A QUICK READ OF THE NEWS

'Love' virus hits Southwest

The so-called "love bug" computer virus had reached into the heart of the Southwest by Thursday and brought down the computers in New Mexico's Highway and Transportation Department.

Officials were saying by Friday that the damage worldwide amounted to many hundreds of millions of dollars and might reach a billion this week and eventually cost \$10 billion.

USA Today and other national media reported Friday that the FBI and authorities in the Philippines were investigating leads suggesting the "ILOVEYOU" virus originated in Manila.

Some reports indicated the virus had been traced to a 23-year-old man.

Among the data were clues embedded in the virus' program code and information from an Internet service provider.

The FBI also had expanded its probe to include the new variations of the virus, including "Very Funny" and "Mother's Day" — either copycat viruses or new work by the original author.

The new variations arrived Friday just as public and private sector e-mail users were licking their wounds from Thursday's "love bug" attack. The "Very Funny" virus arrives masquerading as a joke and is activated by opening the attachment.

In another twist, a message with the subject "Mother's Day" tells recipients the sender has just received an order for \$392 worth of diamonds for delivery on Mother's Day, and instructs them to download the attached bill.

Launching the "bill" triggers the virus.

Security experts are scrambling to keep up with the new versions, which in many cases are slipping past anti-virus software.

Mother gets life sentence in death of 3-year-old

A Muleshoe jury deliberated only about two hours Thursday before sentencing 20-year-old Leticia Hernández to life imprisonment in the death last year of her 3-year-old son, Jesús Angel Haro.

The sentence was the most severe that could be imposed in the capital murder case (the death penalty had been waived).

In Thursday's testimony, nursing consultant Lisa De Hoyos of Lubbock read from University Medical Center records that indicated irregularities in the care given to the toddler.

By their verdict, jury members indicated that they discounted the datacited from the hospital records. In his charge to the jury, Judge Gordon Green had stated that jurors could not find the defendant guilty of such a serious charge "if you believe that the conduct of a third party was sufficient to cause the death."

Defense attorney Bryan Johnston of Friona had called De Hoyos and

Dr. Lloyd White, the medical examiner for Nueces County (Corpus Christi), in an attempt to convince the jury that the boy's death was linked to the treatment. he received after being transferred to the Lubbock hospital.

Three doctors expressed opinions indicating that the boy's burns were not life-threatening in and of themselves. White went so far as to say that some things that happened to the boy during his treatment would have been sufficient to jeopardize his life even if no burns had


been present.

District Attorney Johnny Actkinson emphasized in closing remarks that Hernández and her boyfriend, Roberto Contreras (who pled guilty to manslaughter in connection with the boy's death) passed up several hospitals in order to take the burned boy to a clinic in Ciudad Juárez, Mexico. The clinic reportedly is owned by a relative of Contreras.

Expert witnesses testified that

Appeals court overturns ruling in Friona athlete's case

Texas' Seventh Court of Appeals has overturned a local court ruling that allowed a Friona High School student to play baseball despite the fact that he violated the school district's policy on alcohol.

District Judge Gordon Green had issued a temporary injunction allowing Nathan King to play baseball until the legal status of the ban on alcohol use could be determined.

The Court of Appeals' ruling was handed down on the day of Friona's last regular-season baseball game, but school officials let King go ahead and play in the last regular season game. His parents had said that the season might be his last chance to play baseball, and that not able to play his senior year might cost him a scholarship.

The appeals court ruled that the decision on letting King play should have been left with the district and that Green exceeded his authority by agreeing to hear the case.

"Schools are to be operated by school administrators," the court's ruling states. "And, before a trial court can interfere with an administrator's authority and decisions via injunctions, more is needed to demonstrate imminent harm that that appearing in the record before us."

King and his parents, D.T. and Cynthia King, first appealed the administration's ruling to the school board, but filed the lawsuit after the school board upheld administrators' decision to bar the younger King after he was cited for being a minor in possession of alcohol.

Hutton takes position as principal at Texico

Hutton said he was influenced in accepting the job by being immediately impressed with R.L. Richards, the Texico superintendent.

"He's a common-sense, down-to-earth administrator who cares about kids," Hutton said. "I'm impressed with the moral character of not only the administration but the board members as well."

But in discussing the move, Hutton again discussed emotionally his attachment to Muleshoe

the delay in hospitalization certainly would have caused deterioration in the boy's condi-

After two days at the Juárez clinic, he was transferred to a hospital in El Paso and then to the Lubbock facility

On his arrival there, he was described as lucid and cooperative with examining medical personnel. According to the hospital records cited by De Hoyos, his condition steadily worsened and he died eight days after the May 1 scalding.





The Tongue Is a Powerful and **Often Fiery Instrument**

Ah, the tongue. 'Tis a powerful instrument indeed, as the Apostle James sternly warns us in the New Testament book which bears his name (James 3:1-12).

James points to the incongruity of the fact that with this same instrument we can both praise the Lord and curse our neighbors. Strange, he comments, that out of the same spring can flow both fresh and salt water. Odd, he

observes, and unnatural, that a fig tree could "bear olives, or a grapevine bear figs." Something is wrong with that picture, and James is saying that something is wrong with our using an instrument given by God to bless us as a weapon with which to curse those created by

God and in His image The tongue. It's such a powerful thing, James says, that a person completely able to control it, "never at fault in what he says," would be "a perfect man."

The tongue. It may be small, but in our lives it's like the rudder that steers a huge sea-going vessel. Or, more often, it's like a spark that sets a forest ablaze. Which leads me to this: We need to be very careful that what flows from our tongues are words that are refreshing, redeeming, and winsome, and not words that spark fires. Most of us would never dream of putting a

knife in an enemy, but we need to remember that, in God's economy, neither are we to bow to the very real temptation to stick folks with our own forked tongues, to use that instrument to spread poison, or to drop tongue-kindled sparks that fan fires which we secretly hope burn the folks who've rubbed us wrong.

Words actually designed to slander, to mislead, and to hurt can be powerful and poisonous. They tend to be the words of cowards who don't begin to have what it takes to own their verbal missiles, to say honestly to a person's face what they've been saying dishonestly behind his back. Generally, such words are as worthless as the opinions of the pygmies behind them, but they hurt nonetheless.

Even loose lips which mean no harm can cause injury. Have you ever played the classroom game where the teacher whispers a simple sentence to a person at one end of the room, and then he whispers it to the next, and so on, until the last person in the room shares it with the whole class? It's often hilarious to see how the message has changed as it's been repeated. It's not so funny in real life. Just remember that a VERY significant percentage of what follows the words, "Did you hear . . ." or "I don't mean to gossip, but bears little resemblance to the actual facts. Scuttlebutt's one thing. Facts are quite another.

Say, I don't mean to gossip, but I just heard that Stacy Conner is about to shave his head, hitchhike to Nepal, and enter a Buddhist monastery Just kidding
