The Gorman Band Boosters Club met on Tuesday night at the Band Hall to organize and elect new officers for the coming year.

The new band director, Russell Fuller was on hand to give his ideas and suggestions on what to expect and what was needed by the band.

Arnold Butler was elected to head the Band Boosters this year. Mrs. Charles Duran was elected vice president, Mrs. Billy Earl Simpson, secretary-treasurer, and Joe and Maxine Bennett, reporters.

The group set their meeting night for the first Monday night of each month at 7:30 p. m. They also discussed many other aspects pertaining to the band and its needs.

There were a few parents at meeting, but if we are to do a respectful job with the Booster Club we will need ALL of the band parents to participate in the Band Boosters.

The Gorman Panthers opened their season on a bright note at Hawley Friday night by downing the Bearcats by a score of 36-8.

The Panthers got off to a slow start in the game as their timing was not right, and they lost the ball on fumbles 3 times. Also the sharpness was not there on the blocking and tackling until later in the ball game.

The Panthers first boost came when they held the Bearcats on their own 8 yard line and when the center snapped the ball to the punter it sailed over his head and out of the end zone for a 2 point safety for the Panthers. This came with 1:23 left in the first period.

The Panthers got another score and another boost to their morale when Rudy Espinoza intercepted a Hawley pass on his own 45 and returned it all the way for a TD with 9:55 left in the second period. The run for extra points failed and the Panthers led 8-0.

The Big Red then forced the Bearcats to punt on their next possession, caught fire and scored on a sustained drive of 71 yards in 6 plays sparked by a beautiful 25 yard scamper by Jackie Selman. Selman hit for the final 5 yards off his right side for the tally with 2:55 left in the first half. Selman also added the 2 extra points on a run to make the score 16-0 at half time.

Following the halftime break, the Panthers again held the Bearcats, forcing them to punt. Johnny Scitern pulled the punt down at his own 25 yard line, and behind some beautiful blocks, raced 75 yards for another Panther score. The run for points failed and the score was 22-0.

With 3:25 left in the third period the Big Red added another score when Mark Arnold, who played a fine defensive game at the left half spot, intercepted a Bearcat pass on the Hawley 9 yard line and trotted over for the TD. Again the run for points failed.

The final Panther tally came with 9:25 left in the fourth period with the Panthers going 41 yards. Gorman got the ball on the Hawley 26. We were penalized 15 yards, putting the ball out to the 41. Hawley was penalized 15 on the next play, placing the ball on the 26. It took only one play for the Panthers to score as Wesley Rodgers raced off his left side behind some fine blocks for the TD. Scitern ran for the 2 pointer making the score 36-0.

Hawley got its lone tally on the final play of the ball game with Panther reserves on the field when big Jimmy Hendon, Bearcat tackle intercepted a pass and rambled for 57 yards for a score. Garry Womack ran for the two points, making the score 36-8.

Mark Arnold has been named as Player of The Week in the Hawley game and is truly deserving of the honor. He did a real fine job at his defensive halfback spot. The whole Panther defense did a good job of holding the Bearcats. We feel, however, that the offense needs some more work to perfect their timing and blocking.

The Panthers were hurt by injuries in this game as Jimmy Guthery received a collar bone injury which is expected to sideline him for an indefinite period. Rodney Duke received a laceration over his eye, and Marshall Roberts received some cracked ribs.

Johnny Scitern led the Panther offense with 74 yards in 11 carries for a 6.7 average. Wesley Rodgers got 57 yards in 9 notes for 6.4. Jackie Selman hit for 41 yards on 6 tries for 6.8. Billy Self got 28 yards on 6 tries for 4.7. Marshall Roberts netted 6 yards on 2 carries for 3.0. Rudy Espinoza lost 4 yards on 1 try, Kelly Henderson was tackled for a 12 yard loss on a pass try and Danny Ervin carried once for no gain.

Jimmy Guthery caught one pass for 9 yards and another pass completion was wiped out because of a penalty. The Panther travel to Roby on Friday night to take on the highly rated Roby Lions at 8 p. m. The Lions are a very strong team and should really test the toughness and determination of the Panthers.

Future Benefits Earnings Credits Tied To Annual

"Over 80 million individual postings were made to social security earnings records for the last quarter," according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

"Social security has a very good record-keeping system but errors do happen," he said. "Everyone should check his record every two or three years to be sure it is correct."

The Social Security Administration keeps 183 million individual records of workers' earnings, but any worker or self-employed person may start a check of his record by calling the local office for a special post card.

"The amount of social security benefits payable depends on the earnings shown on the worker's record," Tuley said. "So be sure it is correct by calling (915) 677-5262 and asking for the post card form to check your record." —GP—

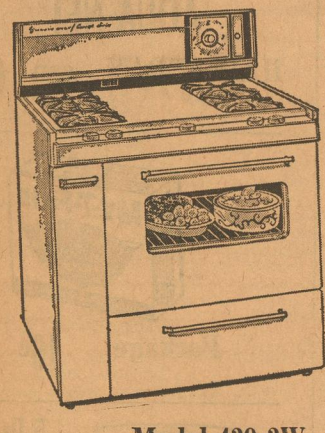

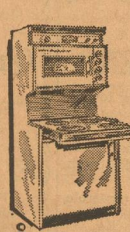

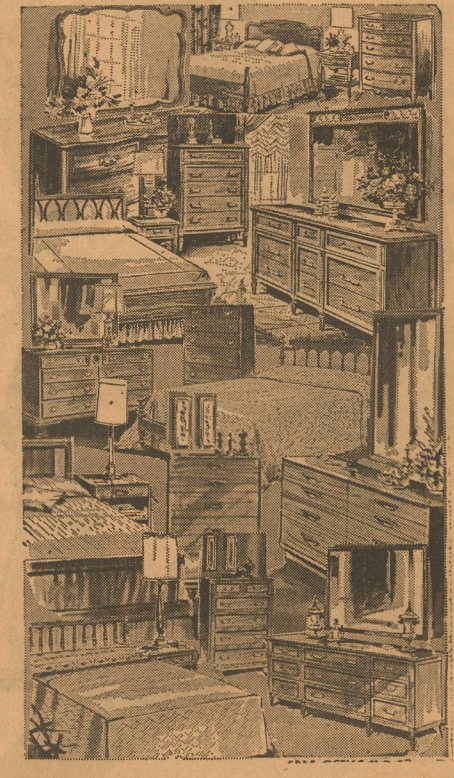

These local conferences are basic to the White House Conference on Aging which will be held in Washington, D. C., Nov. 29-December 3, 1971. In the meantime, state conferences will be held to develop the information gathered from the community forums into recommendations or programs for presentation at the national meeting.

In general, the basic needs of older people deal with such areas as income, health, nutrition, housing, transportation, employment and retirement, education, activities and spiritual well-being. The local forums may uncover other needs, Mrs. Herweck noted.

U. S. Commissioner on Aging, John B. Martin, who also serves as special assistant for aging to President Nixon, will direct the White House Conference. He says the approach being developed will cover a three-year period. The very basic local forums will be held in September 1970, the State and National White House Conferences in 1971 and the plan of action developed in 1972.
