Double Six was in the same boat with him. Big Foot is still very quiet. Though they say Mama's tongue is sure ready for a good night's rest. I am still on that jelly, jam and other canning. Oh! my poor fingers are drawn and shriveled so bad from washing jars, etc., lately. Just like old Sanfords are.

Our gang is still busy feeding the fish. Though they catch some that weigh very heavy on those fisherman's scales. I am sure that they are very accurate.

Here is something that is very true. In the late winter

of 1916-17 while I was teaching in Menard County, I went hunting with several of the boys one night. The hounds treed something in a large hollow log about 15 feet long. It was lying on the ground. Two of the boys kept the dogs back from the log, so one boy went to the far end of the log and set the lantern down. A boy about 14 years young went to the other end of the log to see what was "treed". He had his mouth open, straining his eyes very hard to see what it was. Just at that moment the skunk sprayed his eyes, mouth and face. Talk about sick. He was vomiting and crying. We led him about a hundred yards to a tank. We washed his mouth out with mud and water. He sure suffered for awhile with that taste in his mouth and pain in his eyes.

In the fall of 1917 at Ft. Sill

we had to have some cordwood from the ice house. (They used wood for steam. We used wood to cook the bread and to run the bakery).

There was a man from the 7th cavalry in the company born in Germany. I could not spell his name. All called him "Skippy." When we got down to near the bottom of the cordwood rick there was a skunk. The first one Skippy had ever seen. So he decided to catch it for a pet. He got ready to grab it and missed. The skunk did not. He was a sick man. It hit him in the face. He did not want it.

In the fall of 65 my brother-in-law, Allen McGlothin, and I went to my barn on the Parker place. (I bought the place from Parker.) My dog jumped a skunk. (The dog was a rat terrier) under the barn. The skunk's tail came through a

crack and Allen caught the tail. He held the tail down so it could not throw the musk. He told me to hold its tail while he got the gun out of the pickup. I said just hold his tail and went and got the gun. I had to shoot the second time to kill it. That was a lesson to me. I learned that the skunk had to turn up its tail to throw that sweet smelling perfume. If you do not believe it just try it one time. I have never tried it again, though I have read where others had the same experience.

Last week I wrote about a piece in the Abilene paper written by Mr. Kirkpatrick. You put in the paper it was \$735.00. It should have been \$73,500.00 in illegal vouchers. There were 75 team members who wrote out these expense vouchers to Annapolis and not one trip made. Included in the

gang was Mrs. Carter's secretary. I believe that we still have a gang there that can beat any so far when it comes to lying. That did not excite the president. Why did they try to impeach Mr. Nixon? Why cannot this be stopped now?

Today, the 5th is the anniversary week of D Day for Normandy. Just think of the cost in lives, blood, crippled for life and so many, many other sacrifices that day and afterwards for our Liberty. Then to be lied to and stolen from by the ones who rule our nation. Wake up America!

Look up and smile. A smile will help you win. Remember that the sun is shining very bright just beyond those darkest storm clouds. Be ready to greet it with a smile. It will help you and all you come in contact with. Try it one time and again and again.
