The new bank building is almost complete in full with the paving getting underway at press time. This is a marvelous addition to the city of Gorman and will really be a very, very fine facility.

This new business will help the farmers move their peanuts into the market.

And just across the highway from the Farmers Peanut Co. facilities, Birdsong Peanuts is nearing completion of even more of their continued expansion program with the new Florunner shelling facility beginning operations. The new shelling facility is now in the process of ironing out the adjustments needed to get the facility in full swing. This is another of the expansion projects of Birdsong Peanuts, which seems to continue to expand week by week, and day by day to make it more convenient for all the peanut farmers of our community and the entire surrounding area to dry and clean their product and for the marketing of their crop.

Also have noticed that we have a new TV repair man in our town. Carl Rye has opened a TV repair shop in a building behind his home on the Desdemona Hwy. just south of the Congregational Methodist Church.

Also one other new business adventure for our own will be Howard Haygood going into the electrical business here. He has moved his family here from Freeport. He has more than 20 years experience in the electrical field.

Among new homes recently completed in our community are the new farm homes of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Carr, Mr. and Mrs. Troyat Underwood, and Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Files.

The menu for the Carbon School Cafeteria for the week of August 25-29 is as follows: Monday - Macaroni and cheese, green beans, lettuce and tomato salad, apple crisp and milk.
