

Eastland County Commissioner's Court also issued an emergency order effective immediately, which prohibits any open burning in the unincorporated areas of Eastland County except the burning of combustible material in approved enclosures, such as trash barrels and charcoal grills which are designed to contain all flames and embers.

Due to dry conditions, and the lack of significant rainfall, all persons are advised that any open burning is extremely likely to cause very dangerous wildfire, posing risks to lives and property.






GORMAN DEPOT - Dr. A.J. Gray and Family and Gilford Gray and Family are shown in front of the Gorman Depot in the 1890's.

Sharing with Brother Bob

What a storm Tuesday night the 26th. My friends at Heritage Manor were still talking about it Wednesday afternoon. There was thunder from the east. If that wasn't scary enough, S.D. Gilmore saw hail as big as hen's eggs. And dark! When the power went off and the low clouds blocked the moon and star light, it was dark.

Ann Bassham had a radio on and heard a report that the winds got up to 50 mph. It rained in some windows at the manor but didn't do much else except wake up most of my friends there. All of them except Veno Hale. She said she slept right thru everything.

I asked what they remembered having to do as kids to clean up after a storm. A.V. Seay remembers sawing limbs and raking twigs. That and cleaning all the trash out of the eight wire fence back of the house. S.D. Gilmore remembers burning. Cynthia Earles remembers sawing up "blown over" trees.

We got to talking about storm cellars so I asked for details. A.V. Seay remembers her husband got tired of always having to walk to the neighbors cellar so he finally dug one. Concrete steps went down into a poured concrete floor. The walls were concrete blocks but the roof was poured concrete. The door was tin over a wood frame. The door had a counterweight to make it easy to open and a chain (that hooked to an eye bolt set in the concrete floor) to keep it shut. Ann Bassham remembers all the welders in her family getting together and building a metal cellar. They even welded in seats. Veno Hale's family had to dig thru rocks so they reused them to make seats. Ollie Halcomb remembers being more afraid of the cellar than the storms. Velma Bennett, besides remembering a big fish found i the middle of the yard after a storm, remembers a cellar with a split log roof, covered with dirt, and an air pipe sticking up kinda' crooked. A relative, Lee Reynolds, opened the cellar door during a storm to peek out and got sucked away. They found him later in a pile of brush with his head crushed. He was still alive and the doctors managed to save him by putting a silver plate in his head and he did okay. Their cellar had a plank door with a chain that hooked to a steak driven into the dirt. She remembers times her father had to help hold the chain.

Other items kept in the cellar were: lanterns, iron beds or cots, water in old whiskey jugs, a pick axe and shovel (in case of cave ins) canned goods in jars and pot plants (in the winter time).


I asked if fruit was the only food that got canned. That led to a discussion about "puttin' up hogs."


The hog was scalded and scrubbed down with boiling water. That removed all the hair. The skin was left on. The hams, ribs and bacon were cured in a smokehouse. The smokehouse didn't necessarily have a fire. Sometimes "sugar cure" was used. If there was a fire, it was small and made from corn cobs, wood chips or even cow chips. Usually though, when you "put up a hog," the weather had cooled off enough to keep meat by just hanging it (in the safety of the smoke [less] house).

Most of the hog was used. From pickling the feet to rendering the lard (boiling the lard out of the fat). The cracklin's, left over from the rendering, were crumpled up and added to cornbread. The heart, liver and "lites" (lungs and other eatable organs) were made into stew.

Some pork was stored in salt (salt pork) in a box or barrel, but most was made into sausage. Sausage was ground by hand. The tenderloin made the best. Sometimes venison was added. Sometimes other wild game was added but nobody would tell me exactly what and some kinda looked at the floor (squirrel? goat? 'possem?). Anyway, the sausage was ground and lightly (several of my friends strongly emphasized this so at one time somebody must have put in way too much) seasoned with sage, salt and pepper. Some used a pre-mix seasoning. Then the sausage was stuffed. Unlike other parts of Texas I've studied, the typical casings weren't used. The raw sausage was stored in one of two ways. The first way was to cook it in patties, and then put it in layers in a large, deep pot (as it cooled), covering each layer with grease. The other way was to sew long, small diameter bags using the cloth from flour sacks. These were stuffed with the raw sausage and hung in the smoke (less) house. The bag could be rolled back and sausage patties sliced off as needed. After I heard this, I could vagely remember seeing (as a kid) cloth tubes of sausage in the grocery store. I can't help but wonder sometimes if it would help "problem" kids to be sent to work on a farm where everything was done by hand like in the "olden days." Most kids back then were too busy working to get into (serious) trouble (except kids like S.D. G. and Jack B., if they couldn't find trouble to get into, they would start some). Till next time, Brother Bob
