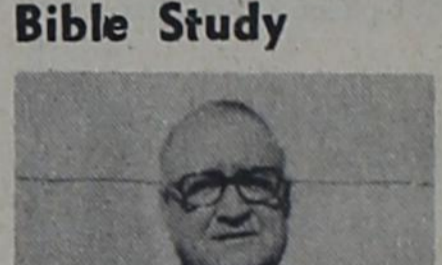
PEE WEE GAMES

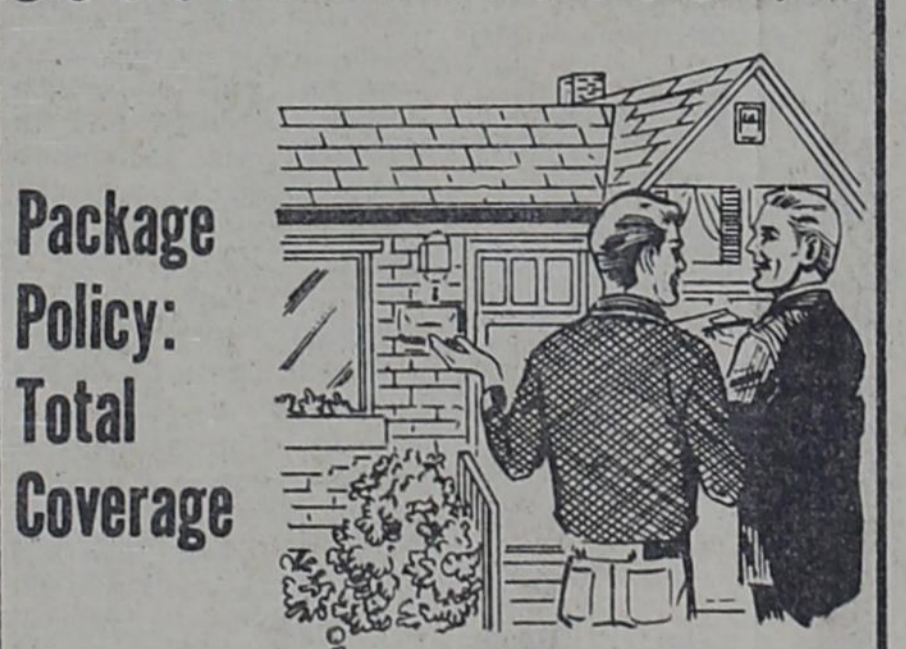

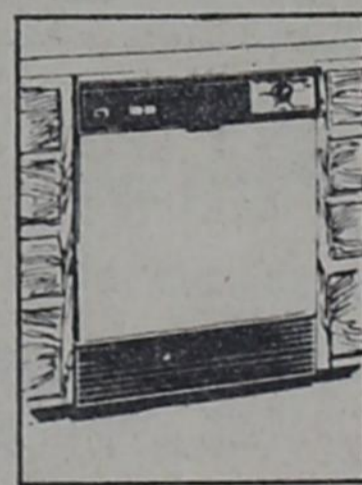

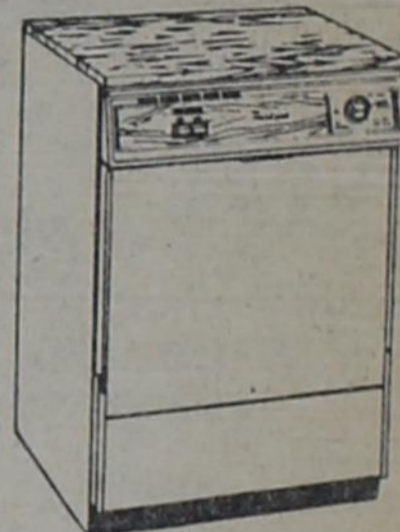
