Adopts Resolution

In a special meeting Thursday, June 5th the City Commission of Gorman adopted a resolution to make application with Texas Parks and Wildlfe for grants that will be applied to the restoration of Frank A. Gray Memorial Park. The grant, if received, will be on a cost share basis with the City.

A group of Gorman citizens had previously met with the RC&D Board seeking the grant and was referred to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Board, which is the department of the government that assists in restoring natural parks and wildlife.

The park committee met on Wednesday night of last week to determine the first priority for the park and all agreed that public rest rooms, electricity and water well, roads, parking area, picnic tables, covered gathering place, playground equipmet and fencing.


