Pecan Field Day Slated October 2

Modern pecan harvesting equipment will be demonstrated at the fall pecan field day in Eastland County October 2. The field day will be held in an orchard at Scranton, located on Farm Market Road 1864 in the west part of Eastland County. Anton White, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, said the orchard is commonly known as the Silton orchard, but is owned by a group of businessmen in Abilene and managed by Dale Carlile of Cisco.

White said visitors interested in attending the field day may meet at the Spot Restaurant in Cisco at 8:30 a. m. and will then move to the orchard at Scranton. The tour of the 1400 tree orchard will begin about 9:15 a. m. Trailers will be available to take visitors through the large orchard.

White reported that Extension Service Specialist will be available to discuss and answer questions concerning pecan production. These specialists will include Dr. J. W. Worthington, Horticulturist; Dr. Jerral D. Johnson, Plant Pathologist; Dr. Clifford E. Hoelscher, Entomologist; and Tom Denman, Experiment Station Horticulturist.

The Lockwood Corporation and the Bowie Industries will have pecan shakers and harvesters available for demonstrations. Several kinds of power sprayers will also be demonstrated.

White said there will be a catered lunch at the Nimrod Community Center at noon. Harvesting and spraying equipment will be demonstrated in the orchard after lunch.

The field day is being sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. White invited everyone interested in pecans to attend.

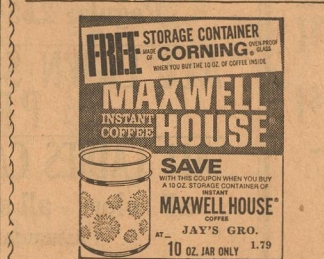
