Garrett, Mayor In the last City Commission meeting Mr. Buddy Haun from the Texas Highway Department met with us and discussed a state federal project for the erection of warning signs on every street where it cresses the railroad. This is a project funded with state and federal funds and these signs will be the standard warning signs as required by the National Safety Act. After the signs have been erected, it will be the responsibility of the city to maintain them. I feel that this will be a great asset and a safety factor in our town. The Commission voted to cooperate in this project.

I reported to the Commission that I had contacted the Texas Health Department and that they had agreed to let us wait until something happened about the location of a doctor here before we appointed a new City Health Officer. I hope that this can be soon.

the Commission discussed a handbook for the city employees that would spell out what would be expected of them, what benefits they would have while working with the City, and a general overall goal as what we as a Commission is planning for the city. We feel that this is something that is badly! needed so that there can be a better understanding between the Commission and the employees. We all want to work for the betterment of our city and want to give you the most that we can for the money we spend.

We have been asked by some if we would haul off brush where they are trimming trees. We are not equiped to haul this much brush at this time, but if your limbs are small and you will cut them in lengths of not more that three feet and tie them in a bundle, we will pick them up if they are placed with your other trash. For you who want to haul brush to the land fill, it is open all week now and you may haul it any time, just be sure to dump it on the brush that is there so that it can be

burned. there appears a notice from the State elsewhere in this issue about a hearing on a permit for a landfill. This is not a new site but a required hearing on the site that now exists. The present site will continue to be used as it has in the past.

The Gorman Panthers will make a return appearance to the Region II-B tournament in Stephenville thanks to the shooting of Larry Keith.

Keith scored 32 points, including 10 of 11 free throws, to spark the Panthers to a 66-55 Class B bi-district basketball win over Bronte Tuesday night in Cougar Gym. The win gives Gorman a 22-7 season record and a return

ticket to the regional tournament. Gorman lost to Eula la the consolation game at Stephenville last year but beat the Pirates in a district 22-B playoff game to advance into the bi-district game against Bronte. Keith averaged 24 points a game for the Panthers but

topped that figure by eight against the Longhorns. Coach Dail Ables praised Keith for keeping Gorman in the game in the first half when Bronte managed to take a 30-29 half-

The 5-9 senior scored 12 points in a crucial third quarter when Gorman outscored Bronte 20-14 to take a 49-44 lead

into the final quarter. Free throw shooting helped the Panthers as the team connected on 24 of 36 shots from the line.

Ables has picked defending state champion Krum as the team to beat in the regional tournament. The Bobcats, 40-3 last year, are currently undefeated this season. Also at the tournament will be Goree, 46-38 winners of Region II-B runnerup Megargel Monday night.

Joining Keith in double figures were Tim Swanner with 13 points and Blaine Gibbs with 12. Jay Schoenfield topped Bronte with 21 points while Dennie Hamilton added 15 and Brian Champion 13. All three players are juniors for the Longhorns and the loss, though disappointing, may prove to be valuable experience next year for Bronte.



NOTICE OF **PUBLIC HEARING**

The City of Gorman has filed Application No. 470 with the Texas Department of Health for permit to operate an existing Type III numicipal solid waste disposal site located northeast of Gorman, 0.9 mile east of Farm-to-Market Highway 2689, 11/2 miles north of State Highway 8 in Eastland, County, Texas.

The site consists of approximately 35 acres of land, and is to daily receive approximately 1/2 ton of solid wastes under the regulatory jurisidiction of the Texas Department of Health when disposed of or otherwise processed in accordance with the said Department's Mu-nicipal Solid Waste Management Regulations.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Texas Solid Waste Disposal Act (Article 4477-7, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes) and the Texas Department of Health Municipal Solid Waste Management Regulations, and the Administrative Procedure and Texas Register Act, a public hearing on the aforesaid application will be held at:

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
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
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
