The following is copied from the Editorial Page of the Fort Worth Star Telegram, Tuesday evening, Sept. 22, 1970.

The editorial spoke of the young man in Arlington who defended the flag on the campus of San Diego State College - and the woman in her 70's who stopped her car and snatched a flag from demonstrators.

The balance of the editorial reads as follows:

"So what does these two cases and public acclaim of them mean to another institution which was created primarily to defend the American flag? Apparently nothing.

The Army has issued orders to commanders of small, isolated military installations on college campuses and elsewhere to lower the American flag if faced with violence threatening desecration or improper display of the flag. The Army said the order also is applicable to flags at Army installations on other campuses if college presidents, in efforts to prevent violence, agree to student demands and order flags flown at half staff or even upside down.

The Army said it does not believe college presidents have this authority and rather than comply with it, Army personnel should lower the flag completely or not raise it at all.

We can sympathize with the Army in not wanting to cause trouble or to be swept up in a demonstration. But if demonstrators must have their way and the Army must buckle under, we really don't know what to say to outnumbered students, old ladies and the haggard ghosts of Corregidor who stood and defended Old Glory.

I have heard that our government has been infiltrated by a large number of commies, yellow bellies, pinkies, homos' and other off-breed vermin but I still hope we have enough red-blooded Americans in our Senate, Congress, and maybe one or two in our dictatorial Supreme Court who will countermand this order.

I have read of one or two former Presidents who would have personally taken care of this matter.

Has the time arrived when all citizens, who still believe in the American way of life, are going to have to keep double-barrel shotguns loaded, handy to defend the flag flying from their place of business or home?

Has the time arrived, when our armed forces, like those in other countries, is being controlled by subversive elements?

Gorman Stuns Lions 34-0; Host Dublin Friday Night

The Panthers ended a long journey on a high note last Friday night as they traveled to Roby (a fur piece) to take on the Lions and came out on top by blanking the Lions 34-0 on a very wet field.

The two teams fought on even terms until late in the first period after the Panthers got an interception by Rudy Espinoza to set them up with first and ten

yards and a TD with 1 minute gone in the third period. Billy Self ran for two points, making the score 22-0.

The Big Red scored again with 9 minutes left in the third period, going 29 yards in 2 plays with Johnny Scitern again showing his fine running style by sweeping his left side for 28 yards and a TD. The run for two points failed.

The Panthers tallied again with 3 minutes left in the ball game, going 73 yards in 13 plays with Johnny Scitern grabbing a Panther aerial from the midst of three Lion defenders and going 31 yards for the score. Again the run for two points failed, leaving the final score 34 to 0.

Enough cannot be said about the fine runbacks of Lion kicks by Johnny Scitern, and the three fine pass interceptions by Rudy Espinoza to set the Panthers up for scores. So with further a-do our choice for Players of the Week (as you probably have already guessed) goes to Johnny Scitern for his fine play, both offensively and defensively, and Rudy Espinoza for his outstanding defensive secondary work, intercepting 3 Lion passes. He also got another but it was called back by a penalty.

There were several real bright spots on the defense in the Roby game with the entire team doing a fine job at their positions. Also the Panther offense showed real improvement on timing and desire with more sharpness in their blocking and running.

Wesley Rogers led the Big Red on the ground getting 95 yards on 17 carries for a 5.5 average. Johnny Scitern rambled for 91 yards on 12 trips for 7.5. Jackie Selman added 31 yards on 10 tries for 3.1. Billy Self got 12 yards on 3 totes for 4.0. Danny Irvin got 11 yards on 3 trips for 3.6 average.

The Panthers will play their first home game of the season on Friday night hosting the Dublin Lions at Brodgon Field at 8:00. Last week the Lions lost by a 8-6 margin to a strong Hico team and should prove to be a real test for the Panthers, both defensively and offensively.

However, if the Big Red continue the outstanding defensive play they showed last week and the fine offensive punch which they are capable of, there is no doubt about the outcome of the game Friday night! Right, Panthers?

Senior Citizens Urged To Speak Out At Forums

COLLEGE STATION — "Grass roots America" will do its thing during the week of September 20-26 when Senior Citizens throughout the nation speak out on their needs in community meetings.

All of this is part of the plan for the White House Conference on Aging to be held in Washington, D. C., November 29-December 3, 1971. Minnie Bell, Extension specialist in family life education-aging, reports.

