AS POINTED OUT BY THE WRITER, VERMONT ROYS-TER, THIS PRINCIPLE HAS a Constitutional background going back to Thomas Jefferson.

"TO COMPEL A MAN TO FURNISH CONTRIBUTIONS OF MONEY FOR THE PRO-PAGATION of opinions which he disbelieves and abhors," wrote Jefferson, "is sinful and tyrannical." In this connection, Jefferson was speaking of religious opinions which in 1786 were often closely entwined with political opinions. Among many people at that time was a strong sentiment for the support of religion out of the public Treasury.

Southeastern area: Product ers - D. H. Harden, Camilla, Ga., and W. G. Miller, Monticella, Fla.; Handlers - Thomas J. Chandler, Dawson, Ga., and H. E. Anderson, Atlanta, Ga.

Virginia-Carolina area: Producers - S. Womack Lee, Franklin, Va., and G. E. Fisher, Pendleton, N. C.; aHndlers - George Y. Birdsong, Suffolk, Va., and J. M. Kilpatrick, Jr., Windsor, N. C. Seven of the new appointed persons are now serving on the Committee, either as mem bers or as alternate members. The 18-member committee recommends regulations to apply under the federal peanut marketing agreement.
