Pecan Tour Slated Here October 10

A pecan tour of three orchards in the Ranger and Gorman area is planned for Friday, October 10. Eastland County Pecan Growers Association President, Dan Childress says the three orchards to be toured include the Freeman orchard now owned by Stan Weeks, B. J. Dennis' orchard and Charlie Underwood's orchard.

The tour will begin at the Freeman orchard, ten miles south of Ranger on farm road 571. Signs will direct visitors to the orchard. The tour begins at 9:30 a. m. A pecan cleaner will be demonstrated and other pecan equipment will be on display. Visitors will see most of the new pecan varieties in this orchard.

County Agent De Gordon announces that two Extension Service Specialists, Dr. Earl Puls and Dr. Thomas Lee, will be on the tour to discuss pecan management with growers and answer questions. After lunch in Gorman, the visitors will see the Dennis and Underwood orchards. Both of these orchards are located at the edge of Gorman.

Gordon says all three orchards have excellent crops and show the results of good pecan management. Childress invites everyone interested in pecan production to attend the fall tour. He says there will be interesting and informative things to see at each visit.

The tour is being sponsored by the growers association and the Agricultural Extension Service.

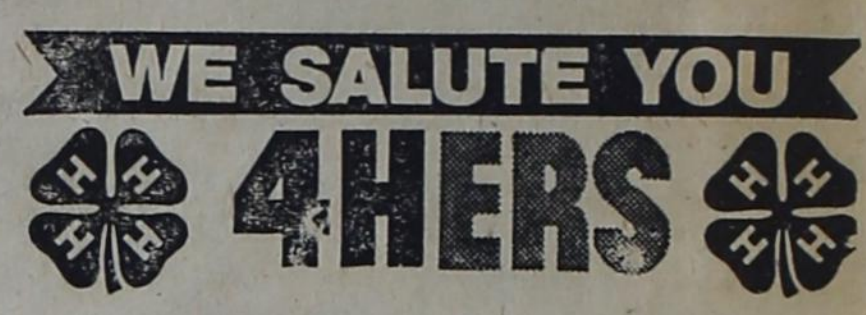

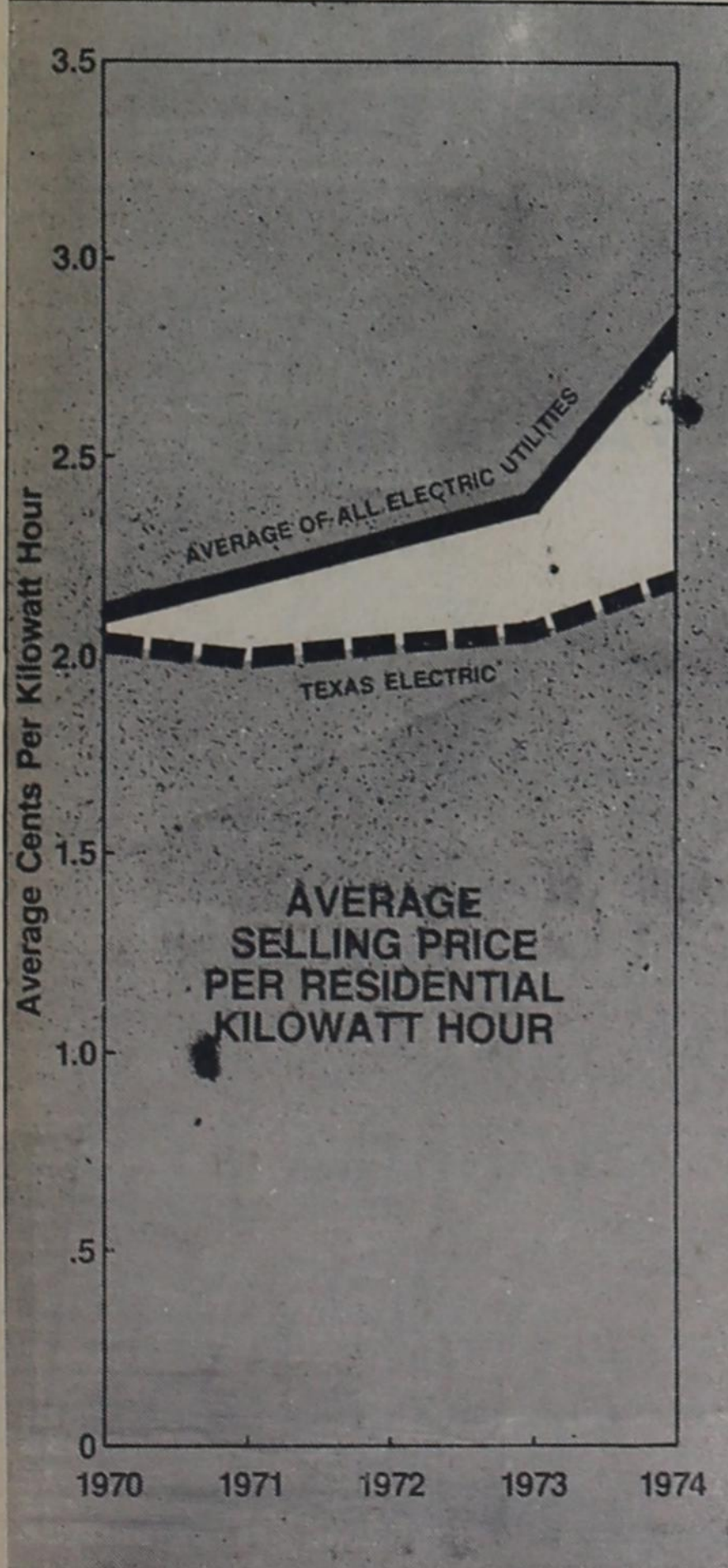

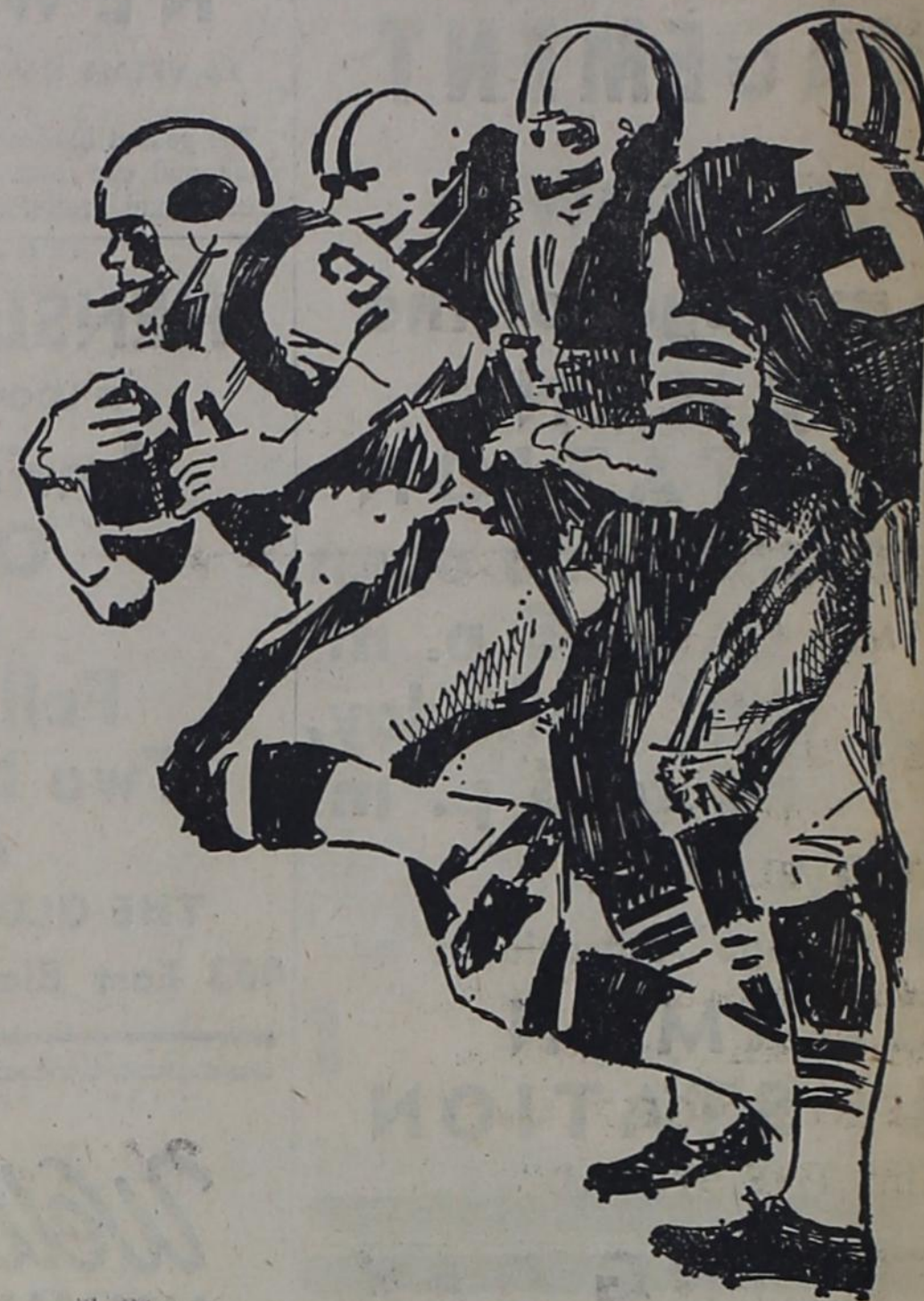

**Recruiting For
 DPS Academy
 Now Underway**

MIDLAND — Major E. K. Browning, Jr., Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety's 49 County West Texas Region, announced recently that an intensive effort is being made to recruit men and women for a school to begin at the Department's Academy in Austin, October 28, 1975.

Major Browning said he Department has been successful in recruiting persons from minority groups to the position of Patrolman. Efforts to recruit for these groups are continuing for this school.

All persons making application for the position of Patrolman must be between 20 and 35 years of age, weight proportionate to height, and visual acuity no worse than 20/40 correctable to 20/20. A person must be of good moral character, excellent physical condition and must have a minimum of 60 semester hours of college credit.

Persons selected as recruits will be assigned to Austin for an 18-week training school beginning October 28, 1975, at the Homer Garrison, Jr. Law Enforcement Academy. Successful graduates will be assigned to either the Highway Patrol Service, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, or the Driver License Service, according to the needs of the DPS and consideration of personal preference.

