

Investigation **Continues On Poynor Death**

Investigation continues in the shooting death of William Euell Poynor of Gorman according to a press release from the Eastland County Sheriff's Office.

At approximately 10:30 PM on Friday, May 29, 1998, a 911 call about a domestic disturbance was reported west of Gorman at a residence on Hwy 8 at CR-349. A deputy with the Eastland County Sheriff's Office was assisted by two Gorman Police Department Officers and an Eastland County Constable.

At approximately 11:00 PM a shooting incident occurred at this location. William Euell Poynor was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Jack Graham.

The entire incident is being investigated by Texas Ranger Bobby Grubbs of Brownwood at the request of Sheriff Bradford.

The severe storms that swept through Eastland County Monday night, May 25, 1998 demolished the historical McCleskey Discovery Well derrick that had been reconstructed by the Ranger Historical Preservation Society in Auguest of 1996. "I really believe it was a twister" said Jeane Pruett, the Society's president. "I can't say for sure, but it was definitely apart before it hit the ground. It was like you would hold up a handful of toothpicks and just let them go...it didn't just blow over."

The derrick was erected on the exact location of the well that roared in on October 17, 1917 and stared a boom that would be remembered as the "boom That Won The War" (WWI). In March of this year, the Society signed the papers for an additional 38 acres of land that would enable them to produce an educational working, living history, an event that would attract tourist and give a boost to the local economy.

In January of this year, the J.H. McCleskey Discovery Well was designated an Archeological Landmark by the Texas Historical Commission.

Will it be reconstructed again? Pruett said "absolutelyk, we have to put it back. It is a great part of our history, not just local, state or national, but international history. It was important to preserver it before, and it's important now to put it back up."

The Melon Production Tour will include at least three stops. The first stop will be of seedless melons grown on black plastic that are part of a disease control research project. Disease, especially anthracnose, can wipe out a melon crop in days if not controlled properly. The second stop will be of a drip irrigated cantaloupe filed under black plastic. Cantaloupe like seedless melons have a potential for significant returns if gown for a market window.




