

# RESERVE CAPT. CAROLYN GILBERT DEPLOYS FOR TWO WEEKS OVERSEA TOUR

CARSWELL AIR FORCE BASE, TEXAS (May 9) -- The 301st Tactical Fighter Wing, an Air Force Reserve unit headquartered at Carswell Air Force Base, will deploy 18 F-105 aircraft and approximately 300 personnel from Carswell and the wing's 507th Tactical Fighter Group, Tinker Air Force Base, Okla. to Gioia del Colle, Italy May 11.

The deployment, designated "Coronet Palamino" by Tactical Air Command, runs through May 25 and marks the second time this Air Force Reserve fighter unit has deployed to an allied operating base. Gioia del Colle is the home of the Italian Air Force's 36 Stormo which files the f-104.

The short-term deployments are designed to familiarize U.S.-based forces with the unique aspects of operations outside the continental United States.

Air refueling for deploying aircraft will be accomplished by Strategic Air Command KC-135 "Stratotankers" while the airlift of personnel and material will be performed by C-141 'Starlifter' aircraft of the Military Airlift Command.

Deploying aircraft will fly non-stop across the Atlantic. A Tactical Air Command ED-135 tactical deployment and control aircraft will direct the movement of deploying aircraft across the Atlantic Ocean.

Two years ago, the Carswell-based reservists of the 301st TFW deployed to Norvenich Air Base, Germany, a German F-104 base, where the unit's F-105 aircraft participated in Tactical Air Command Denmark's "Oksboel '77" exercise which took place over the North Sea.

Last year, the 507th TFG deployed to Sculthorpe Air Base, England in support of NATO contingency exercises.



represent America. I am a candidate because I GASOHOL BILL PASSES SENATE

AUSTIN — The Texas Senate passed legislation by a vote of 28-0 legislation legalizing the production of alcohol in Texas for fuels. House Bill 1986 authored by State Representative Bill Keese (D-Somerville) sponsored in the Texas Senate by Valley State Senator Raul Longoria (D-Edinburg) is legislation vital to the development of alcohol fuel facilities, such as gasohol, in

The legislation creates a new permit in the Alcoholic Beverage Code allowing for the production of gasohol. Currently, the alcohol portion of gasohol has been prohibited in the State for more than forty years. Under a changing energy situation, the law presents a barrier to the development of gasohol in Texas. Already shortages are being experienced in some parts of the nation. Texas is currently experiencing some diesel fuel short-

The legislation was one of two bills by Keese to remove existing institutional barriers to gasohol. House Bill 2068 which would allow the construction of large-scale gasohol facilities in Texas met strong opposition from the Liquor Lobby in the State Capitol. Current Texas law requires that a holder of a liquor permit be a Texas citizen or if a corporation, that the corporation be 51% Texas-owned. Holders of beer permits are exempted.

from this provision. "The Liquor Lobby just did not realize that they were standing squarely in front of gasohol's future in Texas", Keese related. "They learned the error of their ways though. We had almost every agricultural commodity association and farm organization in the State behind this bill."

Keese stated that the Lobby relented upon a strong am tired of sitting idle while the kind of governments we believe in are being taken away from us piece by piece. It would be much more difficult for us to promote the amendment if I were not a candidate, and I belive that his amendment is a vital step

in reclaiming America. You can best help us promote it by talking about it. When the people of Tarrant County start talking about doing something, it usually happens. Our current effort is to encourage our County Committee to present this proposed amendment to the

"Had we not been able to amend HB 1986 to include HB 2068," Keese stated, "we would have lost a \$15 million federal loan guarantee for a pilot gasohol facility in the Rio Grande Valley." The Valley gasohol pilot plant is expected to generate 470 jobs in the community of Santa Rosa, Texas, \$330,000 in State and local taxes, and \$26.5 million to the local economy, according to data supplied by the Texas Industrial Commission

The Commission's director, Gerald Brown, further reports that should ten percent of the total motor fuels market in Texas become gasohol, the impact on Texas would amount to 6,000 workers employed directly in gasohol and would require 79 additional gasohol facilities the same size as the Valley

Mr. Brown further stated that although "there is no short term solution to the current energy problem, the development of an in-state alcohol plant and a gasohol program would help diversify the Texas industrial economy, create stable employment for the state farm community and provide a domestic source of clean energy". "Futhermore, substantial benefits would accrue to the State and Nation in terms of reduced reliance on imported crude and reduced balance of payments on the foreign trade account."

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

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
