At Tarleton he was a cadet Lieutenant Colonel on the ROTC regimental staff and was a member of the Wainwright Rifles and the Tarleton honor guard. Dr. Brown was listed in Who's Who and was awarded the Tarleton academic "T". He was a member of the TTP's spirit group.

Dr. Brown was a graduate of the University of Texas and Southwestern Medical School and took internship and two years of family practice residency at Sacramento County Hospital in Sacramento, Calif. He practiced one year in Beaumont and for the past 15 years was the only family doctor in Freer.

In 1977, Dr. Brown was the subject of an extensive article by Roy Appleton in the Corpus Christi Caller dealing with the problems of a smalltown doctor and the humanitarian manner in which he handled the problems.

Dr. Brown was a member of the Texas and American Medical Association and the American Academy of Family Physicians. He was also a councilman on the Freer City Council.\$

dr. Brown, 44, died in a Corpus Christi hospital May 9 after a long illness. He is survived by his wife, the former Pat Reeves of Stephenville, two sons, David and Steven, and a sister Mrs. Elizabeth Cowan of Belton.

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



Washington, D.C. - Every political movement since the beginning of time has had the seeds of its own destruction located within - often from the onset. During the sixties and early seventies we became acquainted with such movements as the New Frontier, Great Society, and the social-welfare state. In this period our Country seemed to have unlimited resources. We could conduct a war on poverty at home and a fighting war in Vietnam half way around the world. The government began a policy of intense regulation of the economy and spent billions trying to cure such problems as structural unemployment and poverty. The phenomenon of government expansion was world wide as we began to see the nationalization of many important industries in Western

Europe and around the globe. The idealism of the sixties finally collapsed when it was discovered that government programs did not cure poverty or promote efficiency in the marketplace. Massive amounts of foreign aid did very little to enhance world prosperity and military intervention overseas often did not stabilize pro-Western regimes or make friends for the United States.

Now we are in the process of examining our past errors. The issues people seem most concerned about are too much government spending and regulation, inflation, and our eroding national defense. These concerns are not confined to America but are worldwide. Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland today announced final changes in the 1979 crop peanut program regulations, including eight changes from the proposal originally announced last April 27.

The following incorporate suggestions made during the comment period:

The discount on Segregation 3 peanuts being transferred from additional to quota loan at the end of the marketing season has been changed from \$50. to \$25. per ton.


The maxium discount on Segregation 2 peanuts under the same program has been changed to \$25. per ton. Previously the maxium dis-

count was \$100. Shellers may contract additional peanuts to be used in domestic markets if they put up an irrevocable letter of credit equal to the penalty rate for selling additional peanuts in domestic markets (120 percent of the quota peanut price support level of \$420 per short ton). These shellers must then agree to sell for export an equal quantity and quality of quota peanuts by the deadline required for the export of

contract additional peanuts. The time for buyback of additional peanuts for domestic use without added costs has been extended to three days, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and Federal Holidays.

Field dried peanuts have been eliminated from the minimum allowable moisture level for quota support.
