.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THE ISSUE OF REVAMPING AND REDIRECTING federal aid to public school education will be resolved in the weeks ahead.

SOME PROGRAMS HAVE WORKED WELL IN SOME STATES WHILE THE VERY SAME PROGRAM HAS BEEN A COSTLY FAILURE IN OTHERS. INFORMED PEOPLE ON THE SUBJECT point out the difficulty of applying the same yardstick to every section of the Nation. It has not worked and they say it never will.

IN ADDITION TO PROPOSALS FOR GRANTING DIRECT PAYMENT TO PARENTS who send their children to private schools, are efforts to give greater discretion to local school officials in administering programs, possibly based on the concept of Reverse Sharing.

THUS FAR THE COURTS HAVE RULED THAT AID TO PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL. THE SUPREME COURT HAS YET TO PASS DIRECTLY ON THE MATTER OF PAYMENT FOR A PART OF TUITION COST TO PARENTS WHO SEND THEIR CHILDREN TO PRIVATE SCHOOLS.

AN INTERESTING EXPERIMENT IS TO BE CARRIED OUT IN THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE. IT INVOLVES THE USE OF THE SO-CALLED VOUCHER SYSTEM OF EDUCATION.

UNDER A PLAN AGREED TO BY FEDERAL AND STATE OFFICIALS IN NEW HAMPSHIRE, A CERTAIN AMOUNT OF MONEY WILL BE ALLOCATED TO EACH SCHOOL-AGE CHILD IN THE STATE WHICH CAN BE USED FOR PAYMENT AT ANY SCHOOL THEY CHOOSE. THE PURPOSE OF THE VOUCHER SYSTEM IS TO APPLY THE PRINCIPLES OF THE MARKET ECONOMY TO ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY EDUCATION. IT IS SAID THAT THIS IS NOT AID TO PRIVATE AND CHURCH-RELATED SCHOOLS BUT AID TO PARENTS — ALL PARENTS.

THE CONTENTION IS THAT MANY PARENTS ARE PAYING DOUBLE FOR THEIR CHILDREN'S EDUCATION. THEY PAY TUITION AT PRIVATE AND CHURCH-RELATED SCHOOLS AND ALSO PAY TAXES FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS WHICH THEY DO NOT USE.

THERE IS DISSATISFACTION IN MANY PLACES

WITH THE PRESENT system of public education, which in many areas has broken down. Many public schools are black board jungles where teachers and law-abiding students fear for their safety and where the educational process is almost at a standstill. There are examples right here in the Nation's Capital. Not far away are Philadelphia and New York where militant teacher unions have struck devastating blows at the school system. A ruling by the Supreme Court which bars public school officials from firing a teacher who refused to lead her pupils in the "Pledge of Allegiance" to the Flag, furthers the demand of many parents for aid to send their children to private schools. There is a growing popularity for private and church-affiliated schools where academic and disciplinary standards are better maintained.

THE ARGUMENT GOES THAT THE VOUCHER SYSTEM WOULD ENCOURAGE FREE ENTERPRISE IN EDUCATION

and give a diversity in choosing the school offering a particular type of training — schools for students seriously interested in college, vocational schools, schools for the retarded and schools for children having special problems.

THE PUBLIC WANTS BETTER EDUCATION FOR LESS MONEY. The free enterprise system of teaching, using educational vouchers has an appeal. The success of the GI Bill of Rights concept is used as an example. It is said by supporters of the idea that companies and corporations would establish schools as a regular business operation. Some business organizations are already running schools with the latest educational techniques and equipment. It is argued that with the widespread use of the voucher system, business would have an incentive to assign skilled financial and planning personnel to school operations. The experiment to be launched in New Hampshire will be watched with great interest.

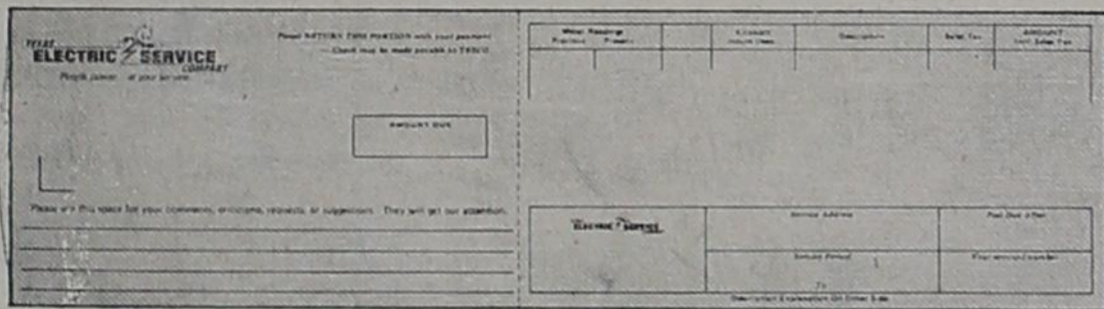
