HIRING THE HANDICAPPED

MESSAGE-Because I am physicially handicapped (partial paralysis of the hands and legs) I have found it almost impossible to gain employment, in spite of an excellent record in college. I once found some temporary work through the Texas Rehabilitation Commission but that ended months ago.

Recently, I took a U.S. Civil Service examination in hopes that I might qualify for a job as a bilingual telephone counselor at a government agency. I am fluent in Spanish and my Master's Degree seemed to definitely qualify me for such work. I was thrilled when I received a letter asking if I was available for the job. I was interviewed in Spanish and offered the job, which I enthusiastically accepted. I was told to report to work in two weeks. A few days later, however, I was called and told that I could not be hired because my college grade point average was 3.49 instead of the required 3.50. Needless to say, I was bitterly disappointed. This job was the first ray of hope I have ever had to use my education and ability in Spanish. Please check into this and see if there is any way that I might still be able to get this job. K.J .-Houston

SENATOR BENTSEN RESPONDS-There is a way! Officials at the Office of Personnel Management (formerly the Civil Service Commission) advise me that they are impressed enough with your abilities to request that you be approved as an excepted appointment, which is available to applicants who are handicapped. You meet the qualifying criteria under this special appointive category and you should be going to work soon as a bilingual counselor. Congratulations and good luck in your new job.

#### NO MILITARY RETIREMENT

MESSAGE-I have completed nearly 26 years of military service in the United States Army Reserve. I was recently shocked to learn that I will not be eligible for retired pay at age 60 because I had no active duty during a time of war. I was never told that active duty during a war period was required for retirement pay. When my unit was called to active duty in 1940, I was advised to remain on the farm as that was a critical occupation.

I heard that another retired reservist who is in the same situation won a court case and will be getting his retirement check soon. I think that I am entitled to a pension too and would appreciate anything that you can do to help in this matter. R.M.-Bryan

SENATOR BENTSEN RESPONDS—It is true that a retired reservist won a court case regarding denial of his pension but the Supreme Court, on April 4, 1977, reversed that lower court decision. According to officials at the Department of the Army the law specifically states that, to qualify for such a pension, an individual who was a member of a reserve unit before August 16, 1945 must have served on extended active duty during World War I, World War II or the Korean Conflict. Unfortunately, in spite of your years of service in the National Guard, you fail to meet the wartime service requirement and are not eligible for retirement pay.



AUSTIN (AP) - If the Legislature cooperates, Texans will be filling their cars with a mix of gasoline and energy-efficient alcohol within a year, Agriculture Commissioner

Reagan Brown said Monday. A mixture of 10 percent grain-derived alcohol - called gasohol - and 90 percent gasoline give 5 percent better mileage than pure gasoline, Brown told a news conference.

"We have no resistance in Texas by the major oil companies (to gasohol development)," he said. "We've got the know-how, the products and the will.'

Several bills are before the Legislature that Brown said would aid gasohol devel-


