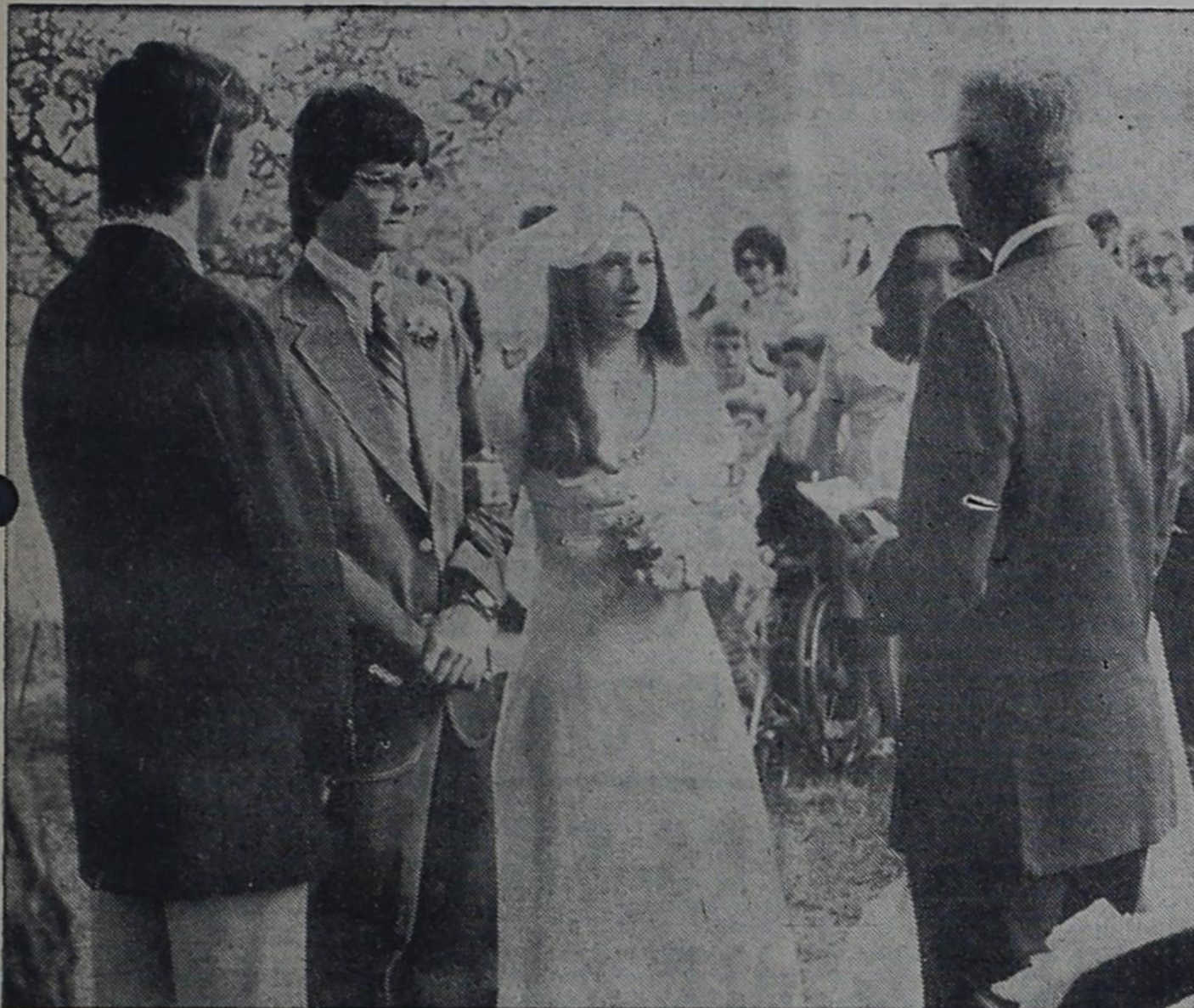


Delores Jean Eaves Becomes Bride of John Mac Patton in July 14 Rites
