**The Scriptures Speak**

"The Unity of The Spirit"  
 "Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ." — Eph. 4:13.

After having stated that Christ "gave gifts unto men" (Eph. 4:8), and after having stated that Christ "gave some apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers" (Eph. 4:11). Paul declared that such special gifts of the Spirit were given specifically "For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ." (Eph. 4:12).

Then in the next verse he stated these gifts would be TEMPORARY. They would last, "Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God." (Eph. 4:13).

While some people have accepted the word "Till" as being a term used by Paul to limit the duration of such gifts these same people have not accepted the fact that the time of which he wrote has already ended. They have misinterpreted the expression, "Till we all come in the unity of the faith" as referring to a time when all people will be united. Their reasoning may be expressed in this manner: Since it is obvious that people are not united in their beliefs today, the time of which Paul wrote is the present. From this line of reasoning they

conclude that me have special gifts of the Holy Spirit today.

But let it be remembered that Ephesians 4:13 does NOT teach that the gifts Christ "gave unto men" would last until all men are UNITED. Instead, it teaches that these gifts would last "Till all come in the UNITY OF THE FAITH and of the KNOWLEDGE OF THE SON OF GOD." This has reference to the time when men will know of the Son of God and will be willing to accept "the faith." What is "the faith?" "The faith" is that body of doctrine found in the New Testament known as the Gospel of Christ! It is that objective body of truth "once delivered (past tense) to the saints" (Jude 3). When it is known and obeyed, it makes a person free from the bondage of sin (John 8:32).

The very fact that we have the Bible in our possession today is positive proof that the time of which Paul wrote in Ephesians 4:8-13 has ended. We have "the faith" in our possession today. We can study God's holy written word today. Through a study of the
