





This compares to 56 percent for wheat, 19 percent for feed grains and 41 percent for cotton. From 1960 through 1973 the cost of the peanut program. averaged only \$39 million per year. The cost of the peanut program has fallen sharply since 1972. That year, the cost was \$55 million. The program cost dropped to about \$4 million in 1973 - less than one percent of the value of the crop. 



The Monticello choo-choo runs only 12 miles from start to finish, but it's doing a big job hauling lignite coal to Texas Electric's Monticello power plant near Mount Pleasant. The diesel-electric locomotive pulls

seven to 15 cars. And each car is loaded with 100 tons of lignite per trip.




