## You may be using a ton of coal a year without even knowing it.

The reason you don't know you're using this coal is because it comes to you in the form of electricity.  
We now have one power plant that uses Texas lignite coal. It accounts for about 15% of our total generation. We figure it uses an average of about one ton of coal annually for each residential customer.  
Two other lignite plants are under construction. By 1980, when almost half of the electricity we generate will be with lignite, you may be using three to four tons of coal a year.  
We're using lignite because new supplies of natural gas and oil—our traditional fuels—are hard to get and increasingly expensive.  
The higher costs of building power plants that use lignite, together with continuing inflation, are pushing the cost of producing elec-

tricity up. But the lignite fuel is more economical. It will help us keep the price of electricity from increasing as much as it would if we tried to depend on new supplies of natural gas and oil.  
One other big advantage of lignite is that it isn't being used extensively for anything other than the generation of electricity.  
We're continuing the orderly development of our power system so that you'll continue having the electricity you need.  
One of the ways we're doing it is by using a fuel that you can't use yourself.

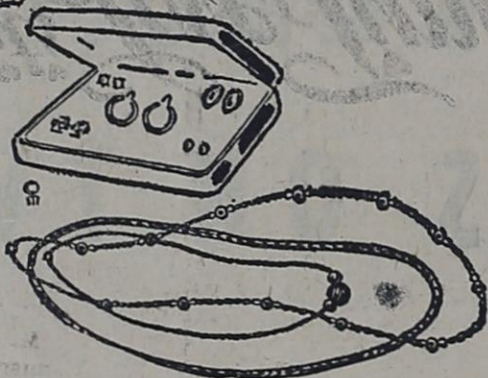

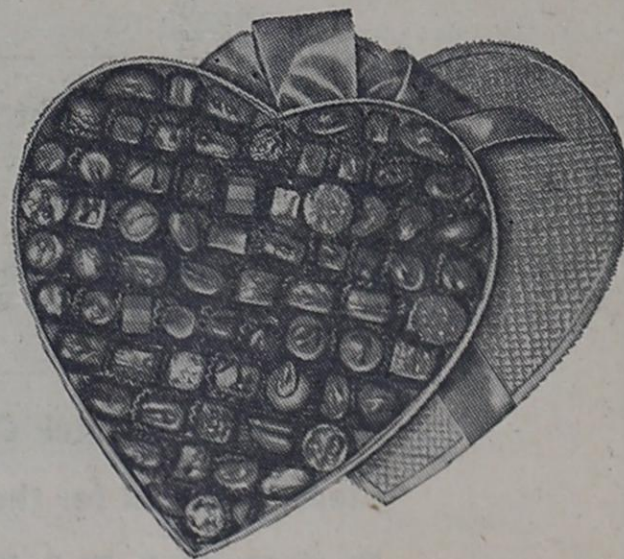
