

## CITIZEN OF THE WEEK AT LAWNDALE

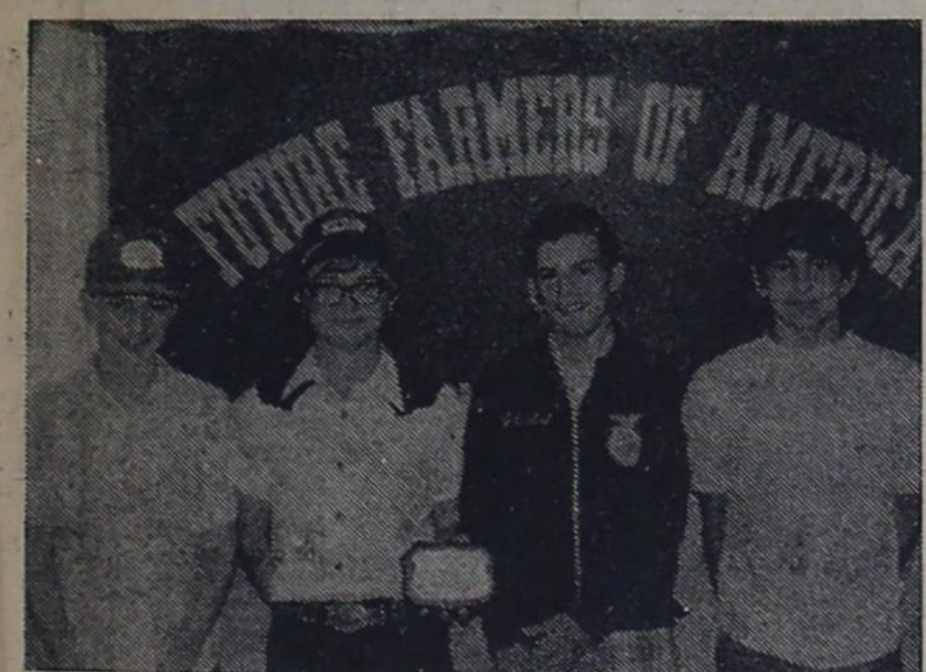

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday a total of \$75.5 million was rebated to cities for sales tax collected in 1975 Christmas quarter, compared to \$64.2 million for the 1974 Christmas quarter. The Comptroller said March February and January allocations to the cities represented the tax collected by merchants from October through December. March net payment to the City of Gorman was \$3,492.27.

## Local Elections Set Here For Saturday April 3, 1976

Gorman and area voters will cast ballots in the Saturday, April 3 election of city, school and South Eastland County Hospital Board. In the city election the position of mayor will be filled from a field of two: W. C. "Check" Smith, who has served as mayor for the past four years, and Jim Fonville, who is seeking a first term. City Commission, Place 2 is to be filled with Billy Joe Dennis, incumbent, and Tommy Harrison vying for this post. Place 4 on the Commission, now held by Arlon E. Smith, is unopposed. Voters in the Gorman Independent School District will elect two trustees to the board. Two have filed for the election of these positions: Durwood Burgess, incumbent, and Larry Sikes. Only two candidates have filed in the school election. The South Eastland County Hospital District will elect three board members. Candidates seeking re-election to the board are E. N. Higginbottom, Keith Whitt and J. R. Files. All candidates are unopposed. The City election and the Hospital District election will be held at the Fire Hall with polls opening at 7 a. m. and closing at 7 p. m. for the Hospital election and the city election hours will be from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

The school election will be held at the High School and polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Everyone is urged to vote in all three elections. Be sure and bring your voter registration certificate to the polls. However, if you have lost it and have voted in the last election your name will be on the poll list and you will be eligible to vote by signing a form that you have lost your registration certificate.

Eastland Police Chief, Johnnie Morren, who announced his candidacy for Sheriff of Eastland County in January, has issued the following statement:

Johnnie Morren grew up in the Kokomo Community, Ranger and Eastland. He is married to the former Bonnie Kinman of Wichita Falls. They are the parents of three children: David of Tampa, Fla.; Tom, a freshman at Howard Payne University; and Pam, who is a student in the Eastland Junior High School. He is a veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict. He and his family are members of the Bethel Baptist Church, and also Johnnie is Vice-President of the Men's Fellowship Bible Class.

