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
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
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

Peanut harvest is in the final stages here in Eastland County. Harvest activities will be completed earlier than usual. Harvest for the state was 86 percent complete on Oct. 28, as compared to 57 percent last year at his time.

While many peanut producers are harvesting good yields: many have been discouraged over the number of segregation III peanuts going to market. There is no support price on segregation III peanuts and the farmers are really taking a loss.

Peanuts are designated seg-III when a fungus growth called Aspergillus flavus is found in the sample.
