These items mentioned do not represent all of the needs but do represent the most urgent ones.

Additional meetings will be scheduled in which the coaches and players will meet and the teams will be selected. These meeting dates will be announced soon.

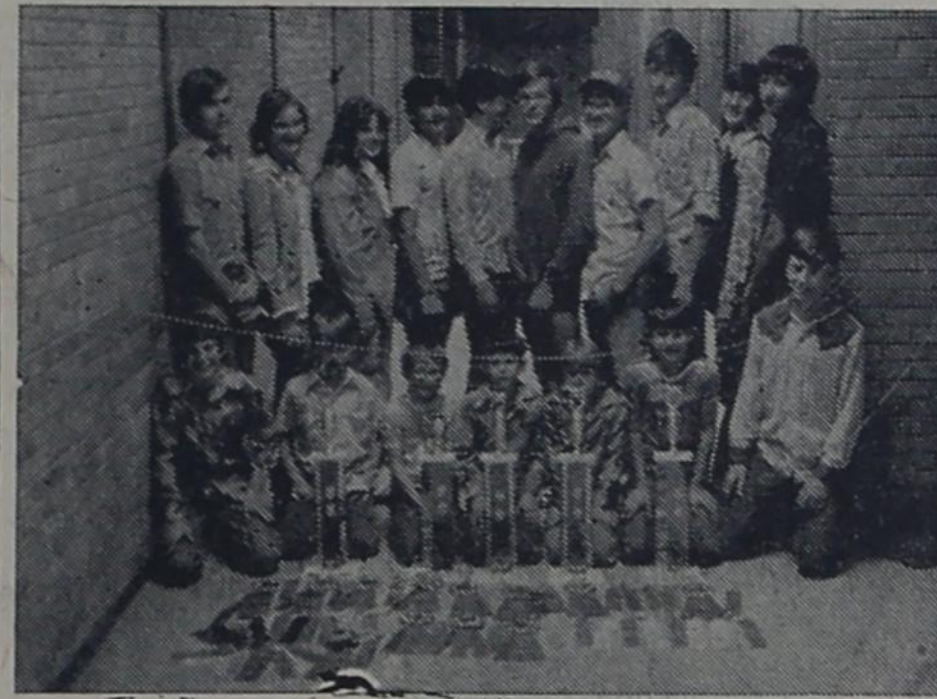

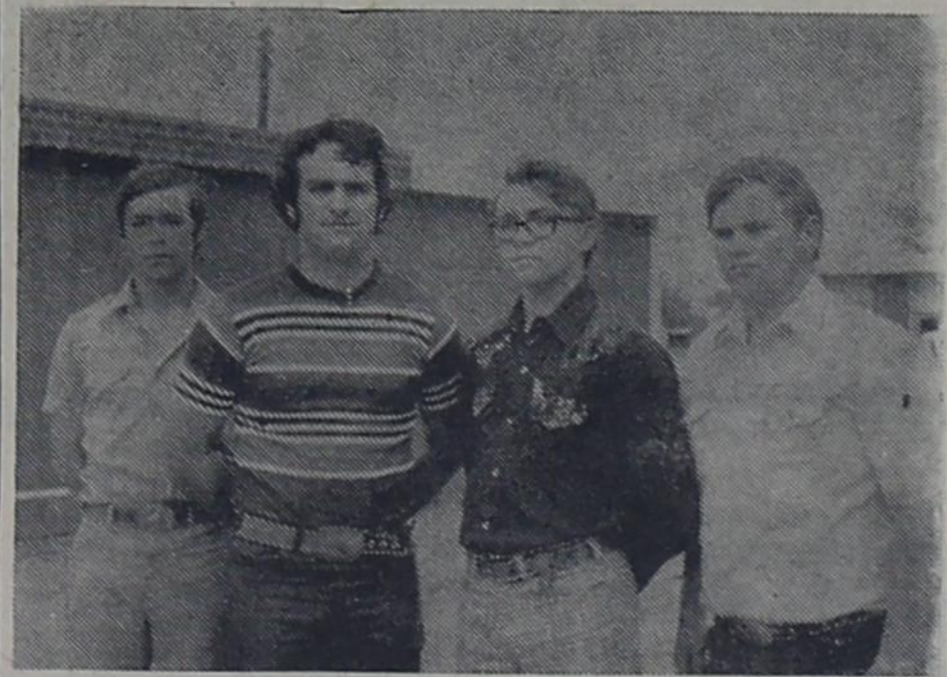

Peanut Production Short Course Set For March 29-30

Peanut production will be the subject of a two-night short course in Gorman on Monday and Tuesday nights, March 29 and 30th. Each session will begin at 7:30 p. m. and will be held in the cafeteria at Gorman High School.

Four Extension Service specialists will conduct the short course, announces DeMarquis Gordon, County Ag. Agent. Monday night, Dr. Thomas Lee and Dr. Cliff Hoelscher will discuss the recommendations of disease and insect control in peanuts. Dr. Lee is Area Plant Pathologist and Dr. Hoelscher is Area Entomologist.

The two specialists who will be on the program Tuesday night are Dr. Leland Tripp, Extension Agronomist. Among the topics to be discussed on Tuesday night are farm management decisions, cost of production, seed preparation, varieties, fertility and weed control in peanuts.

