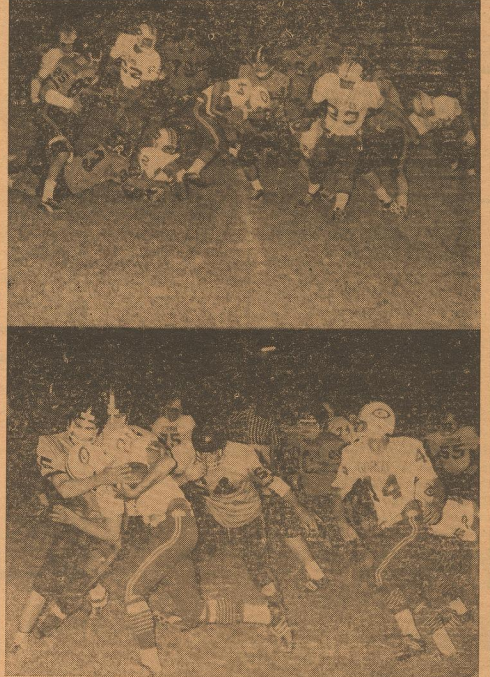

# Panthers Bomb Evant 47-0; To Host Hico Friday Night

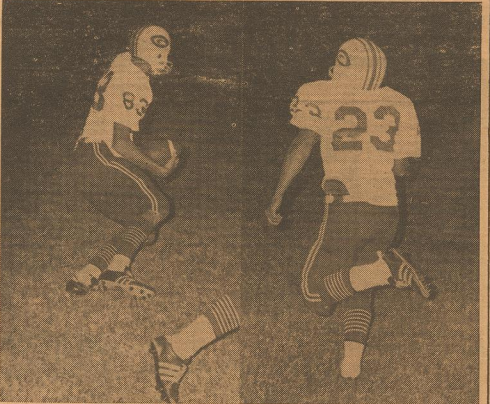

in letting the Elks know what to expect as they kicked to Evant and held them on downs. Then getting the ball on the Gorman 30 after the punt, the Panthers covered the 70 yards in 12 plays with Johnny Scitern catching a beautiful pass from Kelly Henderson in the open on a play that covered 22 yards for the TD with 4 minutes left in the first period. The kick for point by Wesley Rogers failed and the score was 6 to 0.

The Panthers again held the Elks and forced them to punt. Gorman got the ball on their own 44 yard stripe and went the distance in only 3 plays, climaxed by a superb run by Wesley Rogers for the score. The drive also featured a 37 yard jaunt by Johnny Scitern. Rogers kicked the PAT and Gorman led 13-0 with 15 seconds left in the first period.

The next Panther tally came on an amazing 80 yard run by Scitern who seemed to be hemmed in at the side line on three or four different occasions, but broke loose, losing a shoe, and went all the way with 6 minutes left in the second period. Rogers kicked the PAT to up the score to 20-0, and that was how the score stood at halftime.

Gorman came out ready to go again in the second half and took the opening kickoff and returned it all the way on a beautiful 85 yard dash by Johnny Scitern, behind some fine blocks, only to have it called by a penalty. Taking the ball on their own 47 after the penalty, the Big Red scored in 9 plays with Wesley Rogers bursting through the Elks defense for the final 12 yards with 8 minutes left in the third. Rogers added the PAT and the score rose to 27-0.

The Panthers again held the Elks, forcing them to punt. Gorman took the ball on their own 20 and covered the 80 yards to the double stripe in 14 plays with the score coming on a real fine pass from Henderson to Jim Guthery who made an outstanding catch and dove into the end zone on a 19 yard pass and run play with 11 minutes left in the 4th quarter. Rogers added the PAT and Gorman led 34-0.

The next Panther tally came with 7 minutes left after the Big Red had got the ball on the Elk 27 yard line and scored in four plays, featuring a 17 yard ramble by Rogers, and capped by a 2 yard plunge by Jackie Selman for the TD. The kick for point failed and the score jumped to 40-0.

Gorman added another touchdown with 3 minutes left in the game after again getting the ball on the Elk 27 yard line and scoring in 5 plays, featuring an 11 yard pass to Guthery for a first and goal from the one. Bill Self took the handoff on a dive play for the score. Rogers again added the PAT and the Panthers had won the battle 47-0.

Leading ground gainer for the Big Red was Scitern with 142 yards on 9 carries for 15.7 yard average. Rogers had 119 yards on 19 trips for 6.2; Selman got 61 yards on 17 totes for 3.5; Self hit for 13 on 4 trips for 3.2; and Henderson wound up with a -10 on one play as he was caught on a pass try for a 10 yard loss. We hesitated this week in naming the Outstanding Offensive Player of the game, as Wesley Rogers had another real fine evening's work, as did Johnny Scitern. So, there is only one thing to do, and that is to name both of them for the honor. Defensively, the Panthers looked good with several different players coming in for some real fine pats on the back. However, we shall not attempt to pick one player out of the team for defensive honors, as we feel that the winning effort was again attributed to a real team effort on defense, which the Panthers have exhibited in the last four games, and we feel that this team effort and spirit is what has brought them through, and will continue to do so this season.

Well another BIG game comes up on Friday night as the Panthers host the always tough Hico Tigers in another MUST game in the 17-B district race. The Tigers played Lometa a tough game last week and will really be after the Big Red this week. However, we feel that if the Panthers continue to play their team effort game, that there will be no doubt about the outcome! Right, Panthers? Go Get 'Em!

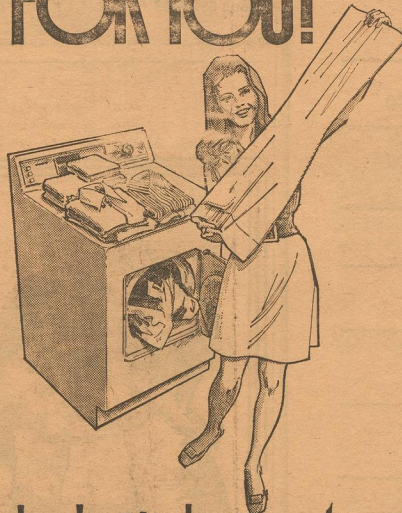

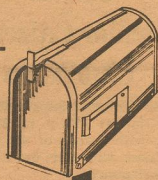
