

A lot of questions has been asked by many different people who has seen the speciman but Reynolds cannot provide any of the answers except to the one, "Where did you get it?"



Birth Defects Prevention

The March of Dimes is trying to do something about this tragedy by channeling its funds and energies into birth defects prevention. A program which it supports at the University of Texas Southwest Medical Center in Dallas is one that provides genetic services.
