



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understandable when people write to their Congressman and say either directly or indirectly, "What are you guys doing up there?" (Many of us who sit in the middle of it ask the same questions.)

AMONG OTHER REASONS WHY THE CONGRESS, AC-CORDING TO THE POLLS, now rates below the popularity of the President is the availability of the news media and the news interpretation of what is going on. Oftentimes little things are likely to make more news than something big. Anything sensational and out of the ordinary, whether of any great consequence, is likely to receive publicity beyond its importance.

AMONG THE OTHER REA-SONS IS THAT, DURING THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS CONGRESS has attempted to be the "big daddy" to the whole country. It has overly promised and overly spent in effort to cure all the ills and yielding to all demands from Presidents who wanted to go down in history as another great emancipator of something.

THEN THERE ARE ALL THE SPECIAL ORGANIZA-TIONS which have access to means of communication, which grind their own ax for some special cause. Their interest is in one thing and when an action or vote is contrary to their lobbying effort, condemnation is pronounced to all who will read or listen. ABOUT EVERY ORGANI-ZATION RATES THE PER-FORMANCE OF MEMBERS OF CONGRESS. One special group may give a 100 percent to a Member while another will give a zero.

THERE IS NO DOUBT THAT CONGRESS deserves much of the criticisms it gets and will deserve more if we do not get our house in order by controlling needless spending and balancing the budget. The pressures are "do something - do something." - and the one thing that is done most is spend money the Treasury does not ahve.


