It being called to the Courts' attention that the office of Justice of the Peace, Precinct No. 5 will be vacant as of January 1, 1977; for the reason of no candidate filing for election to this office. Justice Precinct No. 5 being situated along with Justice Precinct No. 3 within Commissioner's Precinct No. 3, it is the opinion of the Court that Justice Precinct No. 5 be eliminated and a new Justice Precinct No. 3 created comprising a territory and boundary cotermious with County Commissioner's Precinct No. 3.

Motion by Commissioner Dill, seconded by Commissioner Woods, that from and after December 31, 1976, that the existing Justice Precinct No. 5 be eliminated and a new Justice Precinct No. 3 be created comprising the same boundaries and territory of the now existing County Commissioner's Precinct No. 3. This action taken because of the manifested lack of interest in maintaining the office of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 5.

Upon a call of the vote by the County Judge, Commissioners Woods, Blackwell and Dill voting "Aye" Commissioner Owen voting, "No", the vote was declared three in favor and one against the order declared passed.

Judge B. A. Butler of Rising Star, Precinct 3, will serve as Justice of Peace for the new JP Precinct.