Johnnie Morren has been with the Eastland Police Dept. nine years, and he has been Chief of Police since 1969 when former Chief Ray Laney retired. Morren has been Civil Defense Director for City of Eastland for the past six years.

A Certified Texas Peace Officer, Johnnie Morren has graduated from several courses and schools offered by the West Central Council of Governments (WCTCOG) in Abilene and elsewhere. Courses included, other than the basic course offered in Abilene are: the Investigation of Major Crimes, WCTCOG Course in Drug Law Enforcement, WCTCOG Course in Criminal Law and Courtroom Procedures, and the WCTCOG School in Fingerprinting.

Johnnie Morren has also completed courses offered by the U. S. Air Force in Office Management and Personnel Management consisting of a total of 140 hours of instruction. Within the past two years he has attended schools held in Chicago and New Orleans dealing with the problems involved in Bank Security.

He is a past president of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Assn. and is also one of its charter members.

Currently vice-president of the Eastland Independent School Board, Johnnie Morren also serves as Truant Officer for the school board. He is a member of the Eastland Band Boosters Club and the Quarterback Club.

Morren is a member of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, the American Legion Carl Barnes Post No. 69 at Ranger and the VFW.

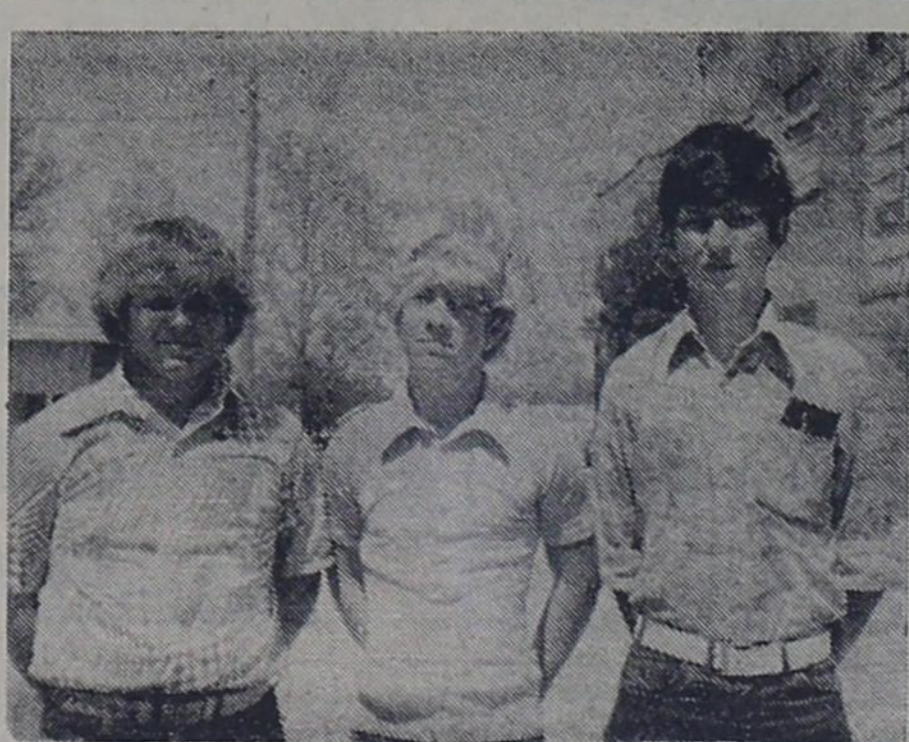

## PEANUT BILL INTRODUCED MAR. 25

The National Peanut Growers Group Steering Committee met March 9 and March 18 in Atlanta to determine if the Committee could agree on a satisfactory basis of reducing allotment acreage. It will be recalled that the Committee had made good progress in reaching agreement on compromise peanut program legislation until the Virginia-Carolina growers disagreed with the across-the-board acreage reduction provision in the January bill draft calling for a 12 percent reduction in 1976 and an additional 12 percent in 1977.

In the March meeting the Committee studied a proposed addition to the January bill draft that would have allowed shellers under special conditions to contract with growers for the production of non-quota peanuts for domestic edible uses. Virginia-Carolina grower leaders met on March 23 and voted to join the Southeast and Southwest growers in support of the original bill draft. They further concluded in their deliberations not to ask for the addition of the edible contract provision.

