task are more demanding and much more complex.

The preliminary reports on the census of so many of our smaller cities spell out in box-car size letters that as much tenacity — just plain guts — is required to tackle that job as the old timers needed."

The statement by Governor Smith contains more truth than poetry.

For instance I have been estimating the cost of opening our swimming pool. Most of the money for the swimming pool comes from contributions. The City pays \$750 per year.

So far this year through May 31st we have paid from the swimming pool fund the following:

Paint, pipe and other material	\$529.14
Labor	432.09
<b>Total</b>	<b>\$961.23</b>

I am not implying that anyone should contribute all of their time free gratis to maintaining the swimming pool or any other civic project. As Gov. Preston Smith states, we are going to be hard pressed to hold our own and if we continue to have a town more of us are going to have to pitch in and cut the cost of operating our civic projects. Maintenance of our sewerage disposal, dump grounds, streets, alleys, etc., is going to cost plenty.

I am proud of our new swimming pool and would like to see a tennis court and maybe, a pee-wee golf course added. These things can be done at a minimum of expense if we want them. As stated before, many young people have and are moving back to Gorman. With a little help, they will build these places of recreation the same way our old folks built Frank A. Gray Park, and other places around Gorman when we were a few years younger.

## Rev. Frank Williams Is New Minister Of The First United Methodist Church



Rev. Frank Williams is the son of Mrs. F. R. Williams of Fort Worth. He was born and educated in Fort Worth, graduating from R. L. Paschal High School, and received a B. S. Degree from Texas Christian University in 1955.

He taught at the All Saints Episcopal Parochial School in Fort Worth while serving his first student pastorate, the Forrester Circuit of the Waxahachie District.

In 1956-57, while he was a first year student at our Methodist Seminary, Iliff School of Theology, Denver, Colo., it was his privilege to be selected to organize a new Methodist Congregation in Colorado Springs, Colo. that became the Stratmoor Hills Methodist Church and in eight months under his pastorate had a church school of 225 and a membership of 95 church members received into full membership.

He completed his Bachelor of Divinity Degree in 1961 from Brito Divinity School, Texas Christian University.

His first full-time pastorate

was the First Methodist Church of Frost, Texas and during his four year pastorate there he shared with Brother Bob Sanders and the Gorman church, the winning of the Town and Country Award, and first met our Lay Delegate, Mrs. Duran.

In his second year at Frost he married Joyce Smith, the daughter of Mrs. Grover Smith of Frost. And together they have shared the ministry of our Lord in serving the Walter B. Rider Methodist Parish, Ennis, 2 years; The First United Methodist Church of Crowley when in a one year pastorate they had an \$8,000 Lord's Acre sale and paid off the last indebtedness on that property, and constructed a new \$46,500 educational unit and received 30 members into the fellowship of the church.

The last two years of their ministry have been blessed in serving the Hillcrest-Bosqueville United Methodist Churches of Waco. During this time the Lord blessed them with their son, Russell, now 22 months old.

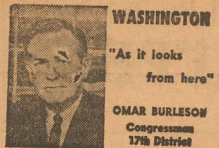

ONE OF THESE CONCERNS IS RUSSIA'S build-up of military potential in Cuba. There is good reason to believe that the Soviets are playing the venture into Cambodia and other areas in Southeast Asia at a low key and for good reason. In the meantime, Russia appears to be shifting from a defensive role to one of an offensive character in Cuba.

IT IS REPORTED THAT 3 SOVIET bombers capable of carrying nuclear bombs for a distance of 8,000 miles are now stationed in Cuba.

FROM OBSERVATIONS, MILITARY FLIGHTS from the big Soviet naval base in Murmansk are bringing submarine replacement crews to Cuba where they

board Russian submarines, which are known to cruise off our shores.

REPORTS OF NUCLEAR MISSILES IN CUBA in 1962 were delayed for a considerable period of time which made the late show down most serious. This appears to be the case at this time.

PERHAPS THE RUSSIANS THINK THAT INTERNAL dissension in the United States has weakened us to a point that we will not react to a shift in nuclear deployment in that a nuclear presence in Cuba, and in the Caribbean generally, will be ignored. This is one of the great dangers of the nature of the "dissent" which we have in our Nation.

