Dear Kernel:
Recently while reading an article by Felix R. McKnight about the late and famed football coach Vince Lombardi, and then a few days later an article on character by Bruce Blossat, I couldn't help but be moved to make some comments of my own and repeat some of the things they had to say, because it seems so relevant to my job here at Gorman and all coaching jobs throughout the country.

A great many Americans in public life are stating the truth when they tell us our youth are the best informed, most intelligent people we have ever had. It is indeed important. But character is more vital and there we are in cruelly short supply.

Luckily some Americans recognize it. This is why so many people from all walks of life grieved the passing of one of the great men of our time, Coach Lombardi. His profession was incidental. He was properly seen as a leader and mover of men.

"In his mind, character was a higher quality than the intellect. He defined character as mental 'toughness,' 'the perfectly disciplined will,' employed in a spirit of sacrifice, self-denial and humility to achieve or strive for high goals."

The tributes to him were all from men who said not that he taught them to play the game well, but that he taught them how to live confidently as men in any walk of life.

The character required to do that is one of the great missing elements in America today.

Coach Lombardi said one time that "winning is not a sometime thing; it's an all-the-time thing. You don't win once in awhile, you don't do things right once in awhile, you do them right all the time. Winning is a habit. Unfortunately, so is losing." You know, I think he's right! Character is what you are when no one is looking... it's an all-the-time thing.

The ole coach continues, "every time a football player goes out to play his trade he's got to play from the ground up - from the soles of his feet right up to his head. Every inch of him has to play. Some guys play with their heads. That's O. K. You've got to be smart to be No. 1 in any business."

"But more important you've got to play with your heart - with every fiber of your body."

Men are inherently aggressive and competitive. Those qualities, properly disciplined, are the engine of progress, the means of solving personal and larger problems, of "winning" in the world of football or Lombardi's world.

And yet aggressiveness uncontained by rules of order (NCAA

Rule Book) and backed by force (game officials) is nothing more or less than violence, regardless of the fancy, modern-day terms attached to it.

Yes, character is more important than intellect, and the great game of football does more to develop that quality than anything I know of today.

May I conclude with these words from Coach Lombardi so that we may understand a bit better:

"Running a football team is no different from running any other kind of organization - an army, a political party, a business. The principles are the same. The object is to win - to beat the other guy. Maybe that sounds hard or cruel. I don't think it is."

"It's a reality of life that men are competitive and the most competitive games draw the most competitive men. That's why they're there - to compete. They know the rules and the objectives when they get in the game. The objective is to win - fairly, squarely, decently, by the rules - but to win."

"And in truth, I've never known a man worth his salt who, in the long run, deep down in his heart, didn't appreciate the grind, the discipline. There is something in good men that really yearns for, needs discipline and the harsh reality of head-to-head combat."

"But I firmly believe that any man's finest hour - his greatest fulfillment to all he holds dear - is that moment when he has worked his heart out in a good cause and lies exhausted on the field of battle - victorious."

JOHNNY WATSONS MOVE TO GORMAN

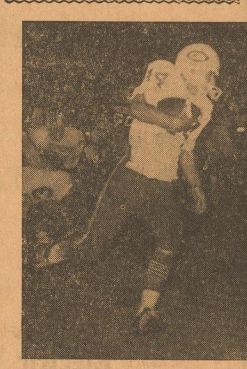

Boy! What a game! seemed to be the main topic of discussion following the Panther's victory over the Rising Star Wildcats at their homecoming Saturday night. The Panthers showed a tremendous running attack that smashed the Wildcats defense for 414 yards on the ground. And the Panther defense did an unbelievable job of blanketing the Wildcat offense the whole evening. The

Wildcats only got into scoring range twice all night and both times the Panther defense rised to the occasion and held them. When the final whistle blew and the smoke cleared the Panthers had defeated the Wildcats by a score of 40 to 0.

The Panthers wasted no time in showing their supporters that they were ready for this one as they took the opening kickoff and rolled 52 yards in ten plays to touch with Scitern getting the touchdown on a beautiful 16 yard scamper with 7:45 left in the first quarter. Wesley Rogers booted the PAT to make the score 7-0.

The Big Red came back on their third possession after recovering a fumble on the Wildcat 32 yard line by Danny Snider, and scored in four plays with Johnny Scitern scoring the tally on a 5 yard run off the left side with 11 minutes left in the second period.

The Panthers added another score with 5 minutes left in the second quarter, going 53 yards in 9 plays with Wesley Rogers bursting into the end zone from 1 yard out. The kick was blocked and the score stood at 20-0, which was the halftime score.

The Panthers scored on their first possession after the half going 76 yards in seven plays, featuring a beautiful 46 yard scamper by Jackie Selman. Selman got the TD on a 7 yard jaunt with 4:50 left in the third. The kick for point failed.

The final Panther tally came with 3:20 left on the clock in the fourth period with Kelly Henderson getting the final 3 yards on a QB sneak to cap a 67 yard drive. A pass from Wesley Rogers to Jim Guthery added the two extra points to make the final score 34 to 0.

Man did you ever see a high school running attack eat up the yards on the ground like the Big Red on Saturday. Everyone joined in for a team effort on the blocking assignments and the running attack jelled again for the second week in a row. But the blocking was much sharper in this game than the last.

Jackie Selman has really come along after shaking an injury and again led the Panther offense this week with 186 yards on 18 carries for an average of 10.4 yards per carry. Johnny Scitern ran for 163 yards on 23 trips for a 7.1 average. Wesley Rogers got 64 yards on 16 carries for 4.0 and did a marvelous job of blocking for Scitern and Selman. Kelly Henderson had a plus 1 on 3 keeps at QB, one of which he was thrown for a 2 yard loss on a misuse.

Well it was real rough to select our offensive player of the week as the whole bunch did great. But as I am sure you will agree Jackie Selman must be the choice again this week due to his tremendous running power, averaging 10.4 yards per carry.

The defense was magnificent with the front down men doing an outstanding job, the linebackers filling in the holes and the secondary staying right on their toes all night. If picking the offensive player was tough, the job of picking the outstanding defensive player is surely impossible this week. But we will have to go along with two boys this week. And the two are Danny Snider and Reggie Underwood. Heck you could have named the whole team as outstanding on defense and each player backed up the other for an outstanding team effort.

Well the Panthers will have a well earned rest this week prior to hosting the Lometa Hornets here on Friday night, October 29. This should give the Big Red plenty of time to prepare for the Hornets, the only district team to beat the Panthers last season.
