Ten Day Revival At Rock Bluff Begins June 20

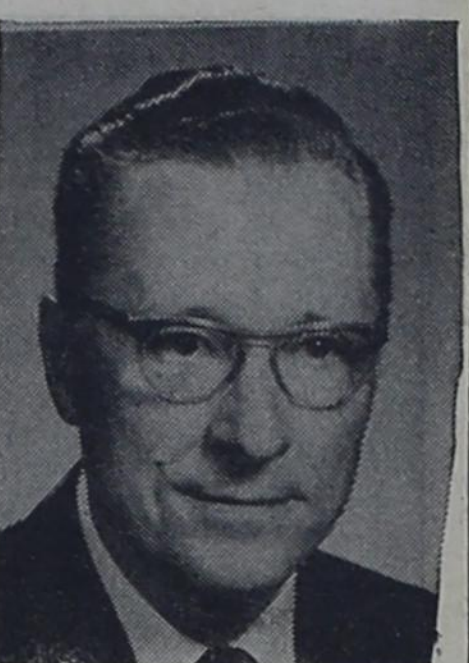

HOSPITAL DISTRICT BOARD REPORT

The regular monthly meeting of the South Eastland County Hospital District was held at Blackwell Hospital on Monday, June 16, 1975 at 7:30 p. m. Among the topics discussed was the appointment of the District's Tax Equalization Board. The Equalization Board for this tax year consists of the following: Gus Frossard, Durwood Burgess and Gene Snider. Taxes for 1975 will be collected starting in September.

An application for appointment to the medical staff was received from Dr. B. C. Dayton from Hico. Dr. Dayton has worked with Dr. Pino in surgery in Hico and will be performing and assisting in surgery here. The Board welcomes Dr. Dayton to the medical staff of Blackwell Hospital and looks forward to his working in this hospital.

Due to the increasing problems encountered in the reading and diagnosis of x-ray films, a new radiologist consultant team has been retained. Effective July 1, 1975, all hospital x-ray films will be read and interpreted by Dr. H. W. McGowan and Dr. B. J. Jordan from Brownwood. This action should shorten the delay between the taking of the x-ray picture and the reading and interpretation of the results. There will be one major change, however, that will affect all hospital patients. These physicians will be charging directly to the patient or the patient's insurance policy for service. The cost for this service has been a part of the total x-ray fee in the past, but will not be after July 1, 1975. Hospital charges will be reduced to reflect this change at that time. Upon entering the hospital or occasionally for some clinic tests, patients will be asked to sign insurance forms specifically for the radiologists' fees if x-rays are ordered. If there is no insurance, the radiologists, fee will be billed directly to the patient by the radiologists' office. This new procedure may be a bit confusing at first, but should help in the treatment of patients and, hopefully, get them well and back at home sooner.

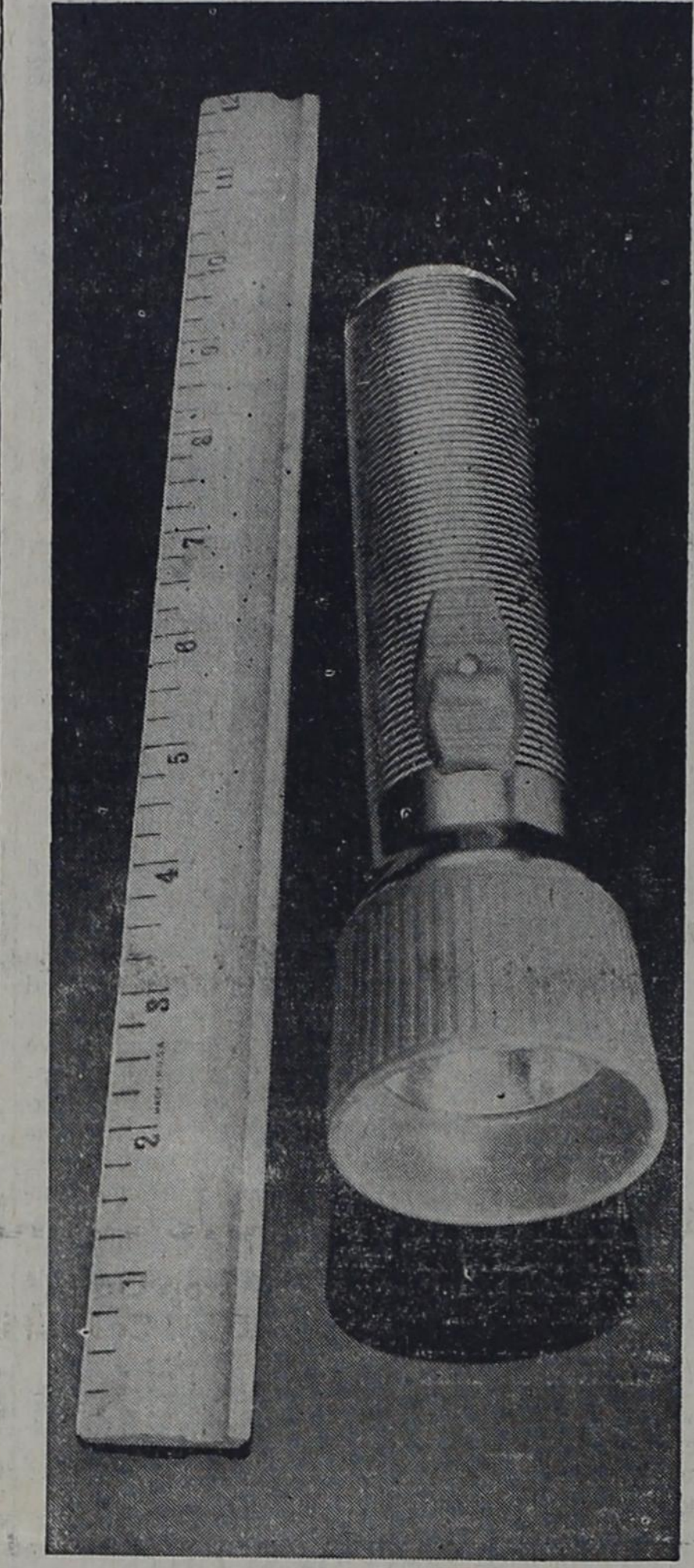