Once word of the Virginia-Carolina development was relayed to Congressman Dawson Mathis (D-Ga.), final preparations for introduction of the bill were set in motion. The bill was introduced on March 25 co-sponsored by some 20 Congressmen principally from pea-

nut producing states. Representative Mathis is Chairman of the House Agriculture Subcommittee for Oilseeds and Rice. Mathis will be a chief sponsor of the bill and will chair the initial Hearings expected to be scheduled shortly before his Subcommittee. Congressional allies feel that the bill must be moved as far as possible on its legislative route prior to early June when the Agriculture Appropriation Bill comes before the House. It is felt that Congressional friends of the peanut industry must be in a position at that time to convince the majority of the House members that acceptable peanut program modifications are well enroute to becoming a reality. This kind of aggressive move, they say, is needed to head off efforts of peanut program foes to eliminating funding of the 1977 program or to eliminate the program.

The bill is written to apply to the 1977 crop year since time has run out on the 1976 crop. This means that there will be no change in the 1976 program, but it also means that the total allotment acreage reduction of 22.5 percent will occur in 1977 provided the bill becomes law as written.

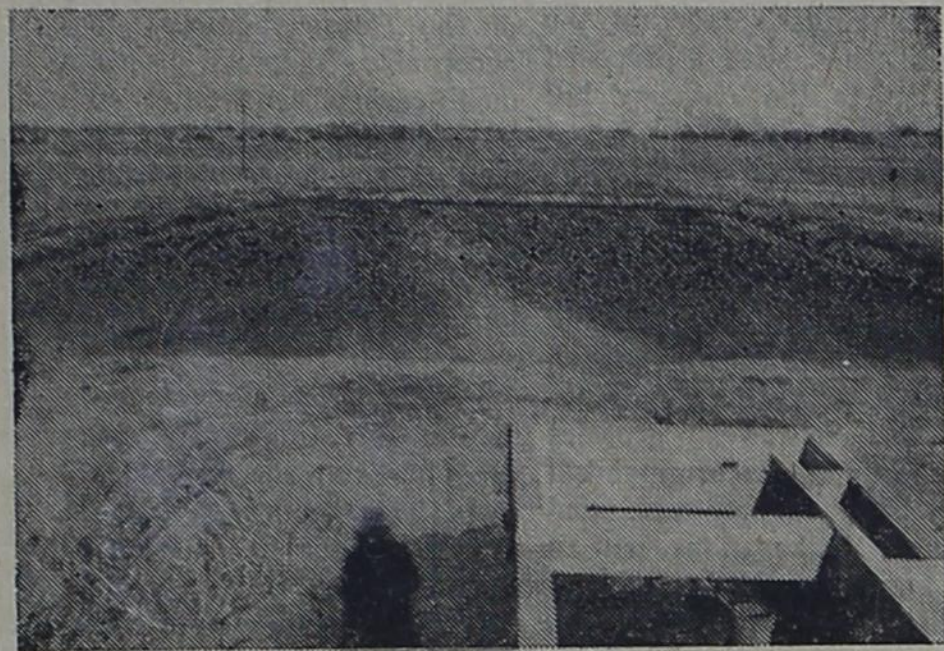

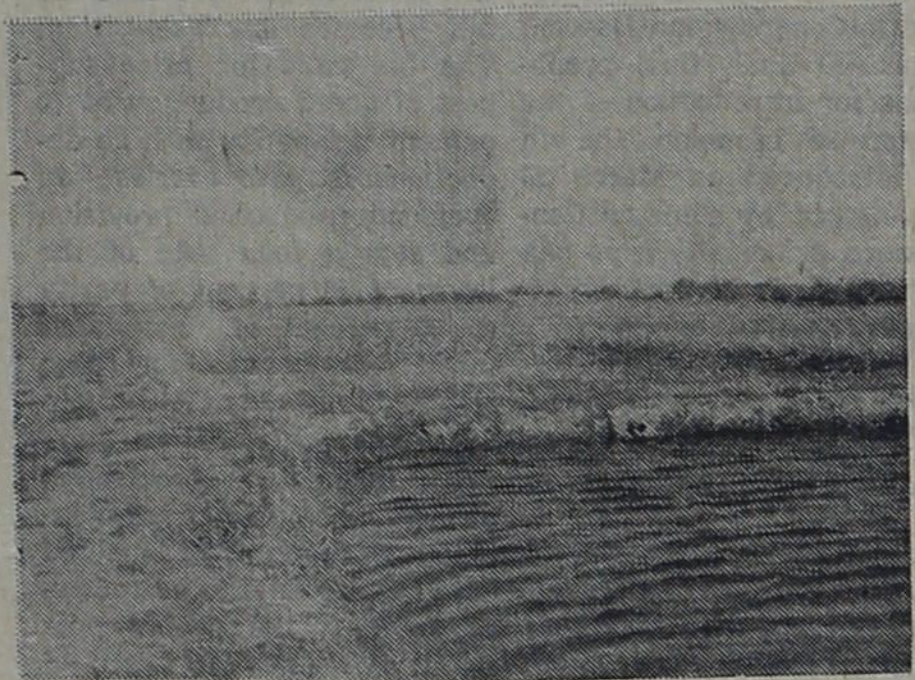

# OPEN LETTER TO CITIZENS OF GORMAN

I would like to say "THANKS" from the bottom of my heart to each of you for the fine cooperation and understanding during the last four years that has been my pleasure to serve you as your Mayor of this wonderful little city. There has been times that has been rough going - but in spite of all the obstacles - with your encouragement - we have been able to overcome them with flying colors.

Even though it is a public record, I would like to list below a few of the major things that has happened since I took the oath of office as your Mayor on April 21, 1972:

When I held up my right hand and took this solemn oath the City of Gorman was indebted to the First National Bank of Gorman \$11,500.00. Literally, when I lowered my hand after taking the Oath of office, there was a note placed in my hand to sign in the sum of \$3,000.00, which the City had to borrow to pay their urrent accounts. This brought the total indebtedness of our City up to the staggering sum of \$14,500.00 dollars.

Today, March 30, 1976 at 4:30 p. m. the City owes NO ONE, all debts are PAID, and the City has in cash and savings a total of: \$1993.66, and we are holding in a trust fund which you Citizens have willingly donated for the future purchase of Fire Fighting Equipment, the total sum of \$2513.20, bringing the total to \$22506.86. YES - you are right - the City Management has come a long, long way during the last FOUR YEARS.

