COLLEGE STATION - Until about three years ago, researchers thought they knew where the lesser sandhill cranes migrated to each summer to breed. Little did they know.
"They had no idea that they were going to Siberia," said Dr. R. Douglas Slack, professor of wildlife and fisheries sciences at Texas A\&M University. "They thought they were going straight north into Canada and Alaska. Slack and graduate student Tsuyoshi Watanabe are studying migration routes and breeding- and wintering-ground ecology of the lesser sandhill crane, a subspecies of the sandhill crane.
Thousands of the birds spend the winter at Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge
By understanding these aspects of crane ecology, experts can develop strategies to conserve the cranes' habitats. Scientists can't know all there is to know about an animal, Slack said, but see CRANES on page 2

The A\&M researchers ar dentifying the cranes' migratory staging and stopover sites as well as studying their nesting habitat in Siberia. Although he breeding grounds in Canada have been studied, this is the first American project to study them in Siberia.
The A\&M team is collabo rating with the Northern Prairi Wildlife Research Center North Dakota and the Yakutsk Institute of Biology in Russia. The Russian scientists are oncerned that an oil discovery in Siberia could threaten part of the cranes' breeding grounds.
"Since development is likely,
we need to do it in an ecologi cally sensitive way,"Slack said Watanabe has spent two summers - three and a half months at a time - in Siberia"s Sakha Republic tracking the cranes and studying their behavior and


He found three sandhill crane nests and collected data on their nesting materials.
"Finding a nest was very dif-
ficult," Watanabe said. The nests were very simple, made of a few willow sticks, and the closest nests were two miles apart.
He thinks that a lack of time during the breeding season keeps the cranes in Siberia from building the large nests that the sandhill cranes build in Wis-
Watanabe will spend a couple of weeks this winter studying the cranes in West Texas. He has identified two cranes that migrated to Siberia last summer, one of which is on its way to the Lubbock area for the winter.

## Trees and shrubs can make effective, beautiful screens

Discussion over a Clovis proposal to require the screening of unsightly salvage yards and similar sites comes as a reminder that plants can provide more than food, oxygen and timber
a the, not that long ago, when windbreaks were considered a necessity on come again if we aren't finally through with the drought
There are many shrubs and trees that can make effective screening, and several of them can survive ourclimate unaided once they get established. In other words, some of them will
require occasional watering require occasional watering
during their first couple of years.
Just remember when you're considering which plants to use: The extremely fast-growing trees are going to have brittle wind, aggressive roots that can be problems around water and sewer lines, and more often than not are going to be short-

If you need the screening effect very quickly, you might consider a row of one of the
new hybrid willows orpoplars along with a row of a higher-
 lime the quick-growing spe-
cies is looking scraggly, the slower-growing, longer-lived plants will have a few years growth and be ready for ser

Evergreen species native to he Southwest are among the best, but can be hard to find commercially available. The best source for these is usually a government agency; your local Farm Service Agency office should be able to provide direction. The sizes available are ikely to be small, too, so they may take a few years to make an effective screen - but th frices are almost unbelievably ow, making it well worth buy
ing this way. You can often ge 100 plants for less than the cost of taking the family out for fas food.
One non-native that is effec projects - and is often over ooked - is the old standby astern red cedar (Juniperis
require a lot of water. I know o one row that survived our recent dry summers without a drop of irrigation when the Si verian elms nearby were dying Naturally, the cedars' foliag is thinner now, so they aren't

## Texas cattle on feed up 3 percent

AUSTIN - Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter in Texas feedlots with capacities of more than 1,000 head totaled 3.03 million head on Nov. 1, up 3 percent from a year ago.
According to the monthly report by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, the estimate was up 4 percent from the Oct. 1 level.
Producers placed 670,000 head in commercial feedlots during October, down 17 percent from a year ago and down 4 percent from the September 2000 total
Texas commercial feeders marketed 530,000 head during October, unchanged from a year ago. Monthly marketings were down 4 percent from the September total. On Nov. 1, there were 2.45 million head of cattle and calves on feed in the northern High Plains, 81 percent of the state total.
The number on feed in that area was up 4 percent from both last year and from the

SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL COLLEGE STATION Candles are a holiday tradition. Imagine a Christmas scene -snow-covered houses, carolers, smiling families, piles of presents - and chances are it is lit by candles.
Put every year the nation's heart is broken by reports of house fires during the holiday house fires during the holiday lies of their good will, their homes or possibly even their
Many of these fires are caused by candles - ironically, the same candles that are such a tradition in holiday decorations. Janie Harris, housing andenvironment specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said that during December - the heart of the annual holiday season - about twice as many fires are reportedly caused by candles as in the rest of the year.
"My guess is there are a lot more fires caused by candles than are reported; they are probably the fires that people put out and so didn't report," she said.
Why so many more candle fires reported in December? Because so many people use candles as part of their holiday home décorations. And, even though the safest candles are the unlit ones, as Harris said "Why have candles if you're not going to light them?" With that in mind, candle safety becomes of paramount importance all year, but especially during the holidays. "If you're going to have
candles, you need to make sure candles, you need to make sure fire-retardant or fireproof,"

Harris said.
Candles that are in glass con ainers - especially those with fitting lids - are among the afest, she added.
But any time an open flame is burning, the danger of a fire outbreak exists. That's why Harris advised some safety pre cautions to keep in mind during the holiday season or when ever candles are burning First, keep burning candle qut of the reach of children and pets. But that's not enough since accidental bumps can be caused by adults, too. Burning candles should never be placed on end tables or other areas where they might accidentally be knocked over by someone reaching for something else, she said.
Also, keep burning candles out of window sills or any other place where a curtain or othe fabric item could be blown or fall into the flame.
"Don't place them in the window or near fabric or material, she said. A sudden and unex pected gust of wind - even a shift in air current caused by someone walking by - is enough to drop a curtain into a candle's flame.
If using tall tapers on a holi day dinner table, make sure they are fitted tightly into the candleholders, and leave an inch or so "safety zone" around each one.
Keep the wicks trimmed to about $1 / 4$ to $1 / 2$ inch above the top of the candle, she continued, in order to keep the flame shorter and less likely to cause damager.
Don't wrap presents near a candle flame. Holiday wrapping paper, ribbons and cards