The salary during training will be \$768 per month. Room and board while at the Academy will be approximately \$60 per month.

When a person is commissioned as a Patrolman, his salary will increase to \$876 per month. Patrolman also receive longevity pay after one year of service, a monthly uniform

allowance and travel expenses when away from their home stations.

Recruits must furnish their own uniforms which consist of khaki shirts and pants, black shoes, belt and tie. When commissioned as a Patrolman, uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition and related equipment are furnished.

Group life and hospitalization are paid for the employee and dependent coverage is available at reasonable rates. Patrolmen participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, as well as Social Security. Vacation, holidays and sick leave are provided.

Browning said interested men and women should contact any DPS officer or Patrolman for an application. After completing the application, it should be presented to the DPS office either in Midland, Abilene, San Angelo or El Paso for the examinations.

Browning urged persons interested in attending the October 28th school to contact the Department immediately.

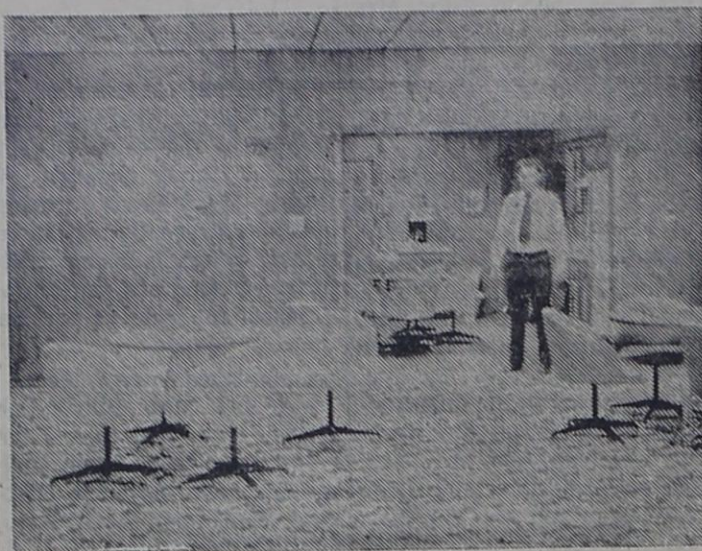

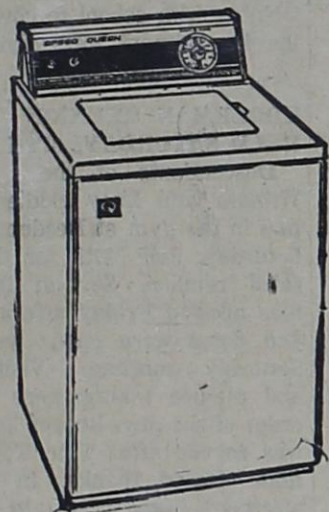