In my first meeting with the City Commission after taking this solemn oath of office, I told the City Commission that the City of Gorman was no different from any other business, it had to be operated on a business like manner, and even though a City was not necessarily designed to make a profit it had to be operated in a business like manner, and if it should, so to speak, make a profit, the profit should be refunded back to you Citizens in the form of a Tax Reduction. After all, you, the Citizens of Gorman, OWN this little City. YES, it is yours, and I, as your Mayor, am only your SERVANT.

The major things that was confronting the City at the time I took office was, and I list them in their importance:

1. Our number 2 Sewer Plant, which had had no repairs or for that matter, no attention since original installation in the year of 1920. (You see, it is on the north side of our little Continental Divide, which shed waters flow to the Leon River) and there are only 42 residences that use this facility, and when I took office there was on the City drawing boards a program to install a mechanical sewer lift, to pick up the sewer from the North side of our City and deliver it to our number 1 sewer plant located on the south side of our City, which would have cost the Citizens of Gorman approximately \$350,000, which we did not have and we knew you citizens should not be handicapped with a debt like this.

After being informed by all the State agencies controlling our Sewer systems, I personally, took a serious look at this problem. Then we, the City Commission, agreed that the only thing we could afford was to upgrade the old No. 2 Plant to meet all State Agencies requirements. THIS WE DID. We purchased a Bulldozer which we were compelled to own so that we could bury our solid waste each day, to meet all the State requirements. Yes, you are right, we cannot BURN the waste, we must bury it. We used the Bulldozer to build the evaporative ponds which were required to upgrade the Number 2 Sewer Plant, which was completed last year, almost one year ago, and to date the number one pond is not full of water. There are two evaporative ponds, which are required by the State Controlling Agencies. This number 2 Sewer Plant can handle as large a capacity as our number 1 plant. This we are PROUD of. Your Mayor, personally engineered this number two Sewer plant, and I am very proud that I was able to do this and save you Taxpayers the unnecessary expense of several hundred thousand dollars of expense of installing the LIFT STATION.

