



Issue: St. Jude's Ranch for Children Residential Treatment Center Level of Care Definition-Level V

Severe problems, unable to function in multiple areas. Sometimes willing to cooperate when prompted or instructed, but may lack motivation or ability to participate in personal care or social activities or is severely impaired in reality testing or communications. May exhibit persistent or unpredictable aggression, be markedly withdrawn and isolated due to either mood or thought disturbance, or make suicidal attempts. Presents a moderate to severe risk of causing harm to self or to others. Requires 24 hour supervision by multiple staff in limited access setting.

These children (boys) will be in our school. They will be 8 to 12 years old in the beginning, then up to 17 years later. They will remain at the treatment center for 12 months then go in to Foster care, probably in our community. The population of the center will grow to 60 in 5 years but remember each

group will be coming out in 1 year. There is much information to share with you and we can stop this if we wish. There is a law to protect small communities like ours.

EASTLAND - The number of cases of hepatitis A in Eastland County is steadily climbing, with Gorman reporting cases for the first

County physicians have reported 41 cases, said Brad Walsh of the Texas Department of Health office in Arlington. Four cases reported in orman marks a first for that city, e said.

Normal for Eastland County is about three cases per year, Walsh

The 41 reported cases include 15 in Ranger, 10 in Eastland, nine in Cisco, and one each in Strawn, Gordon and De Leon.

Most patients are young adults, but two elderly people in Cisco have been diagnosed, and that is puzzling, Walsh said. He said there may not be a common source of infection for about two-thirds of the cases.

About one-third of the cases can be traced to drug users sharing needles, he said.

Stephens County counted about 50 cases of hepatitis last year most of them in Breckenridge and no common denominator was ever found, he said.

Most of those cases developed about a month after Labor Day, when numerous family gatherings were held, he noted. Still, the liver disease could not be traced to any one source.

Walsh said food service workers in Eastland County have not been checked because of the expense.

If a worker is diagnosed, others exposed to that person are given injections of gamma globulin to boost their immunity for several weeks, he explained.

Day care facilities in the county are doing a good job, he noted, because no young children have been diagnosed.

One nursing home had two infected workers, and steps were taken to protect the residents.

The outbreak has kept Eastland Hospital Memorial Administrator John Yeary said 38 hepatitis patients have been admitted since March 31.

Several more cases of hepatitis B and C have been found as well, but Yeary said he thinks that is attributable to more testing being done.

Forty cases among a county population of about 15,000 doesn't sound like many, but it is nearly 14 times the county's average for a whole year, Walsh said.

He said he wishes some nonprofit ganization would underwrite the cost of offering hepatitis vaccine to everyone in the county.

n about a month, the vaccine ld kick in and hepatitis would end," he said.

Because getting the shots would be voluntary, some people most likely to carry the disease wouldn't. come forward, he admitted.

Cleanliness is the best defense against hepatitis.

Because the disease is transmitted by fecal matter, washing hands after using the bathroom is critical, Walsh said.







the "Courthouse Smart Start" program. The Southwest Office of the National Trust, through a generous donation by the Meadows Foundation and in partnership with the Texas Historical Commission and Preservation Texas, established the Smart Start planning grant to be awarded to twelve select Texas counties in anticipation of teh Governor's Texas Courthouse Initiative. This legislation will provide an estimated \$50 million in matching grants to be used by Texas communities to repair and restore their historic courthouses. It is hoped that the twelved counties that have secured a basic preservation plan with their Smart Start grant will be better positioned to apply for and receive funding from the state. The plan is to be completed by September 1, 1999.

Devlin Shelton of the Texas Historical Commission will be inspecting the courthouse along with Wade Ellison of Wharry Engineering, the firm hired by Eastland County to prepare the plan. Shelton and Ellison will be conducting a comprehensive assessment of various elements of the courthouse including teh building's structure and foundation: electrical and plumbing systems; fire safety issues; compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act; landscaping; and the condition of other memorials or statues on the site. Jeff Tully of the Ntional Trust will also be on hand to answer questions about the Smart Start grant and the Texas Courthouse Initiative. 
