

Deedemona Welcomes New Postmaster - David Elliott



Representing approximately 930 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, the junior show will have close to 15,000 entries this year. A variety of animals is shown in the junior and open divisions of livestock competition: market

The four market animal categories (steers, lambs, barrows and poultry) represent animals raised by the exhibitors as food sources. Top animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individual market auctions. Last year, junior market auction sales totaled \$4,636,124.

Ticket prices for the 1998 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo are \$10 and include admission to the horse show (excluding National Cutting Horse Association events), livestock show, carnival, all commercial and educational exhibits, special attractions and the rodeo. first time. We at the Office of the Attorney General want you to understand your rights if you are considering a home equity loan. What the Law Says

Under the new law, the total amount of all liens against your property, including the mortgage, tax liens and home equity loan lien, may not exceed 80 percent of the fair market value of your home. For example, if you own a home worth \$100,000, and you owe \$50,000 on the mortgage, the most you can borrow through a home equity loan is \$30,000. Only one lien securing a home equity loan may be in effect at any given time, and only one such lien may be approved per year.

There is a 3-day cooling off period after you close on the loan.

This means you have three days to change your mind and cancel the loan without paying any fee or penalty. In addition, you must wait 12 days between the time you submit your loan application and the day you close on the loan.

Other safeguards are:

- You can only lose your home by order of a court.
- You and your spouse cannot be held personally liable for the loan, unless you obtain it by
- You can repay the loan in advance without paying a penalty, and your lender cannot force you to repay the loan faster simply because the market value of your home goes down.
- Your lender cannot force you to use the home equity loan to pay off another debt.
- · Lenders cannot use wage garnishment as security for a home equity loan.
- You are not required to sign any form or applications which has blank spaces to be filled in at a later date.

Home Equity Loan Scams

Home equity scams are a growing problem for consumers and law enforcement officials alike. In the most common schemes, a con artist will convince a home owner to take out a home equity loan and invest the cash in a bogus investment, mortgage refinancing offer, home improvement scam, debt consolidation plan, or similar scheme.

Traffic woes continue in most major cities

COLLEGE STATION - Traffic in the nation's largest cities is continuing to stack up, experts say, and few of those cities have been able to make meaningful progress in resolving their congestion problems.

Findings from a 10-year study recently completed by the Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) show that only five major cities have actually improved their traffic congestion levels since 1988, while three have managed to maintain the same levels. Congestion in the remaining 42 cities has increased anywhere from one percent to 31 percent.

"Urban Roadway Congestion - 1982 to 1994" quantified traffic congestion in Texas' largest seven cities along with 43 other urban areas across the nation. TTI researchers Tim Lomax and David Schrank calculate an area's daily volume of travel per lane of freeways and major streets to arrive at a roadway congestion

Since 1988, Salt Lake City and Columbus, Ohio, experienced the greatest congestion growth, while Boston, Houston, Philadelphia, New Orleans and Norfolk, Va., actually saw their congestion levels decrease.

Most of those that either improved or stayed the same did so for one of two reasons - either the city built more freeway lanes and streets to handle the demand. or demand was reduced as a result of an economic downturn.

Archaeologists search for Civil War supply ship

COLLEGE STATION - Researchers from the Institute of Nautical Archaeology at Texas A&M University are wading into history in search of one of the most successful blockade runners of the Civil

A team of nautical archaeologists from the Texas A&M-based INA is trying to locate the wreck of the blockade runner Denbigh, destroyed by Union naval vessels off Bolivar Point in 1865.

The scouting trip is the first of what INA officials hope will be a series of shipwreck investigations in Texas rivers and in Texas waters in the Gulf of Mexico. As many as 2,200 shipwrecks can be found in Texas rivers and coastal waters, says J. Barto Arnold, INA director of Texas operations.

"There are Texas Navy ships from the Republic period, river steamboats and three big Civil War blockade runners." Arnold says. "One of the ships from the 1554 Spanish treasure fleet is near Point Mansfield Pass."

"Very little work has been done on any of these wrecks," he notes.

The Denbigh, a 182-foot-long converted merchant vessel, was one of the most successful blockade runners of the war. It made 33 successful runs from Havana, Cuba, to Mobile, Ala., and Galveston before it ran aground near Bolivar Point the night of May 23, 1865, while trying to enter Galveston Bay. Union naval vessels blockading Galveston shelled and destroyed the Denbigh the next day, Arnold says.

"The odds of finding it are pretty good," Arnold says. "The map references are relatively recent and they were made by engineers who should have known what they were


