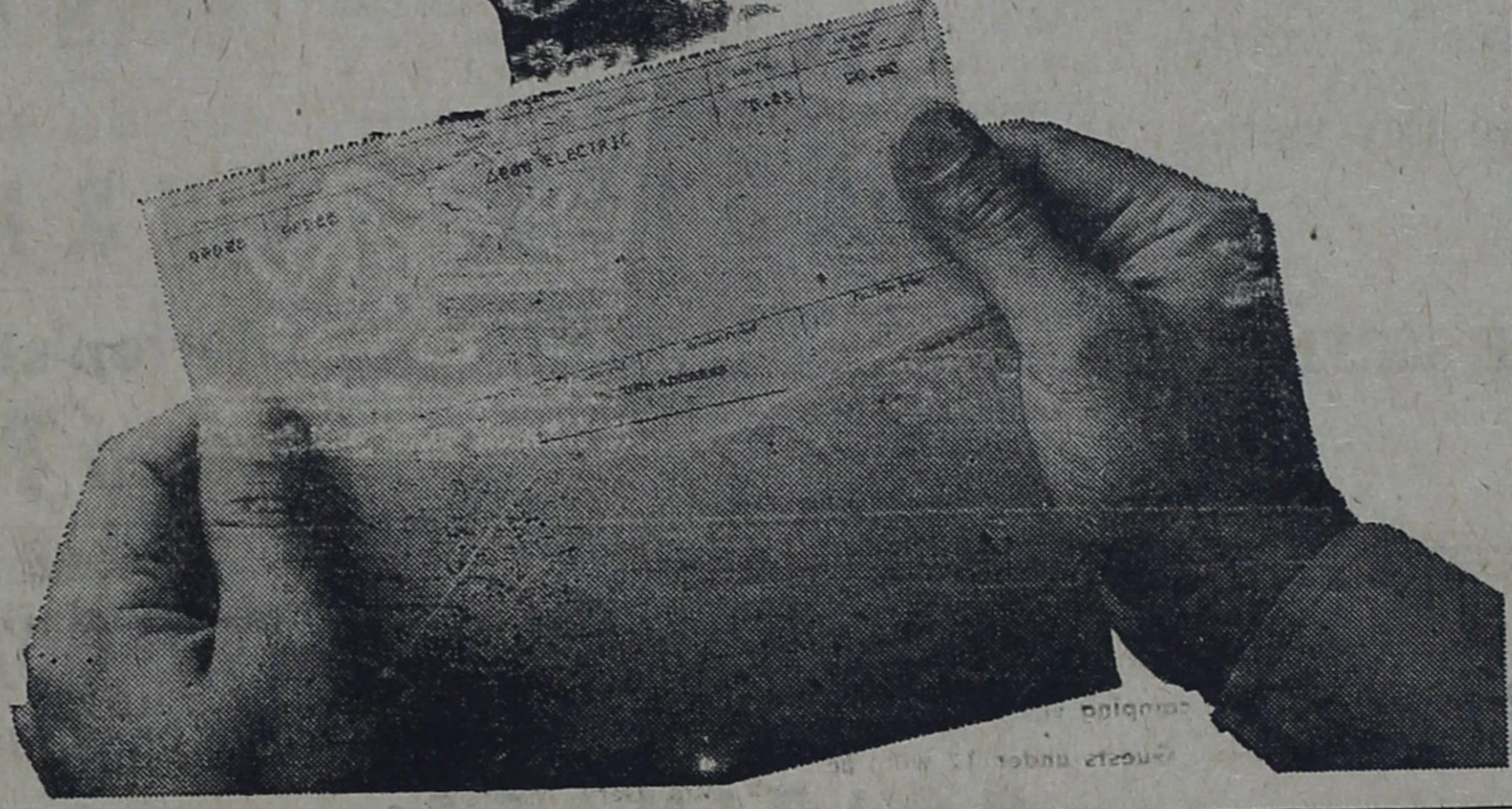

School Board Sets Tax Rate

The Gorman ISD Board met in regular session July 12 1976 with the purpose to set the tax rate for the Gorman ISD for the school year 1976-1977. The Board set the tax rate as follows:

\$1.50 for maintenance tax and \$.10 for interest or sinking or indebtedness. The cause for increase from \$1.35 to \$1.50 from school year 1975-76 was due to local fund assignment being increased by the state by \$9,000.00 for the coming year, increase in teachers salaries, and operation costs being increased. Th etax raise will be about the same as for the school year 1975-1976.

The district's local fund assignment has gone from \$29,000.00 to \$63,000.00 since 1974-1975 school year. This is the main thing that has caused taxes to be increased over the past year and for the coming year.
