The Post Office Department and the

Department of Justice are required by the law to follow several specific steps in carrying out a family's request that it receive no more mail from a firm mailing what they believe is pandering advertising.

---When the patron's request is properly

submitted the Post Office Department sends

a "prohibitory order" directing the sender to refrain from any further mailing of any kind to the complaining patron. This is

effective 30 days after sender's receipt of

**ENFORCING THE LAW** 

Unsolicited pornographic advertising is flooding the mails throughout Texas. Since 1964, the number of complaints to the Post Office about this mail has almost doubled. As a result, there have been a number of propos-als in Congress to limit these unwanted mailings. Texas Congressman George Bush has proposed anti-pornography legislation which would place strong restrictions on mailers of smut materials. Under this legislation, families would request that no chocene materials essent to them before, not after. could request that no obscene materials be sent to them before-not after-

#### PURPOSE OF LAW

American families are shocked on occasion by advertisements which they find offensive or believe to be morally harmful to their children. While in most cases the ads their children. While in most cases the ads are not legally obscene and are therefore mailable, they are clearly unwelcome in many homes. This law gives families the right to decide they want no more mail from a firm sending out what they consider pandering advertising, but it does not deny others the right to an unrestricted flow of

others the right to an unrestricted flow of material which is mailable. With the major share of the so-called pandering advertising coming from a small number of dealers, many of whom exchange mailing lists, it is believed that the patron's request will provide substantial relief to those who do not want such material.

#### HOW THE LAW WORKS

Families receiving advertising through the mail which they believe is pandering can ask a postmaster to direct that the promoter send no more mail, of any kind, to them. The sender is also ordered to remove the family's name from any mailing lists he owns, controls or rents, If a family moves and it wishes to continue the order at the

Under existing statute, the most effective way of preventing obscene mail from coming to your house is to fill out the above form and give it to your postmaster along with the ad-vertisement and its envelope. Write the words "Request for Prohibitory Order" on the face of the envelope. If the mailings persist, notify your post-master and the matter will be turned over to the Justice Department.

PANDERING ADVERTISEMENTS

A family receiving a pandering advertise ment which it finds offensive has authority under a new Federal law  $^1$  to ask that its  $% ^{1}$ members receive no more mail of any kind from the sender. An advertisement is con-sidered pandering if it offers to sell material which is, in the opinion of the recipient "erotically arousing or sexually provoca tive." The material can be in the form of a isplay, classified, or editorial-style adver tisement.

The individual mail patron is the sole judge of whether an advertisement is offensive to him. 





#### 'I Was Shamed'

SIR: Twenty-six years ago I was in a small town out-side Salerno, Italy. It was around the end of World War II. The town had been completely destroyed, deserted by all the inhabitans—smoke, ruins, flame and destruction were all around us.

I was a young boy then. My friends and I were look-ing around for food; we were starving and scared. The Germans were all around us. All of a sudden we heard the terrible noise of machines—tanks were coming our way. We were scared; we embraced each other from fear. Who was the enemy? Were they Germans? If they were, they would certainly kill us.

were, they would certainly still us. Suddenly, in all these clouds of smoke we saw a flag; we saw a flag standing up straight, full of pride and honor. You should have been there; it was the most beautiful sight any man could have wished for. The tanks were getting closer; we didn't know what to do. We kept looking at that flag, looking; looking; and all of a sudde as amile was coming back to our face, first slowly and then bigger, bigger and deeper. If was the American flag, the American flag; and we cried and screamed with joy in our heart. The fear was gone, there were no more soldiers to kill us.

"It's the American flag; the Americans, the Ameri-cans are here," we cried. "We are free; freedom is here at last." And we ran down the hills, we ran to our mothers hiding in the hills, in caves, even in wells. We ran with the scene of that beautiful flag we had just seen in these clouds in our eyes... The Americans, the Americans are hree. Boy! What a joy it was; what a sight to remember. sight to remember

We cried; we cried in our mothers' arms with joy; and I remember saying to my mother: "We are not going to be killed any more, mother, the Americans are here."

How I have learned to love that flag ever since. How beautiful it was to see the sight of those American soldiers coming to our town to bring us justice, liberty, peace. How we learned to love those soldiers standing there outside of their tanks, beside the American flag. What men they were; what heroes.

What men they were; what heroes. Now, after twenty-six years, I an living in America. I have lived here for 24 years and have been a citizen for 20 years. I have learned to love and respect that fag more and more; and, today, I feel just as strong about it as when I first saw that flag on the hills of Sa-terno. But the other day, when I saw on television, in the Capital of this great nation, a young American burn-ing the American flag in the middle of Dupont Circle and waving the Communist flag straight up in the air, I could not feel anything but horror. I was shamed, broken-hearted. Then tears came down to my face. "Man," I said, "you are not an American. Your father would not be the same soldier that gave me life, freedom and justice on these far hills of Salerno. You are not an American. You don't really know what freedom means. If you believe so deeply that your country is wrong and the enemy is right, then go there. Go to China, to Bust, wherever you think that you want to be. I will usy jour one-way tickt.

"I am sure that down deep there are many Americans that would be more than willing to help you and other people like you with a one-way ticket out of this coun-try; but don't come running back home to us because didn't find unreference to the second sec






