Home Health Agency Offers New Service

Clients using home health care services often need skill nursing service by an LVN or and RN, but they are ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing needs do not meet the Medicare guidelines for "Skilled

Seeing this special need, Foundation, the MBFA which has delivered home health care in Texas since 1969, now announces a new service to these special clients.

Now those persons who require less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines, or those who require the skills of a licensed professional (vocational) or registered nurse, but cannot afford to pay the regular charge and have no insurance covering these services, are eligible through the Texas Homemaker Service, a division of MBFA Founda-

An example of this type of service would be the client who needs a B-12 or other type of vitamin injection, as has been ordered by an attending physician, and has Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans or private insurance of any kind and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient can have the visits of an LVN or RN in the home at a beneficial rate based on one's individual

financial status. This service also will benefit the patient who has been on the home health service under Medicare, or some other type of insurance coverage, but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client can pay a

The service should not be confused with regular homemaker services. This is still skilled nursing care given by an LVN or RN, but just does not meet the Medicare guidelines. The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient.

You may discuss this with you physician or your may call the West Central Texas Home Health Agency for more information. The phone number to call-915-677-2231 in Abilene or in Gorman area, Jackie Tucker, R.N. at 817-629-8041 will be able to answer any questions you or your physician may have regarding this new service.

Mrs. Tucker indicates that this new service will provide another alternative to thier clients toward better and more complete medical care available in the clients' homes. Chronic Disease Set in Eastland

Many persons in Texas, and the rest of the United States, have unknown chronic diseases that may someday become serious problems if not properly diagnosed and treated. An indication of the size of this problem in Texas can be seen in light of statistics released by Social Security officials, in which they estimated that 46% of Americans have one or

more chronic conditions. To provide for early detection of chronic diseases, the 65th Texas Legislature has appropriated funding for multiphasic screening projects designed to identify persons in whom a potential chronic health problem may exist. When a problem is indicated through screening procedures, the individual is referred to the physician of his choice for diagnosis and treatment. There will be no charges for any of the multiphasic screening tests. However, any diagnostic or treatment charges for services from the private physician will be the responsibility of the patient.

In support of the health Screening Clinics on a regular ongoing basis. the screening for each person will be abailable on an annual basis, with approximately one-half hour required for counseling and screening on the first visit. Nurses will establish a permanment file, which can be referred to on subsequent annual check-ups, or can be made available to the private physician on request.

Screening services available in this clinic will include: Obesity, malnutrition, vision, hearing, hypertension, diabetes, anemia, skin disoreders, tuberculosis, and other conditions as detected during nursing interviews.

The Chronic Disease Screening Clinic for Eastland Will be conducted by Public Health Region 4 nurses each Monday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The clinics will be held at 194 N. Lamar.

The Texas Department of Health office in Eastland encourages all adults to take advantage of the screening services offered in this clinic. In addition to services listed above, it will also be possible to obtain Pap tests as a part of the screening procedure.

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


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