2. Our old (so to speak) "Dump Ground" became outdated, and we were forced to improve it to meet all 3 State Controlling Agencies. Yes we even had to change its name - so now it is known as: GORMAN SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL SITE. Yes, we were required to control the actual unloading of all waste carried to our Disposal Site, and BURY it each day. This we are doing, and have a man on duty each Saturday from 10:00 a. m.

till 6:00 p. m. with the Disposal Site open for the convenience for all our Citizens who wish to haul their own waste, as well as for the convenience of all the Citizens who are not residents of the City of Gorman with valid Permits. We are Not Allowed To Burn any of the waste, this would be in VIOLATION of the EPA Laws. WE MUST BURY THEM. This is what we do with our Bulldozer each day.

3. The next progress project as viewed by the City Commission was the need for a City Owned City Hall to house the General City Office as well as offices for the Mayor, Chief of Police and the Water Superintendent. You see, the City of Gorman had never owned a City Hall in its entire history - they had always rented a building, which, in most instances, was not suitable for the convenience of all the City Departments. So - after considerable thought and discussion, the City Commission approved the purchase of an old building downtown as well as a vacant lot. The old building was reconstructed to consist of a: General office; three other offices; The City Library! Lounge; a Kitchen; Conference Room; a Storage Room; as well as two rest rooms. This has been completed with the exception of furniture in some offices and the Conference Room, which will be completed by the time we have our open house on Tuesday, June 29, 1976. This building is a combination of two of our Bicentennial Projects. Both Heritage and Horizons. Restoring the old (the Heriage), and improving for the future (the Horizons).

4. Also, in the last 4 years we have improved, paved, and sealcoated several blocks of our City Streets. We have spent several thousand dollars on repairing, and replacing Sewer Lines as well as Water lines. There is so many things that we, your City Commission, have accomplished during the last 4 years, that we do not have space here to tell you. But is a public record. We have also purchased a New Basic Fire Truck as well as a New Police Car.

The next thing (if you good people see fit to re-elect me as your Mayor) I intend to do all in my power to get approved by the City of Gorman - is to adopt the State Approved \$3000.00 Homestead tax exemption for each one of our Citizens who has reached the Age of 65. We also are in the process of passing a rigid stock and pet law, which WILL CONTROL the present SERIOUS stray dog condition of our City.

Elsewhere on this page you will find a PICTURE PROGRESS REPORT partially covering some of the MAJOR accomplishments during the last FOUR YEARS.

Yes - they will belong to you, the Citizens of Gorman, Texas.

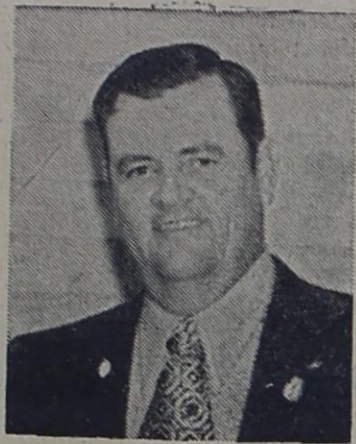

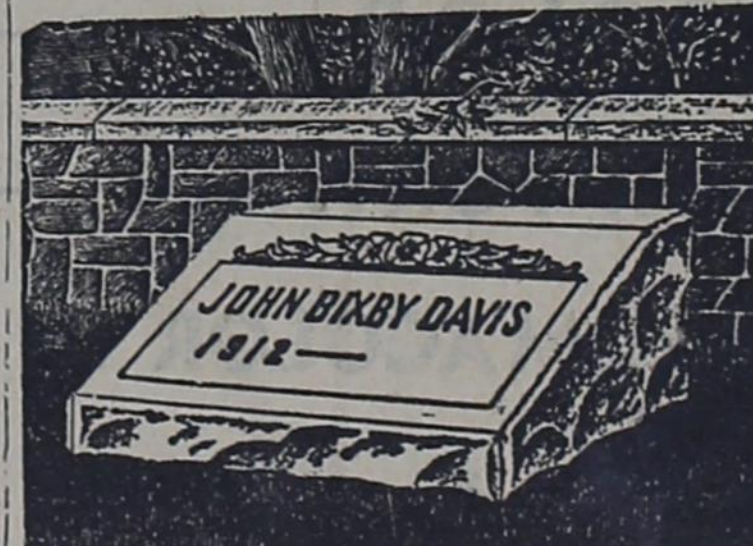
