



TU Electric officials say a decision today by the Texas Supreme Court could help hold rates down for its customers and enhance Texas' competition with other states for new businesses and jobs.

In a case involving GTE-Southwest, Inc., the court ruled that the Public Utility Commission did not have to consider losses from unregulated affiliate companies when determining the federal tax liability of the utility itself. The court also ruled that the PUC was not required to take away the company's tax benefits resulting from disallowed expenses.

Although the PUC did not take either of those actions in the GTE case, an appeals court later ruled that it should have. The Supreme Court to-day overturned the appeals court ruling and upheld the PUC's original decision, which was consistent with traditional tax treatment.

"We have felt all along that this is the only fair decision the court could make after studying the facts," said Marc Moseley, TU Electric controller. "This decision by the state's highest civil court is important for several reasons.

"First, it allows utilities to avoid a violation of IRS rules that would cost them and their customers billions of dollars in tax benefits that are currently being used to reduce rates.

"The ruling also reflects fair regulatory treatment by giving federal tax benefits to the party that paid the cost leading to the benefit - - whether that party is the customer or the shareholder.

"The decision also ensures that the tratment of taxes in our state will be consistent with the rest of the nation, and it removes a significant amount of uncertainty about utility regulation in Texas."

While some consumer activitists claim that giving all tax benefits to customers would lower rates, that would not be the result at all, Moseley said.

If TU Electric were forced to violate federal tax rules by following some recent unorthodox PUC and cour decisions, we would have to send \$1.3 billion immediately to the IRS. Then, in direct contrast to what some consumer groups claim, TU Electric customers' rates would rise by \$150 million annually as the company increased its debt to make up the loss:

its debt to make up the loss:

"Such a scenario wold harm both individual customers and Texas as a whole as it competes with other states in the economic development arena, "Moseley said.

These tax issues are being debated during the current session of the Texas Legislature.

For many years, and until recently, the Texas PUC followed the traditional tax procedures upheld today by the Supreme Court. In recent years, however, the PUC and some courts have ruled in favor of different methods that would have foced the state's utilities to violate IRS rules.