IT IS, OF COURSE, PUBLICLY KNOWN that the Kremlin has recently sent into the Caribbean Sea a naval task force believed to include missile bearing cruisers and destroyers. When this was officially known, and it was, the Administration should have taken the issue up publicly and forced out into the open that which has seemingly been ignored. This has been an invitation for the Russians to continue to probe for a strengthening of their position as close to the Western Hemisphere as possible. The official attitude seems to be to "play it cool" nearer to home than on the other side of the World.

IT WAS WHILE WE WERE ABSORBED IN CONTROVERSY at home and elsewhere that the Soviets first sent naval units to within only 90 miles from our own shores. There has been no

direct repercussions which are perceivable.

WHATEVER THE REASONING BEHIND IT, it is pretty obvious that Russia's military is taking advantage of extending her forces in a most vital strategic position.

WHEN IT HAS BEEN NECESSARY FOR THE UNITED STATES to act in a confrontation with Russia, nothing has happened. It may not always be so but there are always certain risks to take. Imagine their reaction if we deployed nuclear carrying weapons into the Black Sea or Barents and Okhotsk Seas.

THOSE WHO SEE NOTHING BUT GOOD INTENTS on the part of the Soviet Union, reason that with their capability of launching an attack from their own soil, there should be no fear from near-by weapons. The question should follow such reasoning as to why they are expanding a force so near our Country. Sooner or later we could be placed under blackmail.

## Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus

A revival . . . a corn-shelling machine . . . an accident . . . a hymn

"The Work of God in Philadelphia" is what men called the citywide revival of 1856. Of the participating ministers, none was more powerful than 29-year-old Episcopal Dudley Tyng. Tyng was a born preacher and had been tutored by his minister father. One Sunday he stood before 5,000 men in Jayne's Hall. When he concluded his sermon 2,000 knees were on the floor. The following Wednesday he was at work in his study. For relaxation he went to his barn to watch the operation of a corn-shelling apparatus. The sleeve of his robe caught in a cog. His arm was torn out of his shoulder. Doctors and a score of ministers gathered at his bedside. He tried to sing "Rock of Ages" but he was too weak. The Rev. Stephen H. Tyng leaned over to hear the last words of his son, who had brought thousands to their knees

. . . "Tell them to stand up for Jesus." The phrase so impressed Presbyterian Minister George Duffield, Jr., that his next sermon from the text, "Stand, therefore, having your loins girt about with truth . . ." Then Duffield read a poem he had written. One of his members had the verses printed for distribution in the Sunday School. One of the leaflets found its way to a Baptist periodical. Composer George Webb read the poem . . . set it to music. In 1864 the Rev. Duffield heard soldiers in a Union camp sing verses he had written as a concluding exhortation to a sermon six years earlier.

A revival . . . a corn-shelling machine . . . a fatal accident . . . a hymn. "The Work of God in Philadelphia" has its influence today every time a hymnal is opened to—

Stand up, stand up for Jesus,  
 Ye soldiers of the cross;  
 Lift high His royal banner,  
 It must not suffer loss.  
 From vict'ry unto vict'ry  
 His army shall He lead,  
 Till ev'ry foe is vanquished  
 And Christ is Lord indeed.

Stand up, stand up for Jesus,  
 Stand in His strength alone;  
 The arm of flesh will fail you,  
 Ye dare not trust your own.  
 Put on the Gospel armor,  
 Each piece put on with prayer;  
 Where duty calls or danger,  
 Be never wanting there.

Stand up, stand up for Jesus,  
 The trumpet call obey,  
 Forth to the mighty conflict,  
 In this, His glorious day.  
 "Ye that are men now serve Him"  
 Against unnumbered foes,  
 Let courage rise with danger,  
 And strength to strength oppose.

Stand up, stand up for Jesus,  
 The strife will not be long;  
 This day the noise of battle,  
 The next, the victor's song.  
 To him that overcometh,  
 A crown of life shall be;  
 He with the King of glory  
 Shall reign eternally.
