"Family Centered", Dr. Callaway explains, means that the needs and wishes of the family having a baby should come first, instead of the convenience of the doctor or hospital. This might include childbirth education, having the father or other close family members with the mother in labor and delivery, letting children visit in the hospital, and keeping the baby at the mother's side as much as she wishes.

## H. B. 1060 — IMPLEMENTATION OF THE "TAX RELIEF" AMENDMENT

HB-1060 as passed on May 28, 1979, implements the provisions of the Constitutional Amendment approved in November of 1978. Several of the provisions of HB-1060 require immediate action on the part of the school districts and other jurisdictions. Below is a section-by-section summary of the bill that includes comments on which jurisdictions are affected, when the provisions take effect, and comments on actions required by the jurisdiction.

### Article 6 - "Definition of Residence Homestead"

Applies only to school districts

Article 6 defines a residence homestead as a structure or separately occupied portion of a structure used as a residence (together with land and improvements used in the residential occupancy of the structure). To qualify as a residence homestead, the property must be owned by one or more individuals, be designed or adapted for human residence, and be occupied as the principal residence by the person qualifying for an exemption.

Article 6 also provides that an owner is one who holds either record or equitable title, and that a homestead is not lost if the owner temporarily stops occupying it.

Article 6 is immediately effective and requires no action from the jurisdiction.

### Article 7 - "Residential Homestead Exemptions"

Applies only to school districts

Article 7 applies only to school districts and provides that all individuals are entitled to an exemption of \$5,000 from the market value of their residential homestead. In addition, it provides that all persons 65 or older or disabled (under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance) are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homestead. A person who is over 65 and disabled may receive only one \$10,000 exemption, and only one such exemption may be received per family, per residence homestead.

**8. Q: Prior to the passage of HB 1060 we were told that a rural homestead would include up to 200 acres of land and the improvements. Is that still true?**

A. No. Under the terms of HB 1060, for the purposes of the \$5,000 and \$10,000 homestead exemptions, a residential homestead has been defined as the residence and the land used for residential purposes. This would limit the amount of land included in the homestead to the area immediately around the residence (probably no more than 1 to 5 acres).

## CITY CHIT CHAT

The Gorman City Commission met in a called meeting on July 10 and in the regular monthly meeting on July 19. The Mayor and all Commissioners were present at both meetings with City Secretary, Edna Brinegar present at the regular meeting.

In the called meeting, salary adjustments were discussed and some adjustments were made. They will become effective in August.

In order to eliminate confusion in many areas, the Commission voted to adopt a policy book for city employees. This will cover all aspects of employment with the city. It will set times for salary adjustments to be considered in July of each year to become effective in August. All new employees will be hired for three months on probation and then will be considered for a raise if their work is satisfactory. Policemen will be employed at a salary to be adjusted when they become certified. The Policy Book will be discussed with all city employees at the August 2 meeting. It may be changed as needed.

In the regular meeting the Commission took care of regular business which included discussing plans for redoing the theater building. The roof work has been started on the building. The Commission made arrangements for the Ambulance to get gasoline in case it gets back into town after all stations are closed. The application for a sewer grant was discussed and the Commission was informed that an engineer would be here at the next meeting to discuss the grant.

The remainder of the meeting was used for the meeting of the Commission as it's own Board of Equalization. We had about six people to meet with us to discuss the raising or lowering of taxes. Some were raised and some lowered.

As we get started on the work in the theater building, we will be needing some help. If anyone would like to volunteer to help in cleaning out the building, helping to level sand, or do any kind of work, leave your name at the City office. We will be needing some machinery such as dump trucks, front-end loaders, and bob cat loaders to move sand with. If anyone has this equipment and can help, it will be greatly appreciated.

Due to the rabies situation in the county, we urge that all of you have your pets vaccinated and kept up on a leash for their protection as well as for the protection of the citizens of Gorman.

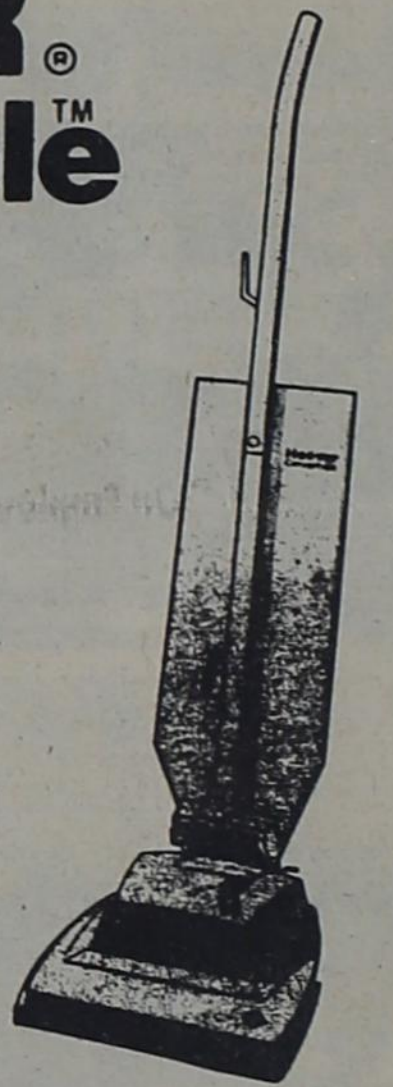

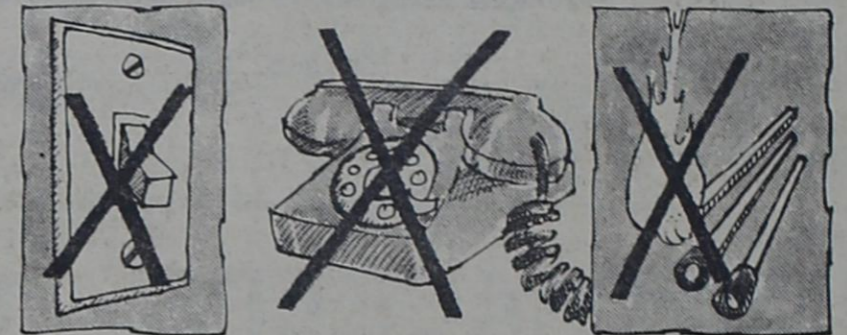
