An airline stewardess writes: "I have been reading so much about breast cancer that I finally forced myself to examine my breasts. I am not sure that I am doing it properly. Everything feels lumpy and that scares me even more. Should I stop?"

ANSWERline: Absolutely not! Breast self-examination is a habit you must acquire and practice to protect your health now and in the years ahead. Essentially what you are trying to do is teach your fingers what your breasts normally feel like so that you will notice any change from month to month. Ask your physician to teach you breast self-examination and explain the anatomy of your own breasts. or, contact the American Cancer Society in any part of the country where you are stationed. The ACS not only has free instruction leaflets on breast self-examination, its local Units often hold BSE "teach-ins". With some help, you'll find BSE quick and easy to do.

LATE DOVE SEASON SEGMENT STARTS JAN. 6

Dove hunting is normally considered an early autumn activity, but Texas hunters may be missing some good shooting if they don't hunt during the late mourning dove season segment beginning Jan. 6.

In the North Zone, the late segment runs from Jan. 6 for nine days, ending Jan. 14. In the South Zone, it also starts on Jan. 6, but it continues longer than the north, ending Jan. 21.

The daily bag limit of 10 and possession limit of 20 is the same as the early segment.

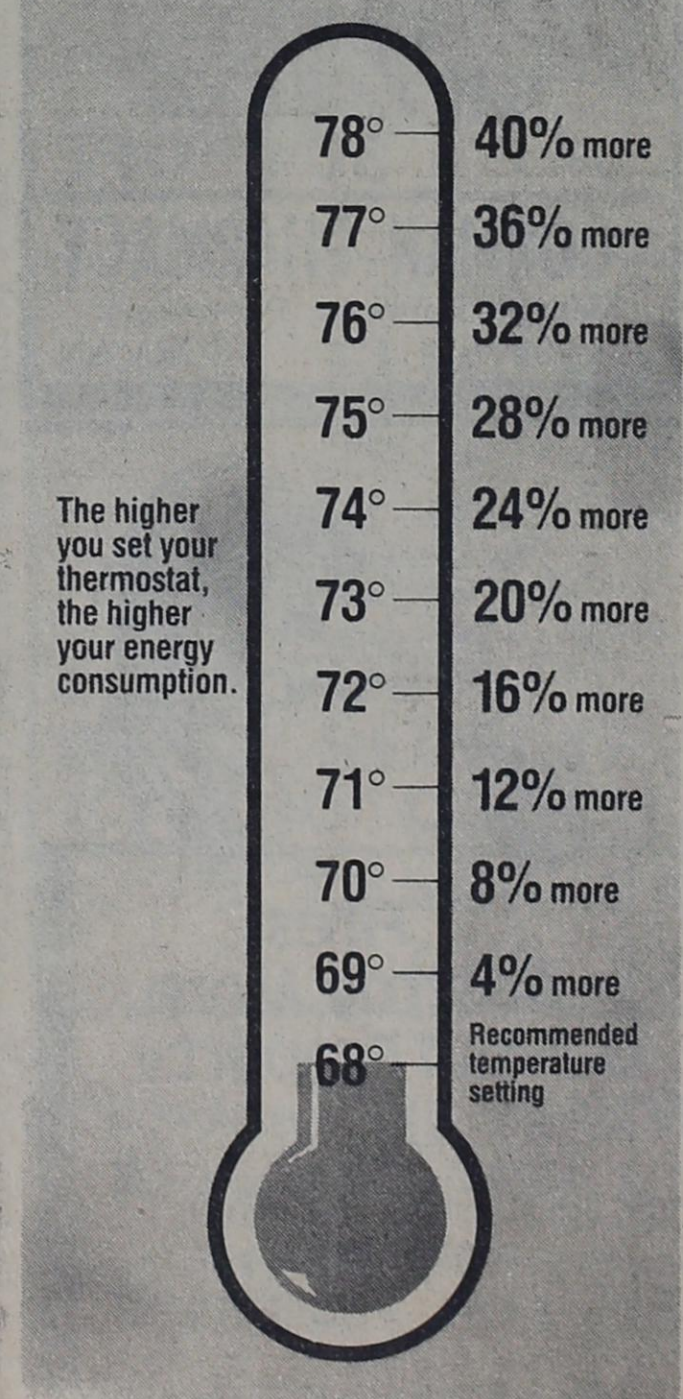
