



The 1974 peanut program differs from the 1973 program in that (1) peanuts found to contain visible aspergillus flavus mold will be ineligible for support, (2) the charges assumed by producers for storage, handling and inspection will be increased from \$15 to \$17 per ton, and (3) CCC's minimum sales policy for diversion sales will be 100 percent of the loan level.


