



GORMAN TV CABLE SYSTEM ADDS

EMERGENCY ALERT SYSTEM

The radar scanner for Dallas, Fort Worth and Abilene area is located in Stephenville, Texas. When a tornado or severe cloud is picked up by radar it is immediately teletyped to the Department of Public Safety in each county. From there it will be telephoned to Blackwell Hospital and qualified personnel will relay this information to everyone on the Gorman Cable System through their television sets.

The message will last approximately one minute. Every channel will be blacked out and only a voice will come through on your TV set giving the emergnecy message.

During stormy weather a person may leave the television set turned on all night and the voice should awaken them if an emergency message comes on anytime dur ing the night.

Also, anyone sighting a tornado is asked to call Blackwell Hospital at 734-2294, give their name, the approximate location of the funnel cloud and the direction it appears to be travelling.

This system will also be used for other emergencies; for instance, should an accident victim or patient need a certain type blood, a donor could be paged with the emergency alert system.

To be certain that the system operates at top performance, people who will be responsible for transmitting the message will be practicing at about 12:30 - 1:00 - 5:30 and 6:00 P. M. FRIDAY, APRIL 18th. Please listen during this time to learn more how it will operate. If you have your television set on any channel carried by the Gorman TV Cable System and you are connected to the cable you will have service temporarily discontinued for approximately one minute and the voice will deliver a Test Message at that time.



Proper insulation and weatherstripping will help you use electricity more efficiently for air conditioning. You can check the insulation and weatherstripping in your home with just a ruler and a flashlight.

Inadequate insulation is the single biggest cause of energy loss in most homes—in both summer and winter. Experts recommend about six inches of

insulation in your attic.

If your attic insulation doesn't measure up, you can add more of either loose, blown-in insulation or "batts" (long strips). The loose kind of insulation settles, so it may be necessary to add more after several years.

To check the weatherstripping around exterior doors, have someone shine a flashlight around the edges of each closed door. If you can see light, it means you may have to add or replace worn weatherstripping.

Saving electric energy takes very little energy on your part, and, since electricity is costing more, it's worth the effort.