"The 'speak outs', actually small Community White House Conferences on Aging, will be in the form of community forums," Miss Bell said. "Forum recorders will note what is said, and afterwards, this information will make its way to Washington to help build the policy recommendations of the 1971 Conference."

As America moved into the decade of the 70's, Congress authorized the President to call a White House Conference on Aging, she explained, adding that the Conference will be built on the results of the First White House Conference on Aging held in 1961 which led among many things, to the enactment of the Older Americans Act and the setting up of a Federal Administration on Aging.

"Today, there are 55 states and territories with units on Aging," Miss Bell said. "In Texas, it is the Governor's Committee on Aging. Progress since the 1961 Conference has been real, but 20,000,000 older Americans still face many serious problems," she added.

Nearly all elderly persons are trapped in a squeeze on their fixed incomes, she noted, and advancing years cause them to struggle with isolation, multiplying problems in health, housing, employment and their retirement roles and activities.

The Community Forums in each county of the nation offer an opportunity for older Americans to present their problems and needs. Miss Bell urges Senior Texans and all others concerned with their welfare to attend and participate in their local forum. The local forum for Gorman will be held on Tuesday, September 29 at 2 p. m. at the Fire Hall.

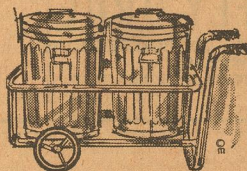

WASHINGTON, D. C. — A NEWS ITEM IN THE WASHINGTON POST a few days ago reported that a New York woman ordered from a Dallas firm a guaranteed method of killing roaches. For her \$2.98 she received two blocks of wood.

THERE IS ALWAYS A GYP OF SOME kind and most of us at sometime or other in our quest for a bargain have been a victim.

ON THE OTHER HAND, WITH THE DEVELOPMENT of the hundreds of thousands of new products, used daily by everyone, we often find that even in necessities we may not be getting our money's worth. Most communities have a Better Business Bureau, a Retail Merchants Association or some other self-policing organization to which the consumer may go with his complaints. But the retailer also has his problems since he largely deals with faraway suppliers. The retailer can be totally unaware of the deficiencies of a product he sells whether it be toothpaste or an automobile.

NUMEROUS ORGANIZATIONS HAVE BEEN in existence for years to protect the consumer — one of the oldest the Consumer's Union. Another is the Consumer Federation of America. Reportedly some perform a very fine and needed service. There has now developed a great sentiment in the Federal Government and the Congress to enact consumer legislation and set up, within the White House itself, a Consumer Affairs Department. At present, Mrs. Virginia Knauer, Special Assistant to the President, heads an office of Consumer Affairs but who advocates the creation of a government agency to police all other regulatory agencies to see that they do the job in the interest of consumers.

IT IS A POPULAR THING TO BE for the "Consumer," as if we are not all consumers, but at the same time some of the strongest advocates of consumer protection legislation seem to have an attitude that Washington knows best and that the consumer is not qualified to exercise good judgment.

A BILL VOTED OUT OF COMMITTEE and now awaiting a rule to bring it up for debate provides that a super consumer agency have power over all other regulatory bodies to determine if they are doing the job in protecting the consumer. The Bill provides that the consumer agency may look into and make public all records, including income tax returns of any individual in the Country. It is not clear what this has to do with protecting the consumer but, at the same time, it is a provision in the proposal.

THERE ARE SOME 150-ODD BILLS in the Congressional hopper relating to this subject, some of which suggest that the emphasis shift from protecting the purchaser of products to destroying his "exploiters."

THE BILL PROVIDES THAT UNDER THE new agency to be created, suits may be brought in Federal Court for groups of consumers referred to as "class action suits." At this point the courts would decide what is good and what is bad for the consumer.

AN AGENCY CREATED TO DO THIS sort of job would obviously require an army of Federal employees to decide what complaints should be instituted in the Federal Courts. The advocates have not explained how it would be possible to keep current reported deficiencies. If a product were found to be less than represented, it could be taken off the market immediately. If the deficiency was corrected the next day, it could be months before another investigation would reveal the correction. Likewise an approved product could become deficient the next day.

IN SHORT, WHAT APPEARS AN INEXPENSIVE sort of way to gain political favor with the consumer could become one of the most expensive agencies of the entire Federal Government and, as a matter of fact, under some of the proposals could virtually paralyze some segments of the business community.
