

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16,830,000,000 Pages! That's Fantastic!

By Clarence Duncan Three huge web offset presses work full time in printing The Living Bible in Versailles, Ky., Kingsport, Tenn., and Taunton, Mass. Already the 16½-million Bibles which have rolled off these presses have consumed a quantity of paper which, when loaded into railroad box cars, would stretch for six miles. That's 38,744,800 pounds of paper packed in 472 box cars.

Even the 15-inch binding cloth in each Bible, rolled out end to end, would reach from Washington, D.C., to Salt Lake City Utah... or 1,762

miles in any direction. While aside from the actual message contained in each Living Bible, the ink used in printing these words has no meaning, the 311,000 pounds of the black stuff would fill six railroad tank cars . . . or a 35,000 gallon

olympic swimming pool.

The pages of each of the Bibles are bound to the spine by a high strength nylon thread. Someone has figured that the amount of the thread used to produce the books would wrap around the earth's equator three and one half times. Or, if so inclined, one could fly a kite two-fifths of the way to the moon on this 97,462 miles

of thread. Each Bible has a cover board in front and in back. These are 5½ by 8¾ inches, and the quantity used thus far if they could be stacked so high, would reach 151 miles in the air. This is the distance between London, England, and Paris, France.

Much time is invloved in the production of The Living Bible. So far, the presses have run 7,900 man hours, or four years of 40-hour work weeks for one person, with a two week vacation each year thrown in for good

It takes that long to print 16,830,000,000 (16 billion-830 million) pages of Living

Nearly 17 million copies of The Living Bible have been sold since this paraphrased version by Dr. Kenneth N. Taylor was issued just after Thanksgiving in 1971. There is no way to measure the spiritual impact of this Bible in the idiom of the day, except to say it has been fantastic.

Sales of The Living Bible could have made Dr. Taylor a wealthy man, but they haven't. Every cent of the royalties from these Bibles goes into a foundation which underwrites the paraphrasing of the Bible in over 100 languages other than English.

When this task is completed, approximately 93 percent of the world's population will be able to read the Bible in a contemporary version of its own native

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