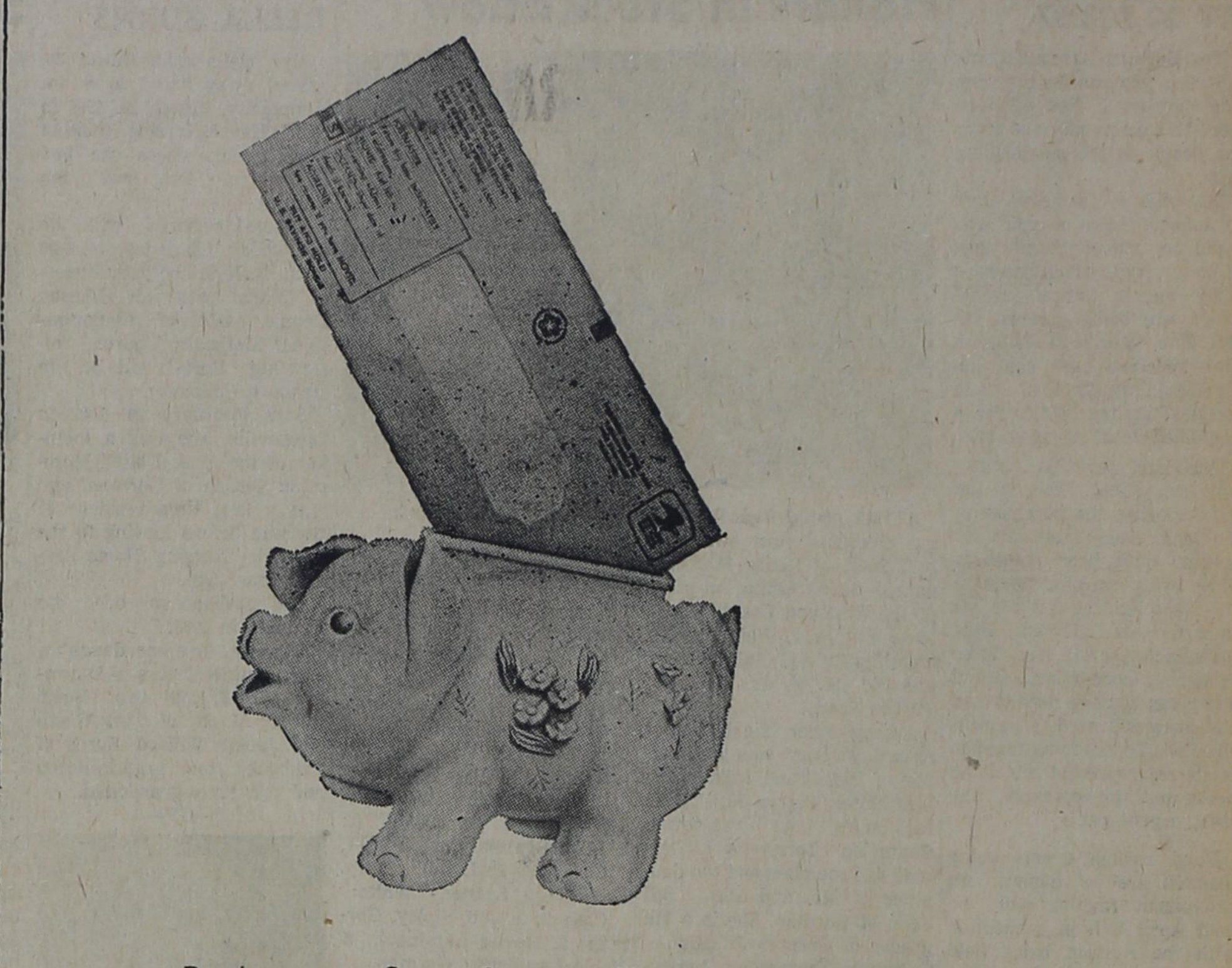

"DEALING" With David

Today, I wish to speak more expressly to the parents in our community (next week it will be to the kids) about the subject of "unconditional" love. The very character of God is "unconditional" love, that is love with no strings attached, no matter what we do. God loves people because he's God, not because people earn it or deserve it. We are to love people because they are people, not because they deserve it. But I ask, is this the type of love parents raise their children on?

Sadly, I think not. Most of us have been raised on "conditional" love. You felt loved "if you are quiet . . . if you eat dinner . . . of you act like your brother or sister . . . etc." The point is always clear; there is a "price of admission" for love, and you have got to pay it. Your worth is not in yourself, but in something else, in your appearance, your grades, your athletic ability, in being and doing what is expected of you. Most parents raise their children in this manner, and a child who has been taught his lessons by having love turned on and off eventually concludes that his sole worth and goodness lie in his ability to fulfill the needs of others.

The usual demands of conditional, parental love are: conformity, cooperation, being like somebody, being a success, working hard, making one's parents proud, glorifying the family name, etc. Under these "conditions" a person cannot help but fail, and then in failure is deprived of love. This then leads to self-hatred, and this self-hatred is the beginning of a sad and self-destructive life.

Parents, I beg of you, sit down with your kids, no matter how old or young, and tell them that you love them no matter what they do or become, and then practice that "unconditional" love. If not, I'm afraid many parents will lose their kids, because their deepest need, that of feeling important and accepted has

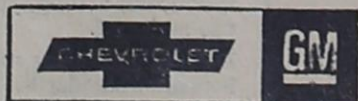
