Mr. Campbell was a member of Highland Home Baptist Church.

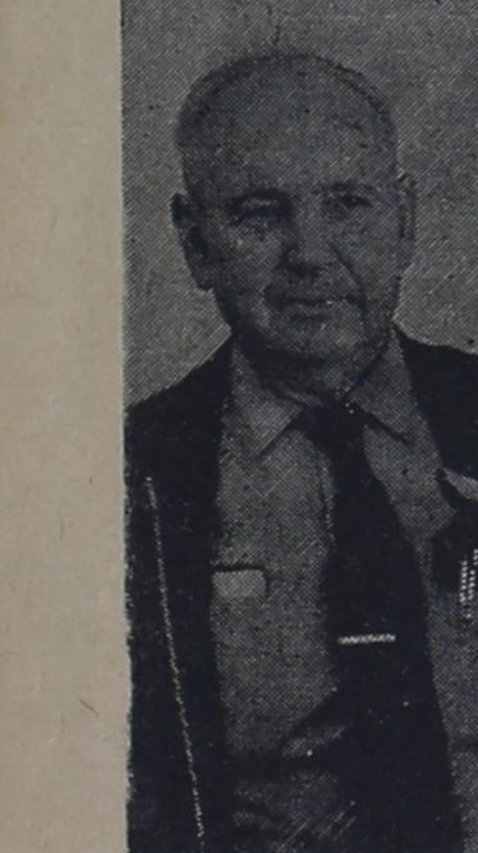

The club will take three cakes and two pies to be sold. Kokomo Club's time to work will be Saturday morning 9 to 11.

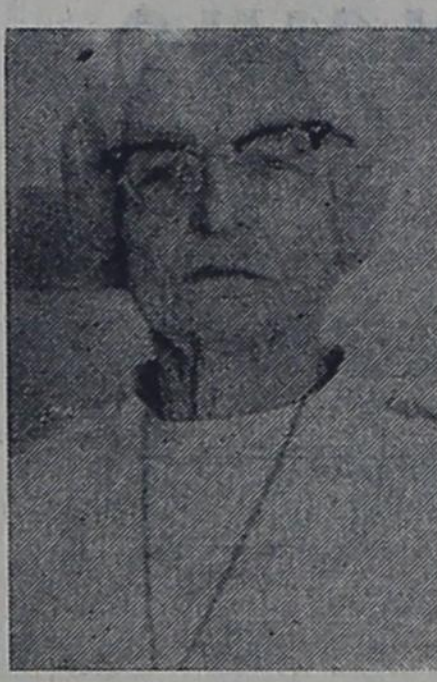
Mrs. Delmon Eaves gave a very informative program, "The Metrics Are Coming."

Panthers Win Zone Championship; Play Meridian at De Leon Saturday

7:30 P. M. AT DE LEON The Gorman Panthers won the District 6-B West Zone Championship with their win over Richland Springs here last Friday night by the score of 47-6 to remain undefeated in zone play.

The Panthers will advance to the District 6-B Title Playoff this Saturday night at De Leon against the Meridian Yellowjackets, winner of the East Zone Title with their Saturday victory over the Valley Mills Eagles.

The mutual sight was agreed upon following the Meridian game Saturday afternoon and De Leon Bearcat Stadium was chosen as the location, and Saturday night at 7:30 p. m. was the time.

The Yellowjackets have a very fine ball club this year with a total of 11 seniors on their 46 man squad. They had little trouble in their zone. Their defense is real tough and are expected to give the Panthers their toughest competition since the first game of the season with De Leon.

The Panthers have a real fine ball club with a defense that has allowed only 67 points this season, and a fast scoring offense which has scored a total of 340 points. The Panthers are led by the best one-two punch in running backs in the whole area in Billy Burgess and James Webb, who have thrilled the fans this year with their fine running styles.

We look for a marvelous battle Saturday night at 7:30 at De Leon, and if the Panthers continue to perform as they have in their last nine games, they should come out of the battle with the District 6-B Title.

The Panthers were ready for action Friday night when they met the Coyotes for the

final game in West Zone play in 6-B. The Big Red scored on their first possession with James Webb getting the final yard for the tally with 8:18 left in the first period. Webb had set up the score with a 33 yard run to the 1 yard line. This drive covered 51 yards in 5 plays. The run for points failed and the score was 6-0.

