Dear Mr. Bennett:

In another attempt to increase the already imposing power of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and to bring this country one step closer to socialized medicine, HEW issued on September 23 their proposed National Health Planning Guidelines. If implemented in their present form, these guidelines would work a grievous injustice on small rural communities in Texas. They would force many hospitals to close, force an exodus of physicians from areas already deficient in quality medical personnel, contribute to rising medical costs and needlessly jeopardize health care Texans should be able to expect.

In its misguided attempt to contain hospital costs, the Administration has proposed programs and formulas that ignore the health care needs of localities and rural areas. In many instances the rural community has but one hospital for miles around, and it is reprehensible for the federal government to dictate the future of health care for that community. In present form, these guidelines must not be allowed to become law of the land, and I intend to maintain my efforts to ensure that such highlanded policy from Washington will

## 122 BAR. WELL COMPLETED NEAR GORMAN

Riddle Oil Co. of Azle completed No. 1 Vernon Warren in the Gorman (Ranger) Field one mile north of Gorman in Eastland County.

Location is 330 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the west lines of Section 4, Block 1, H&TC Survey, A-800.

Daily potential was 122 barrels of 28 gravity oil. Flow was through a one-inch-choke with packer set on the casing and 268 pounds tubing pressure.

Production is from perforations at 2,915-18 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 3,190 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,198 feet feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 410-1.

The terrain of the land is drained by branches and draws that empty into Sabanna Creek. A heavy growth of native pecan is found in the creek bottom. This part of the county was settled by early pioneers who raised cotton, grains, and cattle.

INDIAN MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY  
By Jewell Dukes Huddleston  
Some 26 miles from the County Seat lies this community in the extreme North-west corner of the county.

It is named for a low-lying mountain in the area that was the scene of one of the last Indian raids that took place in the early 1870's.

A descendant of one of the natives, the Widow Pinkney Penelope Thannisch, tells of the incident.

"Good neighbors came at dusk to warn of marauding Indians and to drive her livestock to safety. Mrs. Thannisch took her small children, William and Theodocia, to the Tom Marsh and spent the night. The next morning the settlers of the community, who had not drove their livestock up and penned them, were counting their losses. The horses belonging to Tom March, Dick Williams and the Widow Thannisch were used by vigilantes to track the stolen livestock. The trail led to Shackelford County near Albany where the Indians were surprised while preparing a meal. The settlers found meat broiling over a campfire but no Indians were to be seen. The livestock was recovered without mishap and returned to Comanche County and the rightful owners."

Farming and livestock raising was underway here more than 100 years ago. The soil changes abruptly from deep sand to red clay, tight black land, and caliche shelf rock. Most of the timber is Live Oak with some Post Oak, Blackjack, and Elm. Smaller shrubs of haw and native plum attract birds and wild game to the area.

 Poyrnors have been identified with the community since some 70 years. Later the family grew and in addition to Ava and Ewell there were Doyle, Era, Ira, Lela Dell, G. W. and Norman.  
 A son B.N. Poyrnor died at the age of 17, burial was at Oakland Cemetery.

Ava attended her first school at Indian Mountain in 1906-07. This was a small two-teacher school, but after the consolidation with Birdville, a new school was built and another teacher added.

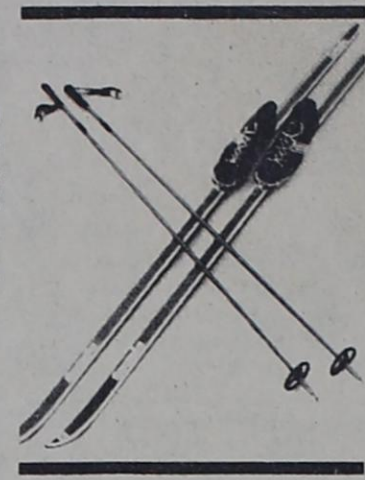
The Poyrnors raised cotton as the chief money crop. They also raised the wheat for their flour as grist mills were still in operation in the county at this time. Ava recalled a Professor La Roque's music school that was held at the school house in the summer months. Her mother attended the school and took piano lessons despite the demands of a busy family. Professor La Roque also taught violin.

Singing schools was another pleasant memory brought to mind. The Poyrnor men were typical Texans and all were "born to the saddle", an attribute that remains true today.

