ers. While the concept is still being refined and has not yet been adopted by the grower group, it has been developed to the point that it has been submitted to USDA for comment and evaluation. Initial reaction of Department officials is encouraging. The conto December 72. cept comes closest to any plan yet considered to meeting the separate views and requirements of the three growing areas.

Briefly here is what the concept provides:

1. Maintain the existing 1,610,000 acre Minimum National Peanut Allotment and individual farm allotment histories.

2.