The Panthers scored again with 3:15 left in the first period on a marvelous 51 yard scamper by James Webb. This drive covered 55 yards in only 2 plays. The pass try for 2 points failed and the score rose to 12-0.

Richland Springs then came on with their only scoring drive on the night, going 77 yards in 18 plays with the help of a Panther 15 yard penalty and pass interference call, both on 4th down tries. Jerry Willborn got the final yard on a running play with 6:37 left in the second period. The kick for point failed and the score was 12-6.

The Panthers roared right back on their next possession going 56 yards in two plays, with Webb rambling for 56 yards following a Panther penalty, for the tally with 5:45 left in the half. A pass try for points failed and the Big Red led 18-6.

The Big Red defense held the Coyotes on their next possession and gave the Panther offense the ball on the Coyote 46. The Panthers scored in 8 plays with Robert Lewis getting the final yard

up the middle with 1:09 left in the half. The try for two points failed and the half-time score stood at 24-6, Gorman. On their first possession following intermission, the Big Red offense went 80 yards in only 4 plays with Billy Burgess thrilling the Panther fans with a beautiful 35 yard scamper for the tally with 10:58 left in the third. Burgess then added the 2 pointer on a run and the score rose to 32-6.

Gorman scored again with 4:24 left in the third period when Burgess rambled for 29 yards for the score to finish a 71 yard drive in 5 plays. A run for points failed and the score was 38-6.

The Panther reserves got the final tally of the night going 62 yards in 5 plays with Robert Lewis scoring from 3 yards out on a run with 9:50 left in the fourth. Stacy Webb kicked the PAT and Gorman led 45-6.

The final two points for the Big Red came on a defensive play when Randy Barnes hit Coyote QB Robert Burleson in the end zone for a safety, and th final score read 47-6. We had reported earlier that Bobby Jay was the tackler, but the initial hit was by Randy Barnes.

Our office is still going strong. Doc has been on vacation and a long rest. Tater is as honery as usual. Lover Boy got the works at the barber shop Friday. We won every game afterwards. Gassy Jack is counting his money.

Luke and his bad neighbor are a quiet pair. Bud is so happy as Speck is back. So Bud started eating him out Friday. Ott was out Friday, though he is not too spry yet. Pepper Clyde was out some. Tester was on the go very strong. Floyd and Uncle Sam are still clowning.

Slim Pickens was with us also.

The "Reaper" has called some more to their final resting place. Mrs. Lou Lasater, Mrs. Lonzo Melton, Arthur Cribbs, a lady that passed away at the hospital, and a man was buried here Saturday. He died in Odessa. Our sympathy goes out to the bereaved. Remember some ones name is on the next page of time.

I remember about this time of year in 1917 I was at Ft. Sill, working as a Quarter Master Baker. We worked 11 hours one day and seventeen hours the next, six days a week for five weeks at \$30

per month, less deducts. I remember at Christmas time 1917 we had a Jew Sergeant that had a cedar Christmas Tree in his tent. It caught on fire from candles on the tree. He yelled "Fire!" The water barrels were near in case of fire. A man got a bucket and broke the ice, then got his bucket full of water. He told the second man to get his bucket full of water.

The first man said "I will get Sammy. You get the Fire." It worked. I was about 25 steps away when it happened about 9 p. m. You see, Sammy undressed, ready for bed. That ice water really cooled him off. Everyone enjoyed picking on Sammy.

I also remember Nov. 11th. I was at the Post baking then. Just across the driveway was the Guard House. We were working in the bakery. All at once a lot of yelling and hollering was heard at the Guard House. We thought that a jail break was going on. They were yelling "the war is over. We are going home now." I remember hearing a guard saying "you are not going anywhere!"

That night everybody got a pass to town, Lawton. That was a wild town that night. Drinking and shooting pistols and shotguns. Every civilian nearly had a gun. They were so reckless that I got scared and went back to camp by 10 p. m.

We were about six miles from Lawton and could ride the street car for 10c or one dozen tickets for a dollar. The thing would be loaded so at times that you had to stand on boards outside and hold to ropes.

I was with two companies, but each time I was held back. Due to an appendix operation and the side affects from it. I was very fortunate to be with boys from Texas until in Oct. 1918. Then I was put in with the dredge of humanity, or about half of them were. Many were foreigners