Horsemen naturally turn to the events that challenge their skill, and Ava recalled the death of an uncle, Brackie Poyrnor, who was killed in a roping accident in Comanche. He is buried in Oakwood Cemetery.

Her parents are buried at Oakland Cemetery near Indian Mountain. Today, some 75 years later, the Poyrnor homestead still remains under the Poyrnor name with Norman as the present owner. Doyle also owns extensive properties in the Indian Mountain area. Hence, some move away and are forgotten, but some of the old families remain and a part of today's county history.

Families that have been a part of this community are in this list. Some we recall, and there are many we have



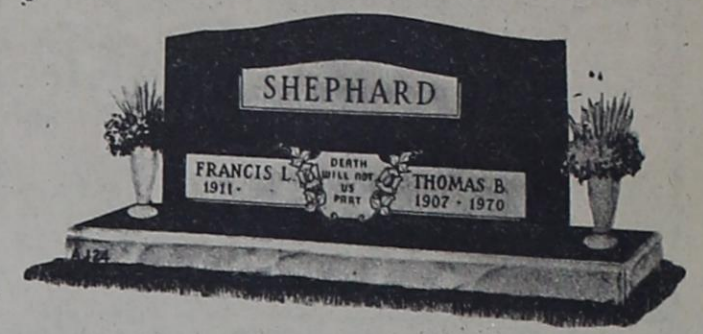

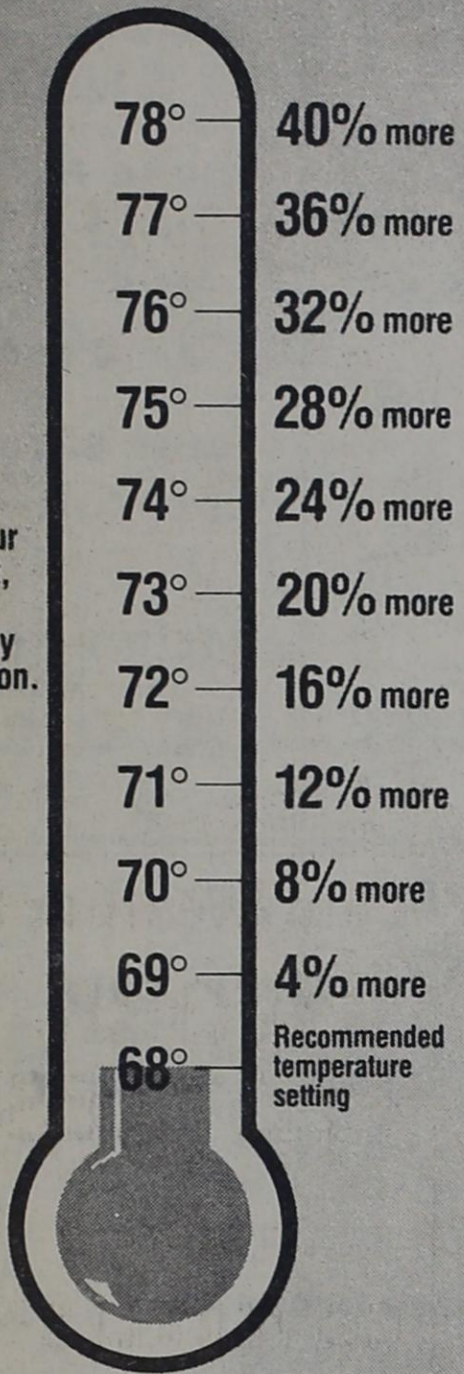

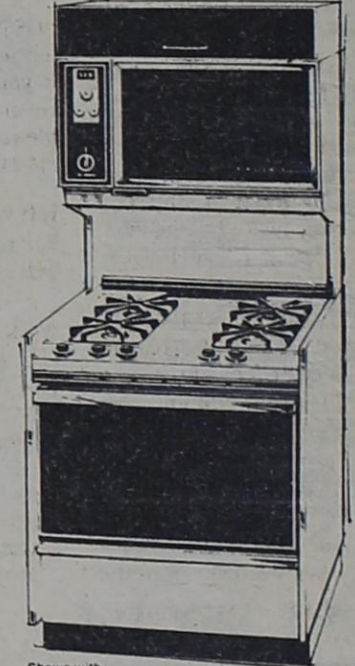
