





In the early part of 1917, I sent two boys out to cut and bring in some wood. It was snowing some at the time. All at once a rock about the size of a baseball hit the roof. When they came in, I asked what happened. One of the boys said "I threw a rock at a snow bird." I asked him if he hit it. He said, "The rock just barely touched him."

Three of the boys that were in trouble the first week of school were in a gang of young men or boys that round ed up 25 registered Hereford bulls that the rancher they had trouble with. The bull vearlings were gentle. So they took their lariats and made a pen. They made 24 steers out of those bulls. So you can see the kind of boys I had in that little school. That rancher had just 13,000 acres of pasture. It was bordered on the north by the San Saba River. We went to the river one Sunday for a picnic. They showed me a hole in the north side of the river in a thirtyfoot bluff. A person could cram in that hole. The bees were a solid stream going in and out. I did not have any desire to explore it though. On the ground just above that cave was a bumble bee nest. I would swear it was at least twenty feet square. They had holes all through that space and bees going and coming.

The boys and girls in that community learned to ride before they learned to walk. They used little mexican ponies or at least that is what they called them.

invention eliminated the plug, using instead the principle of syphoning to move water upwards in the tank and into a flush pipe, from where it cascaded down into the bowl.


Crapper's principle is still used in England, but his idea was never adopted in America, probably because the device was complicated and cumbersome. It was more than 100 years later before this country finally tackled the leaky toilet.

Today, inventor Adolf Schoepe, head of the Fluidmaster Company, Anaheim, Calif., has another—and many believe a

better—answer.

But instead of going to a new principle as Crapper has, done, Schoepe perfected the old one—redesigning the basic flush valve stopper.

Schoepa developed a stop costly water from non-corrosive vinyl



Crapper's ingenious flapper-style plug. By design, it cannot become misaligned with the drain since it is rigidly hinged to it. For installation, a stainless steel replacement seat is cemented directly on top of the old drain pipe, using a newly developed sealant which actually uses

water as a catalyst in curing. Called the Flusher Fixer Kit, it can be installed without tools and without removing the tank from the toilet. It even replaces the old lift wires with a stainless steel ball chain which can't catch, kink or cause leakage.
